Assayer for Yukon Territory, goes over assay reports on lead and silver ore with E. Miles Flynn, consulting engineer for Yukon Galena Hill Mines, Ltd. Billy sold a group of lead-sliver claims to the company, and since this was taken, has become Flynn's boss. He received a substantial amount of cash for his claims, maintained an interest in the company, and was made president by the shareholders because of his knowledge of the country. Sime left Scotland in "98, a young engineer to take part in Klondike rush. He failed to find gold, worked as assayer for Canadian Bank of Commerce at Dawson when Robert Service was a teller, and did not make his strike until 50 years later; then through a lowly metal as lead."
