2004/97 #1	Lookout Mt. Yukon Terr. [Au verso:] Look-out Mountain, Mayo, Yukon - Spring 1934.
2004/97 #2	[Panoramic view of Mayo? looking across water. Small sternwheeler and roofed riverboat visible as well as many buildings]
2004/97 #3	[Au verso:] 'Eli', the Mayo Water Company. 2 five gallon gas cans of water for 25c. The present owner has had Eli 20 years and he was brought into the country some years before that. He is still able to pull a wicked load. [Horse hitched to cart in front Bank of Montreal building]
2004/97 #4	Hazel B. - Hungry Mt. [Au verso:] The famous 'Hazel B' returning to Dawson after our epoch making trip "in" from the "outside". The mountains in the background are 40 miles southwest and named "Hungry" because nothing grows on them but snow. [small boat on water with two people looking on]
2004/97 #5	Keno arriving at Mayo. [Au verso:] Chapter 1. The arrival of the "Keno" pushing an ore barge up river. As seen from the Bank. [distant shot of boat on water]
2004/97 #6	Thar she Blows. [Au verso:] Chapter 2. "Thar she blows". Now to make the last bend with its treacherous bar which is just under water and in a different place each trip. [distant shot of a sternwheeler on a river]
2004/97 #7	H.M.S. Keno and pinnacle Hootalinqua. [Au verso:] Chapter 3. The climax: and what a fizzle. I took it on time exposure but the blooming thing moved. Close-up of H.M.S. "Keno" with the pinnacle tied on front - named "Hootalinqua"
2004/97 #8	Chateau Mayo. [Au verso:] Chateau Mayo!!
2004/97 #9	The Church. [Au verso:] The Church and Rectory - on "Bootleggers Alley". [distant shot of buildings on a river bank]
2004/97 #10	Aeroplane Hanger. [Au verso:] Our aeroplane hangar with 3 planes stowed away inside. Two fold their wings when retiring and remind me of snipes.
2004/97 #11	Placed by the Ice. [Au verso:] This barge was at one time in the river but our ice put it so high and dry after filling it full of holes that it will have to stay there. It has 1500 gallons of fuel oil in it. (The 2 tips are my skies.)
2004/97 #12	Close to Mayo. [Au verso:] 2. This hill is directly south of the town and picture #1 was taken at the foot of it.

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2004/97 #13	The Break Up. [Au verso:] #4. This was taken (with #3) just a few days before #5.
2004/97 #14	Impeding the mail. [Au verso:] 3. This is an "easy" obstacle for our winter mail service. 5 miles further back on the road they had to work 6 hours in snow water up to their waists - rebuilding a bridge.
2004/97 #15	The Break Up. [Au verso:] 5. Can you imagine man-made docks holding this back? Well, anyway, they just don't. [shot of snow and ice piled up on a river bank]
2004/97 #16	Looking N. at Mayo from the Stewart R. [Au verso:] #1. Looking north at Mayo waterfront from the middle of the Stewart River
2004/97 #17	Mayo Lakes. [Au verso:] The closer of these 2 lakes runs down to Mayo. The other goes 300 miles before it passes Mayo to join its side-kick. If you're in a hurry it doesn't pay to start out on the wrong lake.
2004/97 #18	A Northern Palace. [Au verso:] A Palace in the North. Mighty handy after a 30-mile mush in 50 below weather. [shot of a very small (one-room?) cabin]
2004/97 #19	A 1500 ft. Mt. [Au verso:] If you step off the edge of this you will bump your napper just 1500 feet lower down. The water from the distant mountains runs into the Arctic - when it runs.
2004/97 #20	Mrs. Fishers. The Church & Rectory. [Au verso:] Mrs. Fisher's, the Church, The Rectory and lots of oil drums for scenery.
2004/97 #21	Govt. Radio Telegraph Set. [Au verso:] South half of Centre Street, West Side. The big mast is our link with the rest of the world - the Government Radio Telegraph Service.
2004/97 #22	The Tennis Court. [Au verso: same caption] - 1934.
2004/97 #23	The Port of Mayo. [Au verso:] The port of Mayo boatless. The "island" is mainland the other side of the river which takes 4 big mile-deep bends at this point. [small map of the river bends, indicating location of Mayo and the Indian Village]
2004/97 #24	Minto Bridge. Mayo Brook. Lookout Mt. [Au verso:] Minto Bridge and the Mayo Brook with Look-out Mntn. in the background
2004/97 #25	Wild Geese. [Au verso:] If you hold this right, it is a flock of wild geese and 4 telephone wires.

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2004/97 #26	6 miles from Glacier Hill. [Au verso:] Looking down the valley towards Mayo, 6 miles away from Glacier Hill.
2004/97 #27	Duncan Creek (gold). [Au verso:] Duncan Creek 15 miles north of Mayo. A paradise for gold diggers. Ja see the snow?
2004/97 #28	Spring time along the Stewart. [Au verso:] Spring-song along the banks of the Stewart River. [similar to #39]
2004/97 #29	Headed for the Outside. [Au verso: same caption. Distant shot of a sternwheeler on the river]
2004/97 #30	Minto Bridge around the Corner. [Au verso:] Minto Bridge is just around the corner.
2004/97 #31	A Boat Load of Silver. [Au verso: same caption. Shot of a sternwheeler pushing a barge]
2004/97 #32	The Skating Pond. [Au verso:] The pond just out of town where we got in 2 weeks skating before the river froze over. [people sitting around a fire on the shore of a frozen pond]
2004/97 #33	Supper Time & did it rain. [Au verso:] We had supper on the double as heavy black clouds were threatening to soak us.
2004/97 #34	Tea Time at Noon. [Au verso:] "Tea" time, at noon. [preparing a meal on board a boat tied to the shore]
2004/97 #35	8 p.m. off for Home. [Au verso:] 8:00 P.M. - a good day enjoyed - and ready for home. [people sitting and standing on a boat, ready to push off from shore]
2004/97 #36	21st June Club Tournament taken at Midnight. This was taken 12 Midnight sharp, 21st June at a Club Tournament. [Au verso:] The Secy.-Treas. being busy elsewhere (the Kitchen) did not get his jib took. [large group of people posed on a tennis court]
2004/97 #37	Look Out Mt. & Silver Mine District. [Au verso:] Another 'shot' of Look-out. The stream is the Mayo Brook. On the left of Look-out is the start of the gold producing ground that extends to Dawson - on the right are the silver mines.
2004/97 #38	A piece of the Yukon. [Au verso:] Not a puzzle. Just a wee bit of the Yukon. [shot of snow covered mountain tops]
2004/97 #39	Along the River. [Au verso: same caption. Similar to #28] - 1934.

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2004/97 #40	Hungry Mt. [Au verso:] Good old Hungry Mountain - rightly named, too. Not a tree or animal on it - only rock and snow.
2004/97 #41	1st attempt at speed photography. [Au verso:] My 1st attempt at speed photos. Snapped at 100th of a second. [A participant of a Sports Day doing a high jump]
2004/97 #42	2nd attempt. [Au verso:] Another attempt at speed. 150th of a second. Not much left after the Sgt. cut off all the blurs. The flappers are married ladies with famblies [families]. They would kill me if they saw this!! [Participants in a three-legged race]
2004/97 #43	Mayo Brook from the Canyon. [Au verso:] Mayo Brook from the Canyon - 4 miles from Mayo
2004/97 #44	Sunday in the North. [Au verso:same caption. Shot of a sternwheeler at the dock. The buildings and boat are reflected in the water]
2004/97 #45	Mountain East of Mayo. [Au verso:] The mountains just east of Mayo.
2004/97 #46	Thanksgiving at St. Mary's Church. [Interior view of Thanksgiving decorations at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Mayo, Yukon. Handwritten on back "Harvest Thanksgiving, St. Mary's Church, Mayo. All produce grown locally.".]
2004/97 #47	Evelyn, Flora. [Au verso:] Our Host's daughters. Evelyn (left) Flora (right).
2004/97 #48	Highet 1903 boom. [Au verso:] A portion of dead Highet where "the boom was on" in 1903.
2004/97 #49	Where we stayed. [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #50	A dredge. [Au verso:] A discarded dredge on Highet. Last used in 1923. They could only find \$60,000 in gold the last month - expenses only - so quit.
2004/97 #51	The "Grizzley". [Au verso:] The "Grizzley" through which the rocks, etc. are forced while the gold sinks through iron gratings in its floor. In the background are "tailings" or worked ground.
2004/97 #52	Gunning for Gold. [Au verso:] Gunning for Gold. A monitor clearing ground through a grizzley. The property of our Host on Highet Creek. Its about 20 feet to bedrock as you can see by the bank.
2004/97 #53	The "Monitor" at work. [Au verso:] A monitor at work clearing out 100 lb rocks like I would pebbles. One crack with that would break a person's back.

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2004/97 #54	When the water hits Fur flies. [Au verso: same caption. Shot of a monitor at work]
2004/97 #55	Const. Thomas, Mayo. [Au verso:] Constable Thomas of the R.C.M.P., Mayo Detachment.
2004/97 #56	George Lee & Boob. [Au verso:] George Lee and "Boob" who take me hunting and also provide radio entertainment, the odd Yukon meal, etc. [shot of a man and dog sitting outside in front of a doorway]
2004/97 #57	Uncle Jim Fairborn. [Au verso:] "Uncle Jim" Fairbor[n] White Pass & Yukon Route agent at Mayo
2004/97 #58	My "Pupil". [Au verso:] My bookkeeping pupil, Pearl. P.S. I don't imagine she is particularly interested in the scrubbing board - that's supposed to put the "human interest" into the picture, as the art critics would say!
2004/97 #59	Mabel the Waitress. [Au verso:] Mabel, our waitress, taken on a very cold & blowy day. Like Winnie, she is full of the funniest sayings. One of the latest which tickled me was "Oh, Look! There goes Gordon all dressed up like a cut finger".
2004/97 #60	Married. [Au verso:] A local young married couple in their "unfinished symphony".
2004/97 #61	Two Locals. [Au verso:] Two of our local young men. On the left, a mechanic, the other, a Gov't Radio man. It was raining when I took this, believe it or not!
2004/97 #62	Town Hall. [Au verso:] Our local hall. Taken just after the crowd moved off to the ball game. Celebration Day. - 17 Aug 1933.
2004/97 #63	"Shorty" Carter Hosp Caretaker. [Au verso:] Care-taker "Shorty" Carter at his quarters at the Hospital.
2004/97 #64	Mayo Hospital. [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #65	The Sergt, A Barge, Stewart R, Bootleggers Avenue. [Au verso:] The Sergeant playing with a ground glass camera; A barge; The Stewart River; And "Bootleggers' Avenue".
2004/97 #66	His Majesties [Majesty's] Mail. [Au verso:] His Majestie's [Majesty's] Mail arrives opposite Mayo. Just after I took this, one man fell through the ice up to his neck and had to be pulled out.
2004/97 #67	Looking up the Fraser Falls. [Au verso: same caption]

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2004/97 #68	Below the Falls. [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #69	A feather of White Water. [Au verso: same caption. Shot of turbulent water below a rocky cliff]
2004/97 #70	"Peggy" "The Doctor" "The Reverend". [Au verso:] "Peggy" - The Doctor - The Reverend. Parked with no danger of being "tagged". (The innocent is the Doctor; the "tough", the Rector.) [shot of an automobile on a dirt road, two men standing beside it]
2004/97 #71	Our Roads. [Au verso:] Yes, we do have roads.
2004/97 #72	Bennett Creek. [Au verso:] Bennett Creek where we filled up our radiators - and Lizzie's, on the way to Hightet.
2004/97 #73	The "Doc". [Au verso:] The "Doc" gets took. [distant shot of a man standing on a river bank]
2004/97 #74	"Reg" with the Ice. [Au verso:] This one was cooked "rare" and should show Reg walking beside a ditch that carries [carries] water to the monitor. (He is carrying a sack of ice from a glacier so that we could have ice cream.)
2004/97 #75	Mayo Lake. [Au verso:] We retire at Mayo Lake after fly fishing from Midnight to 10:00 A.M.
2004/97 #76	Mayo Lake. [Au verso:] Mayo Lake which was short 62 fish when we left. [shot of a cabin on the lake shore]
2004/97 #77	Keystone Mt. [Au verso:] Keystone Mntn., Mayo Lake. No men per square mile here.
2004/97 #78	Carribou [caribou] on the Stewart. [Au verso:] Caribou herd on Stewart River, Yukon. Untamed but easy to approach. The country's butcher shop.
2004/97 #79	A home in the Yukon. [Au verso:] Another home on the Yukon.
2004/97 #80	Carribou [caribou]. [Au verso:] Caribou.
2004/97 #81	A Yukon scene. [Au verso:] There is 50 sq. miles of this to every human in Yukon.
2004/97 #82	Mayo on The Stewart. [Au verso:] Mayo can just be seen 3 miles away. The crooked river is the Stewart. Looking North-West. I have a good demand for this one.
2004/97 #83	Too many "Fans". [Au verso:] I accidently "fogged" this in showing my camera to another enthusiast. [shot of trees, and hills]



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2004/97 #84	The thinking School. [Au verso:] This is where I "sit and think, & sometimes only sit"! (The actual size my camera takes.)
2004/97 #85	Were [where] we got gold. [Au verso:] A dry arm of the Yukon where we panned for gold - and got it! Make a good golf fareway [fairway].
2004/97 #86	Getting the Wood. [Au verso:] The boys get steam up, or at least, the where-with-all - on the Yukon River. One cord (\$4) does one mile - upstream.
2004/97 #87	Leading to the Mill, Mayo. [Au verso:] Through the woods at Mayo to the mill.
2004/97 #88	Ore Barges. [Au verso:] Bring up the Reserve. Spare ore barges on (nearly) the Stewart River. 14 all told.
2004/97 #89	Moving in Mayo. [Au verso:] Things move along in Mayo. [shot of a building frame being towed up a street by a caterpillar tractor]
2004/97 #90	The Winter Road. [Au verso:] Along our winter road to the Outside.
2004/97 #91	Hazel B. with 5 tons T.N.T. [Au verso:] "Hazel B." in port with 5 tons of T.N.T. It didn't have the barge along when I had my famous trip.
2004/97 #92	Mail crossing Stewart R. at Mayo. [Au verso:] Our Dobbin-stage leaves to bring in the mail, etc. Crossing the Stewart River just in front of town.
2004/97 #93	The Ice goes out. [Au verso:] Thrills!! The ice goes out.
2004/97 #94	The Mail takes a Drink. [Au verso:] This is our Majestie's [Majesty's] Mail Service in the drink. Fortunately nothing got wet it was to close to shore - Lady Luck isn't always so kind! (The Sergeant is on the extreme right - with the fur cap.)
2004/97 #95	The Barren North. [Au verso:] Fairy-land. The barren North. [shot of a sternwheeler pushing a barge on the river]
2004/97 #96	Yukon Crossing. [Au verso:] We stop at Yukon Crossing to gossip and hand out a letter or two.
2004/97 #97	Chateau Stewart. [Au verso:] Chateau Stewart, our first contact with the outside. [sign on the building reads "Hotel Stewart"]
2004/97 #98	What we left behind. [Au verso:] The people we leave behind. Mail and Female. [shot of a group of log buildings]
2004/97 #99	The Scourge [?] of the Yukon. [Au verso:] Nearing the Summit where the Yukon River takes root.

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2004/97 #100	On the Stewart. [Au verso:] Somewhere on the Stewart River. The camera registered this while I was interested elsewhere. That's one beauty of a "good" camera - it has its own ideas. Looks like the Dawson type of scenery to me.
2004/97 #101	The Source of the Yukon. [Au verso:] A source of the Yukon River.
2004/97 #102	Summit of White Pass. [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #103	Stewart + Hungry Mt. [Au verso:] An unexpected "blow" on the Stewart River nearly puts an early finish on our start from Mayo - at the base of the Hungry Mountains.
2004/97 #104	Devils Elbow, Yukon R.[River] [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #105	Yukon R. 72 miles from Dawson. [Au verso:] Yukon River 72 miles north of Dawson.
2004/97 #106	Volcanic Ash on the Yukon. [Au verso:] Deposit of volcanic ash on the Yukon River. Covers an area 200 miles by 200.
2004/97 #107	Coming into L. Barge Yukon R. [Au verso:] Coming into Lake LeBerge [Laberge], Yukon River.
2004/97 #108	Devils Elbow, Yukon R.[River] [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #109	Lake Bennett. [Au verso:] Lake Bennett, Yukon.
2004/97 #110	Church at Bennett. [Au verso:] Old church at Bennett, Lake Bennett, Yukon.
2004/97 #111	Carcross. [Au verso:] Carcross, Yukon.
2004/97 #112	Black Spruce Logs. [Au verso:] Yukon Black Spruce logs going "up the hill" to be used as mine props, etc. The black blob provides the "balance" to the picture. Just a bit of backing paper on the loose.
2004/97 #113	Carcross. [Au verso:] Carcross, Yukon.
2004/97 #114	Lunch Counter, Lake Bennett. [Au verso:] At the "Lunch Waggon", "Log Cabin", "Lake Bennett" or what have you. If you must miss the train, this is the only place to do it on the White Pass Railway.
2004/97 #115	Along White Pass, St. Elias Range. [Au verso:] Along the White Pass R.R. looking towards the St. Elias Range. [not the St. Elias Range]
2004/97 #116	Lake LaBarge [Laberge]. [Au verso:] Lake Lebarge [Laberge].



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2004/97 #117	Lake LaBarge [Laberge] 48 miles long. [Au verso:] Lake Lebarge [Laberge] - 48 miles long.
2004/97 #118	Skagway, Alaska. [Au verso: same caption]
2004/97 #119	[Au verso:] Skagway, Alaska.
2004/97 #120	[Au verso:] At Skagway, Alaska.
2004/97 #121	[Au verso:] By Soapy Smith's grave, Skagway, Alaska.
