COR 207	f1	<p>Minute and Cash Book</p> <p>- This 1" bound volume is divided into two parts: the first 38 pages are devoted to resume accounts of the minutes of both the regular and special meetings of the Arctic Brotherhood Whitehorse Camp No. 12. Pages 190-197 and 174-187 constitute a Cash Book in the form of revenue and expenditure balance sheets, the dates of which generally coincide with those of the meetings.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Minute Book: As the camp was established on May 22, 1901, the first summary account refers to its installation, charter members, first officers, etc. Usually the minutes deal with the application, nomination, and subsequent election of new members; financial matters – dues, bills, etc.; a variety of motions; committee appointments and reports; election of officers and delegates; special projects – dances, a new hall, etc.; correspondence received and answered; and other internal business. Handwritten. 22 May 1901-12 Nov 1902. • Cash Book: Revenue and expenditure balance sheet comprised of itemized debits and credits. The majority of the entries are for initiation fees and membership dues. Handwritten. 22 May 1901-Nov 1902. • Minutes: Handwritten resume of a meeting between Arctic Brotherhood members J.P. Whitney and J.C. Phelps and G.D. Reid. It was decided that Reid should assume control of the Arctic Brotherhood Hall "collecting debts and paying off creditors as fast as possible." Reid also advised that the Hall should be offered for sale to the North Star Athletic Club for \$200. It was also agreed, "to induce this Club to purchase that those members present would subscribe \$50.00 each." 2 loose pages. 30 Apr 1903. 	1901-1903
COR 207	f2- f5	<p>Membership Applications</p> <p>- These 141 Arctic Brotherhood membership applications are arranged alphabetically by the surname of the applicant. The actual application for membership in Arctic Brotherhood Whitehorse Camp No. 12 is a 5" x 8" printed form that begins with the following sentences "I, the undersigned, believing myself to be bodily and mentally in good health,</p>	1901-1902

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		<p>respectfully apply for admission in the above named Camp. I have '<u>NOT</u>' been previously proposed for initiation in the Arctic Brotherhood and rejected." Space is provided for the applicant's age, birthplace, home address, occupation, and signature. Space is also provided for the date and signatures of three Arctic Brotherhood members who recommend the prospective candidate for initiation into the Camp. COR 207	f5A	<p>List of Members</p> <p>- Small record book that lists Arctic Brotherhood members by name, birthplace, occupation, type of membership, and age. May 1901 to Sep 1902.</p>	1901-1902
COR 207	f6	<p>Correspondence – Incoming and Outgoing</p> <p>- Handwritten letter from Dr. A.F. Edwards, Arctic Recorder of Camp Dawson No. 4 to the Arctic Recorder of Camp Whitehorse No. 12. States that he has not yet received the quarterly report for the term ending October 1. Requests other particulars about Camp Whitehorse as the records are rather meager and mentions what procedure should be followed with regard to the per capita tax. Comments on the prosperity of Camp Whitehorse and mentions that Dawson's "new hall will stampede on or about October 29." 2 pages. 18 Oct 1901.</p> <p>- Handwritten letter from G. Chealander, Recorder of the Provisional Grand Camp of the Arctic Brotherhood in Skagway to R.A Corbett, Recorder of the Whitehorse Camp No. 12. Informs him that he is sending under separate cover the 50 withdrawal cards as requested. States that neither the Proceedings of the Grand Camp nor the new constitution are printed as yet. 1 page. 21 Oct 1901.</p>	1901-1902

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		- Handwritten letter from G. Chealander, Arctic Recorder of Arctic Brotherhood Camp Skagway No. 1, to A.P. Drapes of Camp Whitehorse No. 12. A covering letter for the withdrawal card for P.W. Pennyfather. States that their by-laws are the same as those in force in Whitehorse and closes with Christmas / New Years best wishes. 1 page. 19 Dec 1901.	
		- Typed letter from J.H. Kelly, Secretary of the Arctic Brotherhood Historical Museum in Nome, Alaska to the Arctic Chief and Brothers of the Arctic Brotherhood in Bennett, B.C. Requests support and cooperation for the Historical Museum to be established as Arctic Brotherhood, Camp Nome No. 9. He describes the purpose of the museum, which is to collect and preserve "all articles and records of historical value to Alaska." He delineates just what this entails and says that in the past "wholesale quantities" of artifacts have been removed from Alaska and this should be stopped. He hopes various Arctic Brotherhood Camps will forward "all such articles to the Museum." 2 pages. 11 Feb 1902.	
		- Handwritten letter from Dr. A.F. Edwards, Arctic Recorder of the Arctic Brotherhood Camp Dawson No. 4, to the Arctic Recorder of Camp Whitehorse No. 12. States that sternwheeler excursion rates to Dawson will become effective on or about August 4, and trusts that the Whitehorse Camp will be well represented at the Grand Camp Meetings in Dawson which convene on August 6. 1 page. 9 Jul 1902.	
		- Handwritten letter from Dr. A.F. Edwards, Grand Arctic Recorder in Dawson to the Arctic Recorder of Whitehorse Camp No. 12. Requests that he send as soon as possible his quarterly reports for the terms ending April 1 and July 1, 1902. He also requests a list of the charter members, first officers, etc. of the Whitehorse Camp. 1 page. 19 Jul 1902.	
		- Copy of a transcript letter from the Arctic Recorder of Whitehorse Camp No. 12 to Grand Arctic Recorder, Dr. A.F. Edwards in Dawson in response to his of July 19, 1902. The letter as requested consists of a quarterly report for the term ending July 1. It enumerates the date Whitehorse camp was installed (May 22, 1901), the names	

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		and positions of its first officers, the names of its trustees, charter and affiliated members. 1 page. [1 Aug] 1902. - Copy of a transcript letter (statement) from the Arctic Recorder of Whitehorse Camp No. 12 to Dr. A.F. Edwards, Grand Arctic Recorder in Dawson in response to his of [July 19, 1902]. The letter consists of a statement of membership in Camp Whitehorse No. 12. Listed are the names of 77 members in good standing, 33 members holding clearance cards, and 44 delinquent members who have not paid their dues. 2 pages. 1 Aug 1902.	
COR 207	f7- f9	Financial Records - These assorted financial records are arranged chronologically in three folders. They consist of items such as invoices, vouchers, etc. in various amounts for goods purchased by and services rendered to Whitehorse Camp No. 12. Itemized paid bills from merchants and receipts in particular for loan payments predominate. The Camp received bills from numerous businesses and professional people: the following is a representative list – J. West & Co. Wholesale & Retail Liquor Vendors; P. Burns & Co.; Whitney & Pedlar; Whitehorse Star; Fred MacLennan Hardware Store; Pioneer Livery...Stable; F.J. Nicholson M.D.; Whitehorse General Hospital; Yukon Electrical Co.; R. 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COR 207	f11	<p>Constitution and By-laws</p> <p>- A booklet (page size 4"x6") printed in Dawson by the 'Daily Klondike Nugget'. The first 19 pages contain the Constitution of the Grand Camp of the Arctic Brotherhood; the remainder of the booklet is devoted to the Constitution and By-Laws of Subordinate Camps. Whitehorse Camp No. 12 as a subordinate Camp would be governed by these, which were adopted at the Annual Session August 6-8, 1902. 51 pages. 1902.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Grand Camp Constitution delineates such things as officers, their titles, duties, salary, etc.; rights and powers; revenue; quarterly reports; regalia and emblems; official seal; laws; meetings; disbursements; pass word; order of business; offenses; procedure; etc. • The Subordinate Camp Constitution enumerates the following: the object of the Camp membership; quorum; officers and their duties; committees and their duties; demit and affiliation; cards and visiting; fines and dues; bills; nominations and elections; installation; official seal, regalia, emblems; offenses; procedure; rules of order; etc. • The By-Laws consist of five Articles covering meetings; salaries of officers; bonds of officers; order of business and alterations and amendments. 	1902
