Richard McBride, Q.C. pleaded the case of Miller and McLaren, the discoverers of the camp who had staked thinking they were in the territories. Their rights were upheld and they were ensured ownership of a claim 598 x 1000.

Atlin - In 1899 the Canadian Government prepared to build the Ashcroft-Yukon telegraph line to connect the Northwest Territories and Northern B.C. with rest of Canada. From Bennett, lines would run to Dawson and Atlin, and from Atlin south to Quesnel, where an extension would connect Quesnel with Ashcroft, B.C. J. B. Charleson, superintendent, was in charge of the work so that by October 4, 1899 Atlin was linked with Bennett, Dawson, Tagish, Skagway and Whitehorse. Work began from Atlin and from Ashcroft in March 1900 until on September 26, 1901 it was completed. By June 14, 1901 the line from Hazelton to Fort Simpson was done. Atlin became a repeater station for Dawson and points west of Atlin. In May 1899 the government post office was completed and later expanded to house the telegraph offices for the Yukon telegraph-line. The only drawback to the new post-office was a complete lack of postage stamps. The postal service did, however, distribute incoming mail. Photo by

Hirschfeld increased the size and subscription list to a "high" in 1903 but after it was sold to another political aspirant the paper ceased publication in April, 1908.

On arrival at Atlin it was completely overhauled - as the first car in community it caused considerable excitement.
