## Aubrey Simmons Polls Majority in Election

In the federal election held Monday, Aubrey Simmons, Liberal candidate of Whitehorse, polled a majority of 735 votes for member of parliament for the Yukon-Mackenzie riding. Matt Berry, Independent contestant from Yellowknife, had a total of 2240 as compared to the winning candidates 2975.

## To Rebuild New Mill at Mayo

According to a news item appearing in the Whitehorse Star last week, the United Keno Hill Mines Ltd. has al-

ready started construction of a new mill to replace the one that was recently destroyed by the fire.

The new mill will be of 600 tons capacity as compared to the former 175-ton mill.

It is understood that a number of company employees at the Calumet mine have been laid off as a result of the mill fire but there has been no big scale layoff as was anticipated.

## Yukon Candidate Was Able to Make Only Short Stay

Due to poor flying weather in southern Yukon last Wednesday, the C. P. A. plane which was bringing Matt Berry, Independent candidate for the Yukon-Mackenzie district and his agent John Parker to Dawson, was unable to make the northbound flight.

Messrs. Berry and Parker arrived the following morning, however, but as they had to catch the plane on its southbound flight from Fairbanks to Whitehorse that afternoon, they had only a short stay in Dawson.

Mr. Berry had planned on holding a meeting had he arrived Wednesday night and expressed his regrets at having to spend such a short time in Dawson in the interests of his candidacy.

However, both Matt and his agent Parker visited and chatted with as many Dawsonites and supporters as time allowed.

## Well Known Operator Of Gold Mines Dies

David Strandberg, 74, one of Alaska's most prominent gold mine operators, died suddenly in Anchorage last week following an illness of about three hours. He came to Alaska in the gold rush days, rushed over the Dyea trail, mined in the Klondike, Fairbanks and Iditarod districts, then to Anchorage where at the time of his sudden death he was interested with his sons in the Strandberg mine at Foger.

Surviving are the widow and four sons.

## Cpl. Clearwater and Family Leave Tuesday

Corporal and Mrs. Paul Clearwater and young daughter left on the CPA Tuesday en route to Edmonton where Paul has been transferred. Cpl. Clearwater has been officer in charge of the R. C. M. P. in Dawson for the past three years.

From Juneau it is reported that Dr. Warren J. Mead, head of the geological department of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will lead an expedition to study the general geology of the large area to be pierced in connection with the proposed \$300,000,000 aluminum plant at Skagway. The proposed tunnels would be from Lake Lindeman through the Chilkoot Pass vicinity to the Lynn Canal. It is unofficially reported that acreage in the vicinity of Skagway has been obtained as the plant site.

It is expected that the Vice-Regal Party will leave for Aklavik on the morning of July 5th.

## Bonnetplume Lake Still Frozen Over In Middle Summer

On his recent flight from Mayo to the Bonnetplume Lake, Pilot Pat Callison and the members of the prospecting party which he was flying in there were amazed to find the lake completely frozen over even this late in June.

The lake is 140 miles northeast of Mayo. It is 6 miles long and one mile wide.

Pilot Callison was flying "Scotty" McLeod, mining engineer and two other prospectors to the lake. McLeod, it is understood, is connected with the Karl Springer mining interests and also with the United Keno Hill Mines. He and his two companions had figured on making their base camp on Bonnetplume lake.

The well known local flier made the flight from Mayo to the lake in one hour and thirty minutes but was unable to land his float-equipped plane on the ice. As an alternative he flew the prospecting party to a small lake, 40 miles closer to Mayo where he was able to land. Pat will be returning there shortly to fly the mining men back to their original base camp at Bonnetplume Lake.

## New Airport Opened At Juneau Sunday

Another milestone in Alaska aviation was reached last Sunday when the beautiful new \$150,000 municipal airport terminal was officially opened at Juneau.

Opening of the modern, one-story building, built near Alaska's famed Mendenhall Glacier, marked completion of the first city-owned terminal in the Territory.

Pacific Northern Airlines, Alaska Coastal and Pan American World Airways are occupying space in the new building, along with customs, immigration and a restaurant.

An up-to-the-minute nursery, designed and furnished by the Women's Stationed Aeronautical Association of Juneau, has also been provided, for the convenience of travelling mothers and their children.

The 168 by 50 foot building is of concrete, finished in the interior with birch and knotty pine. It is located on the east side of the taxi strip.

## Live Through Four Day Raft Ordeal

VANCOUVER.—A daring attempt to reach civilization by a raft trip across 30 miles of Pacific Ocean was related last night in a radio-telephone interview with three survivors of a fishing mishap.

Three Indian fishermen, Wilson Walla, Abel Dickson and Louis Watkus of the two gillnetters J. W. and W. N., were shipwrecked by a savage northwester gale off the northern tip of Vancouver Island.

They are recovering at Hardy Bay on the northern tip of the island. The men set out to fish salmon, when they were blown on Triangle Island about 30 miles off course. The island lies 30 miles north of Vancouver Island's tip.

The survivors said they managed to get through the huge waves to shore with a bit of food and spent three days waiting to be rescued.

"On the third day we knew we soon would be out of grub and wondered if we had been missed," they related.

The sea had calmed, however, and they improvised two rafts to try to get back to the mainland.

"We left Triangle six days after we had landed and were out of grub. Because of the choppy seas, we found it almost impossible to paddle the rafts. It was impossible to maintain course."

They said they realized the fourth day out they were heading out to sea. The next day the trawler Surf Point, one of the search vessels, found them and brought them to Hardy Bay. The men are not in serious condition.

## Rain and More Rain in Dawson

Rain and more rain continues to be the weather menu around these parts with hardly a day or night going by without the usual downpour or prolonged shower.

The wet summer to date has greatly retarded the growth of local garden crops.

**Springer Interests Enter Atlin Field**

Virgin ground on Spruce Creek, Atlin district of British Columbia, scene of highly profitable placer operations dating back to 1900, has been acquired by Transcontinental Resources Ltd. and associates including the Karl Springer interests. The property will be placed on production this season, announces W. Binney Milner, Vancouver, president of Transcontinental Resources Ltd.

The newly-acquired ground represents a three-mile continuation of the old Tertiary channel. The new operation is based on the expectation that pay gravel will be found to extend upstream under similar conditions as have prevailed for the previous three miles. This view is strongly supported by C. H. E. Stewart, mining engineer. After an extensive study on the ground last summer, Mr. Stewart reported that the pay channel has been highly productive for a distance of 12,000 to 13,000 feet downstream. He said that indications that it would extend upstream through the entire length of the property to be acquired by purchase (7000 feet) or for the

major portion thereof, were rated as excellent.

Transcontinental Resources Ltd. has completed an agreement with John W. Noland for outright purchase of 17 placers claims covering 7000 feet of unworked channel for \$250,000. Staking of additional claims protect the strike of the channel for more than three miles.

Mr. Milner advises that plans have been made for immediate rehabilitation of the camp and underground workings of the Noland Mine, for which the new campaign will start. A 50-man crew under experienced management will be sent to the property at once. Production will be carried out through existing shafts simultaneously with exploration drives upstream to explore and block out the pay streak in virgin ground. He states the operation will be fully mechanized.

Mr. Stewart reported that the gold is exceptionally coarse and that recovery presented no problem. Large nuggets up to 20 ounces were common, the report said. Shafts and underground workings are in good condition. An adequate all-year water supply is available to handle 100 to 150 cubic yards daily. The engineer describes the mining method as simple resembling present day coal mining operations. While the easily accessible gravels downstream were mined in the early days at enormous profits, he said it became necessary upstream, due to thickness of overburden, to adopt underground mining methods.

These up-channel operations have also been highly profitable, according to available records. Incomplete data show production on the lower section of the creek prior to 1940 to have totalled \$12,000,000 for an average recovery of \$13.00 per cubic yard mined. Mr. Stewart describes the pay streak as "remarkably straight and persistent."

The record shows that Columbia Development Co. Ltd. from 25 percent of gross production, paid Mr. Noland an agreed price of \$125,000 within 3 years of taking a six-year lease on a 2,000-foot length of the channel in 1940. However, due to wartime manpower scarcity this company was able to mine only 1600 feet of the channel and their lease terminated. From a total of 68,054 cubic yards of gravel mined, this company recovered 37,791 ounces, worth \$1,163,428, an average

of \$17.09 per cubic yard. Average value per ounce was \$30.78.

This recovery equalled \$735 per lineal foot of channel mined.

Under the methods then followed, operating cost was between \$8.00 and \$9.00 per cubic yard. Mr. Stewart estimates that by mechanising and expanding the operation, cost should be cut to \$6.50 per cubic yard.

If values persist for the next 6500 feet of unworked channel on about the same basis, Mr. Stewart estimates the ground upstream would have a production potential of \$4,725,000. He points out there is no way to determine this by testing without excessive cost for closely spaced churning drilling which would indicate presence of the Tertiary gravel bed but would not give a reliable indication of values. In view of the values found in the Noland workings every indication that they will be found to persist, he recommends that development drives be advanced and the upstream channel explored with gold recovery expected to more than cover all costs.

Spruce Creek is reached by 12 miles of all-weather road from Atlin. The new highway being built from Atlin to connect Carcross on the White Pass and Yukon Railroad will reduce the freight rate and facilitate operations.

**Mauling by Cougar Fatal to Indian Boy**

VANCOUVER.—A seven-year-old Indian boy, mauled Saturday by a vicious cougar, died last night at the small Indian village of Kyuquot, B. C., 217 miles northwest of Vancouver.

Today a hunt will start for the beast which slashed to shreds the face of the victim, son of fisherman Dominic Taylor.

Scanty reports received from Kyuquot said the lad was mauled before witnesses.

**\$100,000 Is Loss In Quebec Blaze**

DRUMMONDVILLE, Quebec.—Fire destroyed Saturday the Goudreau dry cleaning plant with loss estimated at \$100,000.

Caused by an explosion in a pressure tank, the fire spread rapidly through the two-storey building.

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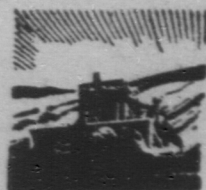

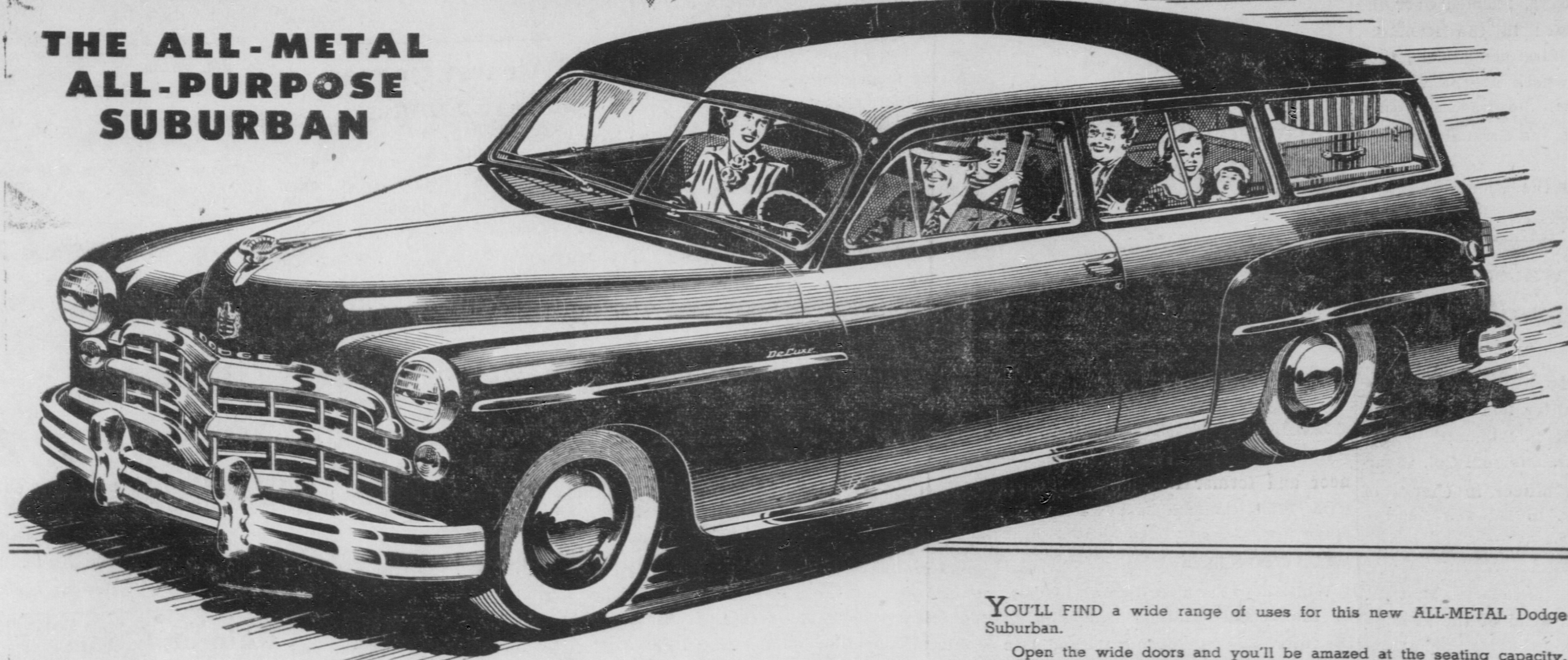

### Skagway Pioneer Passes Away

SKAGWAY, Alaska.—William John Mulvihill, 76, pioneer and railroader of Alaska, passed away Sunday afternoon as the result of a heart attack.

Mulvihill came to Alaska in 1900 after serving in various prominent capacities with the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific, Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Canadian Pacific.

Immediately upon arrival at Skagway he became dispatcher and trainmaster on the White Pass and Yukon Route, remaining in such position until he retired in 1942. During his long residence in Skagway he was mayor for 20 years and was one of the Gateway City's most prominent and respected citizens.

Survivors are his widow, whom he married in June, 1894 two daughters, three sons and several grandchildren.



### Heavy Assay Gold Yielded in S. A.

JOHANNESBURG.—Gold assaying 271 inch pennyweights has been brought up from a fifth deflection of the borehole on Erdedeel farm in the Orange Free State, site of the sensational gold strike of June 3rd, it was officially announced last night. A one-inch pennyweight is the standard measurement of gold arrived at by multiplying the width of a reef in inches by its yield valued in pennyweights for each ton. A pennyweight is 1/20 of a troy ounce.



### Synopsis of Mining Law Yukon Territory

Any person eighteen years of age or over shall have the right to enter, locate, prospect and mine upon any lands in the Yukon Territory, whether vested in the Crown or otherwise, for the minerals defined in the Yukon Quartz Mining Act and the Yukon Placer Mining Act, with certain reservations set out in the said Act.

No person shall enter for mining purposes or shall mine upon lands owned or lawfully occupied by another until adequate security has been furnished to the satisfaction of the Mining Recorder for any loss or damage which may be thereby caused.

Where claims are being located which are situated more than one hundred miles from the Mining Recorder's office, the locators, not less than five in number, are authorized to meet and appoint one of their number as emergency Recorder, who shall as soon as possible, deliver the applications and fees received to the Mining Recorder for the District.

If two or more persons own a claim each person shall contribute proportionately to his interest to the work required to be done thereon, and when proven to the Mining Recorder that he has not done so his interest may be vested in the other co-owners.

The survey of a claim made by a duly qualified Dominion Land Surveyor shall be accepted as defining absolutely the boundaries of the claim surveyed, provided the survey is approved by the proper authority and remains unprotested during the period of advertisement.

A person about to undertake a bona fide prospecting trip may secure from the Mining Recorder written permission to record at his own risk a placer claim within six months.

A legal post must stand four feet above the ground, squared or faced for the upper eighteen inches and measuring four inches across the faced portion. The post must be firmly fixed in the ground.

Metal tags to be obtained from Mining Recorder and affixed to claim posts. (Placer and Quartz.)

Priority of location shall be deemed to convey priority of right. Certain disputes may be heard and determined by a Board of Arbitrators.

Grants of claims grouped or owned by one person may be made renewable on the same date.

#### PLACER MINING

Creek means any natural water course having an average width of less than one hundred and fifty feet between its banks.

Creek claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length measured along the base line, by one thousand feet on each side of the base line. Other claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length by one thousand feet in depth. Claims shall be nearly as possible rectangular in form and shall be marked by two legal posts, one at each end of the claim, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. Location posts of creek claims shall be placed on the base line and of all other claims parallel to the base line, and on the side of the claim nearest the creek or river toward which it fronts.

A discoverer shall be entitled to a claim 1,500 feet in length, and a party of two discoverers two claims, each of 1,250 feet in length.

The boundaries of any claim may be enlarged to the size of a claim allowed by the Act, if the enlargement does not interfere with the rights of other persons or terms of any agreement with the Crown.

An application for a claim may be filed with the Mining Recorder within ten days after being located if within ten miles of the Recorder's Office. One extra day shall be allowed

for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof. A claim may be located on Sunday or any public holiday.

Any person having recorded a claim shall not have the right to locate another claim in the valley or basin of same creek within sixty days of locating first claim.

For provisions as to staking under powers of attorney see Act.

#### Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with respect to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to a grant for one year and shall have the absolute right of renewal from year to year thereafter, provided during each year he does or causes to be done \$200.00 worth of work on the claim, files with the Mining Recorder within fourteen days after the expiration of the claim an affidavit showing a detailed statement of the work, and pays the required renewal fee.

Provision for applying excess representation work up to a value of \$800.00. Must be recorded during year in which it is performed.

#### Grouping

Under certain conditions claims may be grouped and the work required to be performed to entitle the owner or owners to renewals of the several claims grouped may be performed on any one or more of the claims in the grouping.

#### Taxes and Fees

Royalty at the rate of two and one-half per cent on the value of all gold shipped from the Yukon Territory shall be paid to the Commissioner.

#### QUARTZ MINING

Subject to the boundaries of other claims in good standing at the time of its location, a mining claim shall be rectangular in shape and shall not exceed 1,500 feet in length by 1,500 feet in width.

Every claim shall be marked on the ground by two legal posts, one at each extremity of the location line numbered "1" and "2" respectively. On the side of No. 1 post facing No. 2 post shall be inscribed the name of the claim, a letter indicating the direction to No. 2 post, the number of feet to the right or left of the location line, the date of location and the name of the locator. On No. 2 post, on the side facing No. 1 post, shall be inscribed the name of the claim, the date of location and the name of the locator.

The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of the Mining Recorder's office; one additional day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof.

Any persons 18 years of age or over may locate during any period of 12 months personally, as attorney for another or by an attorney seven mineral claims in the aggregate within a distance of 10 miles from any other mineral claim (making a total of 8 mineral claims) so located by him during that period.

Power of Attorney must be filed with Mining Recorder before staking.

The timber on a mineral claim reserved until the Mining Recorder certifies that the same is required use in mining operations on the

claim. The Commissioner, however, may issue a permit to holders of other claims to remove the timber for use in their mining operations where other timber is not readily available.

#### Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of this Act with regard to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to hold it for one year from the date of the record, and thereafter from year to year provided during each year he does or causes to be done work on the claim to the value of \$100.00 and shall, within fourteen days after the expiration of the year, satisfy the Mining Recorder that the work has been done, and pay the Certificate of work fee. One hundred dollars may be paid in lieu of assessment work.

Provision of applying excess representation work up to a value of \$400.00. Must be performed during year in which it is performed.

When \$500.00 has been expended or paid the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, obtain a lease for a term of twenty-one years, with the right of renewal for further terms of twenty-one years.

Leases, renewals of leases, and documents relating to leased claims shall be recorded with the Mining Recorder in triplicate.

#### Dredging

A lease may be issued for a period of fifteen years for a continuous stretch of river not exceeding ten miles in length giving the exclusive right to dredge for gold, silver and platinum. The lessee must have at least one dredge in operation on the leasehold within three years.

#### Petroleum and Natural Gas

A lease may be issued for a period of twenty-one years for an area of not to exceed 2,560 acres giving the right to the petroleum and natural gas on the area leased. A rental is charged of 50 cents per acre for the first year and \$1.00 per acre for each subsequent year.

#### Assay Office

An Assay Office is maintained by the Government at Vancouver, where gold exported from the Territory will be purchased at its full value.
