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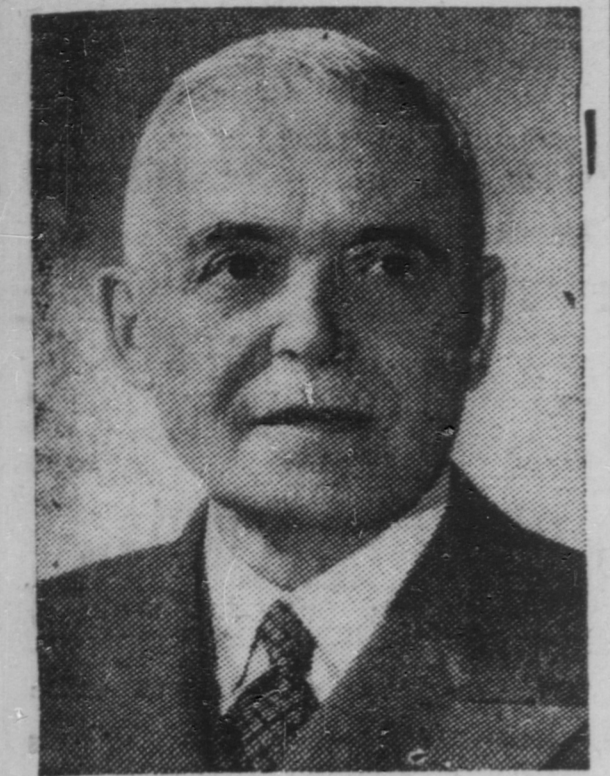

OTTAWA.—Prime Minister St. Laurent told the Commons Saturday he believes that "in time" the Northwest Territories and the Yukon will acquire provincial status.

The prime minister made the statement as he put through a bill a-

George Murray (L. Cariboo) said he would like to see the Northwest Territories and the Yukon also represented.

"I think in time they will be added," said the prime minister, "because I think, in time, they will probably acquire provincial status."

**John Hart Highway To Open Sept. 1st**

**WILLIAMS LAKE.**—Whitehorse citizens will be able to drive to Prince George and Vancouver via a West Coast route for the first time in history after the first of September.

Hon E. C. Carson, Minister of Public Works, who is travelling with the Vancouver Board of Trade on its annual good will tour, told a Williams Lake Board of Trade here that B. C.'s long-awaited John Hart Highway will be open by September 15 at the latest, his department hopes.

This road will link Prince George in the geographical centre of B. C. with Dawson Creek, the start of the Alaska Highway, and has been the dream of the Pacific Coast pioneers for years.

A nine-mile stretch in the centre of the 300-odd mile highway is now nearing completion, and when this is finished it will mean Vancouverites can drive up the Cariboo Highway to Prince George, thence northeast to Dawson Creek and finally along the finely engineered Alaska Highway to Alaska.

Previously Alaska traffic, and there are many tons of it moving daily, had to go through Edmonton and was there railed out along a single track line that skirts the lesser Slave Lake and on hundreds of miles to Dawson Creek on the B. C. side of the boundary.

**New Life For Iron Ore Deposits**

**LONDON.**—(BUP).—The brain child of a 61-year-old consulting engineer may give an extended lease of life to America's dwindling Mesabi iron-ore deposits.

Gilbert Chisolm claims his multi-

cone double cyclone concentrator can mean more years productivity for the Minnesota iron-ore ranges. He says his method of economical recovery of iron-ore from low-grade ore is being investigated by a subsidiary of the United States Steel Corp.

Chisolm says mills had been losing 40 per cent of the iron content of the ore they processed, and he believed his machine would redeem 90 per cent of that loss. He claims it also will work on gold, uraninite, lead and copper.

The inventor says the concentrator provides a satisfactory method for separating low-grade taconite and hundreds of millions of tons of tailings, a fine ore long discarded by the mills. He says Ronald J. Morton, of Duluth, Minn., is conducting the investigation for the Oliver Mining Co., a subdivision of U. S. Steel.

**Dawson Road, Rough, Dusty But Scenic**

**FAIRBANKS.**—Returning from an inspection tour that took him as far as Dawson, Ken Goodson, district engineer with the Alaska road commission, reports that the 386 mile road now open as "rough, dusty and beautiful."

A two-car party, consisting of Goodson, Col. Lane, commissioner of the Canadian northwest highway commission; Lt. Col. Earl Hamilton, U. S. Army Transportation Corps and Col. John R. Noyes, Alaska Commissioner of Roads, left Tok Junction last Wednesday morning and arrived at Dawson that afternoon, ferrying across the Yukon into the old pictorial gold capital.

Eight gold dredges are working in the vicinity of Dawson, said Goodson, and the town is prosperous despite a drop in population of from 35,000 people in 1906 to 850 now.

Beautifully situated in the confluence of the Yukon and Klondike rivers, Dawson has ample hotel space and plenty of good and reasonable food to take care of the Fairbanks Caval-

**Turks Seek Arms For Iran 'War'**

**WASHINGTON.**—Turkish officials are putting the heat on U. S. for more guns and munitions.

They argue that major fighting will break out in Iran by September 1.

Requests for the guns and shells have been made on an informal basis thus far. A state department spokesman said officially his agency had no bid from the Turks for additional help and no knowledge of any impending crisis.

But top military sources insist the Turks are badly worried and are willing to accept any weapon which will shoot. Intelligence reports say the Turks are now training some soldiers with wooden guns, despite the many millions of dollars given the country by the U. S. in the last five years.

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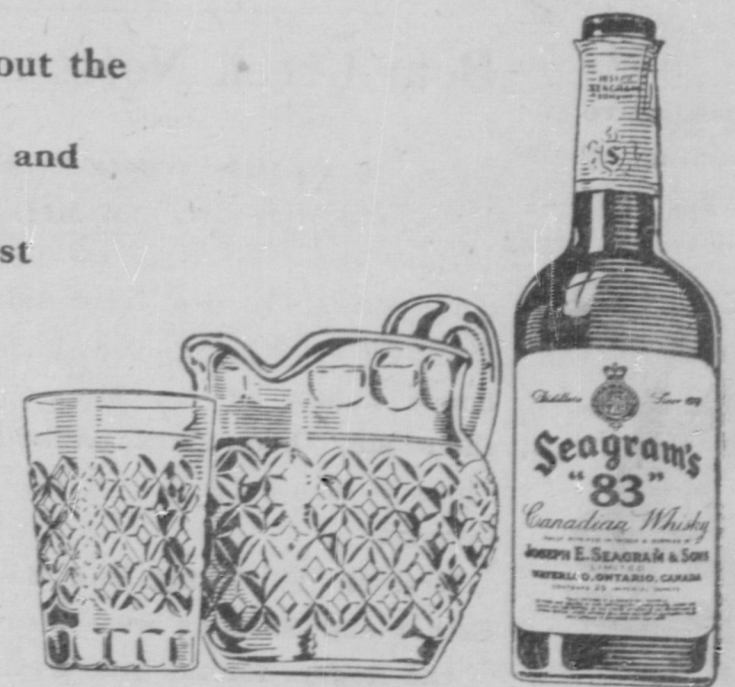

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**Mackeno Increases Development Work**

(Whitehorse Star)  
 Pace of the underground program being carried out in the MacLeod adit and the Slim adit at the Mayo district, Yukon property of Mackeno Mines has been stepped up in recent weeks, the company reports. Combined advance in both headings is now averaging around 100 feet per week, and to June 7th, total drifting amounts to 1,466 ft. Of the total 655 feet has been completed in the MacLeod adit which is being driven to establish a second level below the old 100-foot level opened by the MacLeod shaft, while 831 feet is in the same adit which is a long crosscut that eventually will open a third level below the MacLeod workings.  
 Portal to the MacLeod adit is approximately 930 feet northeast along projected strike of the main zone from the old shaft. Considerable faulting has been encountered in the drilling and, as yet, the drive has still to locate the extension of the zone. However, an underground diamond drill has arrived at the property and will be used to fan out a series of holes to locate the main vein area.  
 Surface exploration has been started and currently consists of cleaning out a number of pits put down by former operators along the zone. A grab sample from pit "H", about 85 feet northeast of the shaft has assayed 38 oz. silver and 15.12 per cent lead. Pit "G" is located 110 feet northeast of the shaft with a grab sample from it returning 4.0 oz. silver and trace in lead. About 240 feet northeast of the shaft, a grab sample assaying 125 oz. silver and 23.76 per cent lead has been obtained from "D". About 40 feet east of pit "H" a grab sample from pit "J" has assayed 106 oz. silver and 21.6 percent lead. The latter pit is about 30 feet off the line of strike of other pits and officials believe it may be locat-



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ed on a parallel structure. A bulldozer is being used to clean out the pits for channel sampling.

**Contents of Locked Safe Staggering**

SEATTLE.—(BUP).—Two Seattle men own what is probably the most expensive jug of whiskey in existence—that is if it is still in existence.  
 Jerry Oaksmith and A. L. Rogers bought the Scow Bay Packing Company of Scow Bay, Alaska, and among the concern's assets was a locked safe.  
 They were unable to find anyone in the territory to "crack it" so they shipped the old safe to Seattle aboard a steamship. Meanwhile, rumors spread that the safe contained a fortune in gold.  
 When the safe reached here Wednesday two locksmiths were waiting on the pier along with federal attorney John Dore and the company's attorney, Bradley Delton. Everyone held his breath as the locksmiths drilled the safe and manipulated the tumblers.  
 When the heavy safe door swung

**Arthritis Drug To Be Cheaper**

NEW YORK.—Development of a new and cheaper synthetic cortisone which will meet the needs of the entire U. S. was announced Friday.  
 In natural form, cortisone is an adrenal gland hormone. It has been used in treatment of arthritis. It has been a boon, too, in dealing with critical burns, alcoholism, some forms of cancer and other ailments.  
 Until recently cortisone, produced from ox bile, has been in scarce supply, and has cost doctors \$30 a gram.  
 But Dr. I. V. Sollins of the Chemical Specialties Co., U. S. branch of Syntex Inc., a Mexican firm, announced cortisone now has been produced successfully from the rot of the Mexican wild yam.  
 "The new process will eliminate ne-

cessity of depending on limited animal materials for sources of supply", Dr. Sollins said.

"It is simpler than any other method. It should make cortisone available in larger quantities to patients at a price certainly no greater than the current prices and perhaps significantly less."

The yam cortisone was developed by 10 syntex chemists, all but one of them under 30, and nine of them Mexican citizens, said Dr. Sollins.

**SYNOPSIS OF MINING LAW YUKON TERRITORY**

Any person eighteen years of age or over shall have the right to enter, locate, prospect and mine upon any lands in the Yukon Territory, whether vested in the Crown or otherwise, for the minerals defined in the Yukon Quartz Mining Act and the Yukon Placer Mining Act, with certain reservations set out in the said Act.

No person shall enter for mining purposes or shall mine upon lands owned or lawfully occupied by another until adequate security has been furnished to the satisfaction of the Mining Recorder for any loss or damage which may be thereby caused.

Where claims are being located which are situated more than one hundred miles from the Mining Recorder's office, the locators, not less than five in number, are authorized to meet and appoint one of their number as emergency Recorder, who shall as soon as possible, deliver the applications and fees received to the Mining Recorder for the District.

If two or more persons own a claim each person shall contribute proportionately to his interest to the work required to be done thereon, and when proven to the Mining Recorder that he has not done so his interest may be vested in the other co-owners.

The survey of a claim made by a duly qualified Dominion Land Surveyor or shall be accepted as defining absolutely the boundaries of the claim surveyed, provided the survey is approved by the proper authority and remains unprotested during the period of advertisement.

A person about to undertake a bona fide prospecting trip may secure from the Mining Recorder written permission to record at his own risk a placer claim within six months.

A legal post must stand four feet above the ground, squared or faced for the upper eighteen inches and measuring four inches across the faced portion. The post must be firmly fixed in the ground.

Metal tags to be obtained from Mining Recorder and affixed to claim posts. (Placer and Quartz.)

Priority of location shall be deemed to convey priority of right. Certain disputes may be heard and determined by a Board of Arbitrators.

Grants of claims grouped or owned by one person may be made renewable on the same date.

**PLACER MINING**

Creek means any natural water course having an average width of less than one hundred and fifty feet between its banks.

Creek claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length measured along the base line, by one thousand feet on each side of the base line. Other claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length by one thousand feet in depth. Claims shall be nearly as possible rectangular in form and shall be marked by two legal posts, one at each end of the claim, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. Location posts of creek claims shall be placed on the base line and of all other claims parallel to the base line, and on the side of the claim nearest the creek or river toward which it fronts.

A discoverer shall be entitled to a claim 1,500 feet in length, and a party of two discoverers two claims, each of 1,250 feet in length.  
 The boundaries of any claim may be enlarged to the size of a claim allowed by the Act, if the enlargement does not interfere with the rights of other persons or terms of any agreement with the Crown.

An application for a claim may be filed with the Mining Recorder within ten days after being located if within ten miles of the Recorder's Office. One extra day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof. A claim may be located on Sunday or any public holiday.

Any person having recorded a claim shall not have the right to locate another claim in the valley or basin of same creek within sixty days of locating first claim.

For provisions as to staking under powers of attorney see Act.

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with respect to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to a grant for one year and shall have the absolute right of renewal from year to year thereafter, provided during each year he does or causes to be done \$200.00 worth of work on the claim, files with the Mining Recorder within fourteen days after the expiration of the claim an affidavit showing a detailed statement of the work, and pays the required renewal fee.

Provision for applying excess representation work up to a value of \$200.00. Must be recorded during year in which it is performed.

**Grouping**  
 Under certain conditions claims may be grouped and the work required to be performed to entitle the owner or owners to renewals of the several claims grouped may be performed on any one or more of the claims in the grouping.

**Taxes and Fees**  
 Royalty at the rate of two and one-half per cent on the value of all gold shipped from the Yukon Territory shall be paid to the Commissioner.

**QUARTZ MINING**

Subject to the boundaries of other claims in good standing at the time of its location, a mining claim shall be rectangular in shape and shall not exceed 1,500 feet in length by 1,500 feet in width.

Every claim shall be marked on the ground by two legal posts, one at each extremity of the location line numbered "1" and "2" respectively. On the side of No. 1 post facing No. 2 post shall be inscribed the name of the claim, a letter indicating the direction to No. 2 post, the number of feet to the right or left of the location line, the date of location and the name of the locator. On No. 2 post, on the side facing No. 1 post, shall be inscribed the name of the claim, the date of location and the name of the locator.

The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of the Mining Recorder's office; one additional day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof.

Any persons 18 years of age or over may locate during any period of 12 months personally, as attorney for another or by an attorney seven mineral claims in the aggregate within a distance of 10 miles from any other mineral claim (making a total of 8 mineral claims) so located by him during that period.

Power of Attorney must be filed with Mining Recorder before staking.

The timber on a mineral claim is reserved until the Mining Recorder certifies that the same is required for use in mining operations on the claim. The Commissioner however, may issue a permit to holders of other claims to remove the timber for use in their mining operations where other timber is not readily available.

**Title**

Any person having complied with the provisions of this Act with regard to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to hold it for one year from the date of the record, and thereafter from year to year provided during each year he does or causes to be done work on the claim to the value of \$100.00 and shall, within fourteen days after the expiration of the year, satisfy the Mining Recorder that the work has been done, and pay the Certificate of work fee. One hundred dollars may be paid in lieu of assessment work.

Provision of applying excess representation work up to a value of \$400.00. Must be performed during year in which it is performed.

When \$500.00 has been expended or paid the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, obtain a lease for a term of twenty-one years, with the right of renewal for further terms of twenty-one years.

Leases, renewals of leases, and documents relating to leased claims shall be recorded with the Mining Recorder in triplicate.

**Dredging**  
 A lease may be issued for a period of fifteen years for a continuous stretch of river not exceeding ten miles in length giving the exclusive right to dredge for gold, silver and platinum. The lessee must have at least one dredge in operation on the leasehold within three years.

**Petroleum and Natural Gas**  
 A lease may be issued for a period of twenty-one years for an area of not to exceed 2,560 acres giving the right to the petroleum and natural gas on the area leased. A rental is charged of 50 cents per acre for the first year and \$1.00 per acre for each subsequent year.

**Assay Office**  
 An Assay Office is maintained by the Government at Vancouver, where gold exported from the Territory will be purchased at its full value.

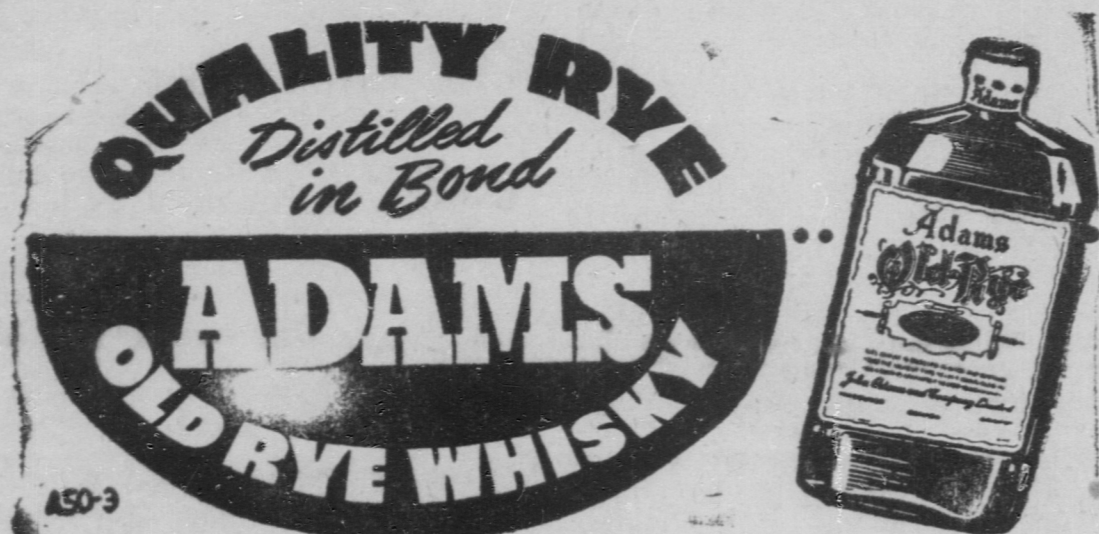
