## FIGHT TO BITTER END LOOMS IN SPANISH CIVIL WAR AS CASUALTIES MOUNT HIGH

SPAIN, Aug. 6:- Losses in the Spanish civil war are greatest since the Russian revolt.

There is little change in the situation as rebels and loyalist troops continue to engage in fierce fighting. Indications are that the struggle will continue until arms and ammunition supplies are exhausted.

Both Germany and America have sent notes of warning to the respective factions demanding that property rights be respected.

Plans are being drawn up by the major powers in an effort to restore peace in Spain.

## UNCLE SAM'S ATHLETES STEAL OLYMPIC SHOW

BERLIN, Aug. 6: Up to to-nite Canada had failed to place in any of the Olympic contests. The United States is assured of the Olympics championship for this year with a total of 153 points to date. Nine world's records have been shattered so far with Uncle Sam's athletes leading the parade of broken records. Germany is in second place with 54 $\frac{3}{4}$  points, Finland third, Japan fourth in the official standing.

Jack Lovelock of New Zealand shattered the world record in the 1600 metres Thursday, an American ace broke the record for the 110 yards hurdles, a Japanese star shattered the hop-step and jump mark.

110,000 witnessed the games on the opening day. Jesse Owens, U. S. A. colored sprint ace, has proved the outstanding athlete of the games, winning both the 100 metres and the broad jump. He looms as a triple winner after the 220 metres. Helen Stephens, diminutive Missouri farm-miss, captured the women's 100 metres for the States beating Stella Walsh, Polish title-holder. Owens leap in the broad jump was 26ft. 5 - 21 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches.

On a holiday and vacation trip through the Yukon, J. P. Smith, K. C., prominent Yukon barrister, reached Mayo by plane Thursday and is staying over here until Tuesday when he plans to fly to Dawson.

8 Granted Naturalization Papers. Divorce Hearing  
Concluded in Dawson. Other Judgements Awarded.

Eight residents of Mayo District were granted naturalization papers, balance of the hearing in the divorce action was transferred to Dawson and several judgements were handed down in civil cases as the result of the recent sitting in Mayo of the Territorial Court of Yukon Territory.

Hon. Justice C. D. Macaulay presided over the court session which opened 2 p.m. Wednesday in Pioneer Hall and concluded Thursday. H. G. Blankman, Clerk of the Court, transcribed the evidence and assisted Judge Macaulay. The court was opened by Corporal L. F. Fielder of the Mayo Post, RCMP.

Eight residents of Mayo District whose applications for naturalization were approved included: George H. Miller, C. E. Fisher, Orla Christoffersen, Frank Krenn, John Vanicola, Leon B. Erickson, Olie Ostenstead and Thor Skonseng.

After evidence had been taken from Mike Tomoff, Const. C. Gray, Peter Jensen and Mrs Tamar Parker, the hearing in the divorce action between Mike Tomoff vs Marie Tomoff was adjourned. Balance of the evidence will be heard in Dawson to permit the Petitioner to produce certified copy of marriage certificate and proof of officiating magistrate's authority.

Judgement of \$24.75 and costs was handed down in favour of the plaintiff in the case of Tomoff vs. Mrs. Ada Graves.

**"BIG BILL" DRURY, LAST OF THE KLONDIKE STAMPEDERS, HITS DAWSON AFTER 38 YEARS' ON THE WAY. STARTED FOR THE FAMOUS GOLDFIELDS IN FALL OF '98.**

Co-Founder of Taylor & Drury Firm Reveals Sensation While On Business Trip to Mayo.

Now it can be told.

The last ninety-eighter has hit Dawson. The last stamper has made the home port. The last member of that famous, colorful band of gold seekers who crossed the Chilkoot trail of '98, headed for the Klondike, has checked in.

Thirty eight years after. Just a few weeks before Dawson celebrates its 40th. Anniversary of the finding of gold on Bonanza, along comes "Bill Bill" Drury to claim the startling, unique distinction of being the last of the stampeders to arrive.

Mr. Drury visited Dawson on July 28. He didn't arrive in a small boat as he had planned to do "way back when." He landed in the trim, fuel-driven steamer the Yukon Rose in which he is co-owner. He didn't arrive wild-eyed, uninitiated, broke - looking for the pot of gold at the rainbow's end. He arrived with 38 years' of Yukon experience behind him, 38 years of successful business venture behind him, \$38,000 in his wallet for all we know.

The point is Bill Drury, stamper of '98, the last of the '98 stampeders has finally hit old Dawson.

"I had a great time talking over old days with tillicums of the trail," Mr. Drury told us. "Yes, I was the last of the stampeders to check in."

He said it all so quietly, so casually, that it took us some little time to realize the significance of the event. Thirty-eight years is a long, long time - to be on the way.

It all happened this way. Bill Drury, young, husky, adventuresome, started for the Klondike. He crossed the Chilkoot trail in the fall but, instead of continuing on to the Klondike drifted into Atlin. There he and his present-day partner Isaac Taylor started the firm of Taylor & Drury. To-day that firm is the largest individual mercantile firm in the Yukon Territory with branches and trading posts in every corner of the country.

The partnership thrived, business expanded. Partner Drury had no time to look for gold in the Klondike creeks. The gold of the North was closer to home for the big, easy-going, slow-spoken Bill

and his partner.

For the past quarter of a century he has played an active and prominent part in the destinies of the Yukon's greatest trading firm.

"The greatest fur buyer in the North country," is what those who know say about him.

It used to be that Bill Drury made his fur-buying expeditions into the Yukon outposts by dog team. But those days are gone forever. He still makes those long trips but all by air now. If a plane is reported missing and Bill Drury is known to be on it - no concern is felt over the safety of pilot or passenger.

"Bill Drury's out buying fur," the wise ones will tell you. "Sitting around some camp-fire smoking a pipe of peace with some Indian chief: That's the way the pioneer Yukon trader buys fur. He knows the Indians as his friends - he talks business in their own language.

Outside his business interests he has many others. The town of Whitehorse would be lost without its "Big Bill" Drury. He has taken an active part in the growth of the Yukon's solid little Gateway town. He is one of the chief stockholders of the newspaper, he has served on many committees, has lent his support to many worthwhile enterprises. But it took Bill 38 years to reach old Dawson.

He slid in there quietly, unostentatiously, looked over the famous old gold metropolis and then came on to Mayo to spend several days here looking over the progress of the firm's Mayo store. It was his first visit here in 12 years.

The silver camp was good then.

"It looks every bit as good right now," he affirms.

When the Yukon Rose sailed early to-day Sourdough Drury was a passenger on his "way home"

Where business is exceptionally good this season, he says.

Yep. "Big Bill" Drury has gone back to Whitehorse. He made a tour of Keno and Galena Hills Monday with Charley Taylor, his partner's son. He was greatly enthused over all the activity which he saw going on in Mayo silver camp.

But we'd like to bet that the genial mercantiler and trader has gone home with many happy memories of his first trip to the Klondike - with many visions of what might have been had destiny not altered his original, course - 38 years ago.

WORK OF BUILDING LANDING FIELD AND BRIDGES OVER PARTRIDGE CK. AND MCQUESTEN WILL TAKE 2 MONTHS.

Equipment and Supplies Taken Up River From Dawson.

Under the supervision of Jas. H. McNeill, Sup't. of Public Works for Yukon, work has been started on the new airplane landing field at Partridge Creek, just below the mouth of the McQuesten river. The Gov't. crew came up the Stewart on the last trip of the Keno last week. Members of the crew include Sam Woods, Ed. Kunze and Joe Hoyne. Sam is the foreman.

In addition to the landing field work, the Gov't. crew will also erect 2 bridges, one over Partridge Ck. the other across the McQuesten. Girders for these bridges were recently shipped to those points from Dawson. Also a plow and other necessary equipment. It is understood that a "cat", already at the McQuesten will be utilized.

After getting this work under way, Mr. McNeill plans to come on to Mayo. It is estimated that the work of building the landing field and erecting the bridges will take in the neighborhood of 2 months to finish.

Although a large quantity of supplies accompanied the Gov't. crew there was no cook in sight.

## MRS. GEORGE BLACK, M. P. GIVES INTERESTING INTERVIEW TO DAWSON NEWS

The following article, which will undoubtedly prove of interest to scores of Mayoites, is re-printed from a recent issue of The DAWSON NEWS.

MRS. BLACK  
RETURNS TO  
THE YUKON

Mrs. George Black, M. P., wife of Captain George Black, former speaker of the House, returned on the steamer Aksala.

Mrs. George Black, M.P., when interviewed by the representative of the Dawson News, said in part: (She said):

It is a great pleasure for me to be at home, that is what Dawson has been to me ever since I came in over the trail of '98. Going to Ottawa during Parliamentary session was no novelty to me but to go as your member was a vastly different matter. However, I received a most cordial and kindly greeting from former friends and acquaintances both Liberal and Conservative.

As I have kept a diary now for over 38 years, it is easy for me to refresh my mind on even rather minor matters.

While the House did not open until the afternoon of Feb. 6, yet the new government had been busy from the early days of December. Owing to legislation passed by the former government it was not necessary to have by-elections on the appointment of ministers who had not been elected as members of the cabinet.

Very early in the New Year, Jan. 9, 13, 16 and 20, and from then on, at least twice weekly, there were occasions for me to visit the different departments, Interior, State, Pensions and Health, Postoffice, Labor and Public Works. Many of these visits were in response to requests made by people from Yukon and others from British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec and even Nova Scotia. It was most surprising to me how many letters commenced, "When George Black was a Member he helped me and I hope you will do the same."

Election Promises

After the election was over and I was on my way to the coast, I made a list of my pre-election promises.

First, it would be my duty during my first speech on the floor of the House to show that support given me was not only from life-

long Conservatives but as well from those Liberals who were outraged at the treatment given their regularly nominated candidate Charles Roid.

Second, to use every effort to see that in the Dawson district an 8-hour day was enforced, with a mini-mum wage of \$4.50 per day and board allowance, plus 1½ times the regular wage for overtime.

Third, to use every effort to have the usual grants for roads, bridges, and landing fields continued and, if possible, increased.

Fourth, to make every endeavour to have the 2½ per cent tax on the output of gold done away with on an output of \$1,000,000. and under.

Promises Fulfilled

Readers of Hansard know I have fulfilled those promises.

On February 14 the Public Works estimates were brought before the House. I have already had several conversations with the Minister of Public Works and the deputy, had seen the requests for roads, landing fields, bridges and general use.

By the 19 February the government plans for further work by the topographical and geological parties, was well under way and I was told the general plans.

I wish it distinctly understood that all a member has to do is to ask for such information and it is invariably given, and no matter if the member is in opposition, his or her opinion is asked, if corroborated by those of the party in power, it simply shows the government that such estimates are needed beyond doubt.

Early in February I wrote a detailed letter of the need of a road to the boundary as additional to the Miller-Glacier road, at the same time suggesting some changes in the line of that road as recommended by government surveyors and engineers.

Amused by Article

I was amused by the front-page article that appeared in the Dawson News of May 28 announcing that \$65,000 had been voted by Parliament for improving Yukon's roads, and quoting a telegram of May 27 from J. P. Smith, at Vancouver, saying that the amounts of various roads, making up the total, had been allowed, followed by the statement that "this greatly-needed special grant did not fall into the lap of Yukon without much effort on the part of Mr. Smith and Comptroller Jeckell, chief executive of Yukon."

Evidently Mr. Smith desires to make it appear that he is some way represents Yukon, and overlooks the fact that at the last election in October, a majority of the electors made it quite clear that he was not wanted as their member of Parliament.

Mr. Jeckell Submits  
Estimates

Mr. Jeckell, as chief executive of government in Yukon, quite properly, as was his duty, submitted to the Minister an estimate of amounts required, for Hunker-Dominion-Sulphur road, \$25,000.00; Silver King road \$17,500.00; Dawson-Glacier road \$15,000.00; Landing fields, \$7,500. making a total grant of \$65,000.00

Upon receipt of this recommendation, the Minister gave me an opportunity of discussing with him the advisability of granting the application. We went into the items in detail. I described the various localities, the work being done and in contemplation and gave each item my unqualified support. Upon my advice and support, the Minister agreed to include the item in the estimates and to submit it to the House, which was done and the item was passed by the House on May 13. Mr. Smith evidently heard about it in Vancouver by May 27 and wired to The News.

Eight-hour Bill.

At my request, Captain Black prepared an eight-hour bill which he sent to me. I submitted it to the best legal counsel in Ottawa, who all agreed that if the Yukon Council passed such a bill, it was practically unbreakable - there were no loopholes. Copies were sent to each of the three Councillors.

The Yukon Consolidated Company was under new and large expenditure, their representative appealed to members of the Council to table the bill for another year, which was done. I had fulfilled my promise with my husband's invaluable assistance.

Flood Relief

When outside papers were filled with accounts of the Mayo and Yukon floods, I immediately asked the government for all information on the subject, the reply was that the territorial government had asked for no help.

On my return to the coast I received word of the wreck of the steamers Klondike and Casca. With what

information I could gather, I immediately wired the following:

Stop. It will be infinitely worse as river drops. Stop. Domeville Creek has carried much silt into the channel which must be removed. Stop. More than likely work will be needed at Kirkman Creek. Stop. Stewart River greatly changed shoal in many places one barge loaded with ore wrecked as result changed and shallow channels. Stop. Four thousand tons of ore waiting shipment at Mayo. Stop. One One thousand eight hundred and fifty tons freight waiting shipment interior at Whitehorse. Stop. Steamers Klondike and Casca both wrecked and reported complete loss of boats freight baggage and some mail. Stop. Shortage of food supplies in Mayo. Stop. Large companies will be crippled for lack of freight which will react on employment conditions. Stop. Please investigate at once and if necessary provide funds to do river work. Stop. Understand your local engineer Ford on way from Yukon now.

I thought this proper thing to do for the sake of the individuals and companies as I realized it was my duty as Yukon's representative to keep the government informed. The government is planning to put a dredge on the river next year, which, if done, will certainly be of enormous benefits.

I have enjoyed my work at Ottawa. I have wasted no time and I wish the electors of Yukon to feel that my services are at the disposal of the territory.

DR. BOSTOCK EXPLAINS GEOLOGICAL SURVEY WORK IN YUKON

Great Aid to the Prospector or Miner.

Dr. H. S. Bostock, head of the Dominion Geological Survey in Yukon, left for Stewart City on the Keno last Sat'day after several days spent on Galena Hill.

The popular young geologist will join his party who are now engaged in mapping what he terms the Ogilvie sheet. The area included in this map takes in the south fork of the Klondike, the White and 60-mile areas and as far south as Thistle and Kirkman.

"We are trying to make methodical maps," Dr. Bostock explains, "of the country along the main routes of transportation. These maps will be a great aid to miners and prospectors in choosing the most favourable locations and districts for their operations."

A similar map covering the Carmacks area is now in print and may be procured by applying to the Dep't. of Mines. A report on this area will be out soon.

Dr. Bostock and his party come to the Yukon each June, leave in September.

He advises that the Dep't. of Mines are now making film records of all the important placer camps in Canada to advertise the mining industry.

While on Galena the Gov't. geologist took moving picture "shots" of the T. Y. Co. camps and other individual properties.

"No hill are moving as far as I can see," he states, "but they are all just as steep as ever."

Thus did he sum up his opinion of the silver camp while on his recent visit.

Dr. Bostock returned to Mayo from his Galena Hill tour last Friday evening with R. J. Boyd, T. Y. Co. General Superintendent.

It was the best Discovery Day celebration held in Mayo during the past number of years. Visitors from the hill camps began to arrive early and by 1.30 the sports program got under way at Mayo's new ball park. The Citizens' Committee, assisted by members of the Pioneers, had everything in readiness for the sports program which was run off with clock-like precision.

Favoured by ideal holiday weather, the races and sports drew scores of interested spectators and contestants. The grandstand was packed to capacity while dozens lined the end of the field to witness the events.

Disastrous Fire Wipes Out  
Patrick's Arena and Auditorium  
Near Stanley Park. (By Radio)

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20, 1936: Three firemen were severely injured, one woman was overcome with hysterics as her home was ruined and a whole block was razed when fire of unknown origin swept thru the West End yesterday, causing property damage estimated roughly at nearly quarter of a million dollars.

One of the severest losses in the fire was the Arena and Auditorium at the corner of Georgia and Davie streets, owned by Patrick Bros. Only a few hours before the blaze broke out, 3000 people had jammed the auditorium to witness Max Baer and an opponent in a fist-ic battle.

The fire is thot to have started in the premises of a Boat Supply Co.

The area swept by the flames is the last block on Georgia before entering Stanley Park. The district was tenanted by numerous boat supply houses, small stores and several private dwellings.

ASSAYS FROM ORE IN NEW CARMACKS STRIKE RUN FROM \$35. to \$65. ACROSS VEIN.

Meagre Remains of Victims  
and Charred Ruins of Plane  
Mute Evidence of Grim Crash

Louis Kazinsky Writes of Activities  
in the Carmacks Area. Happy LePage  
Bags First Deer Ever Seen in Yukon.

Discovery of the long lost Arthur F. Hines plane, with only the meagre remains of the victims, was reported in Fairbanks recently by John Hajukovich, who with Bill McCon and Carl Tweiten made the discovery.

The find was made on a five thousand foot barren mountain range on the Healy slope, 15 miles westerly from the Goodpaster.

The entire plane, excepting the frame, was burned. The wreckage victims were: Art. F. Hines, pilot, Mr. and Mrs. John F. Lonz (newlyweds) and Alton G. Nordale, all of Fairbanks. The party was returning from the Dawson celebration of last fall on Aug. 19.

The longest search in the history of the north for the plane was fruitless. Scores of planes cruised for months; a total mileage equal to several times around the world.

The spot where the wreckage was found is a little off the much travelled route between Dawson and Fairbanks.

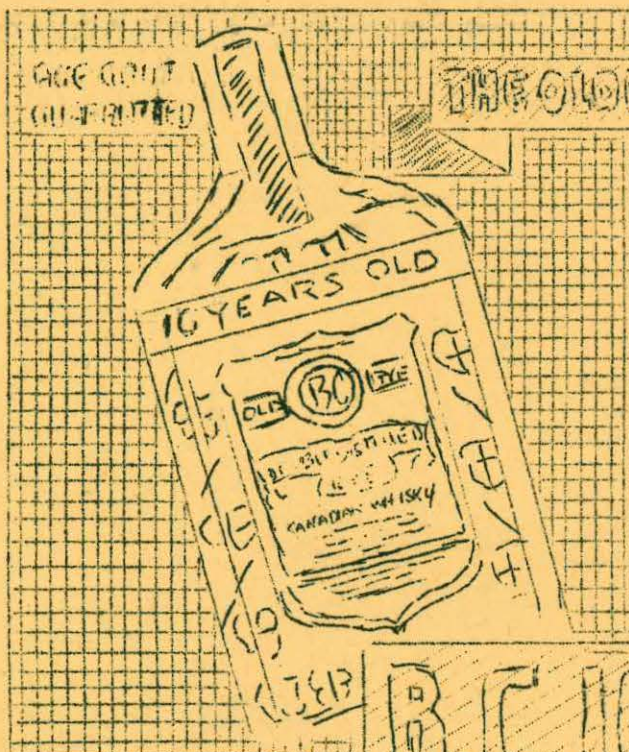
Old Timers who hadn't danced in years couldn't resist the tantalizing dance strains and tripped forth with all the lightness and gaiety of their early years.

It was a grand day for the kiddies who swarmed over the grounds and took part in the various races. Free lemonade, ice cream, popcorn and candy were dispensed to all from the refreshment tent which was in the capable care of Pioneer Alex Nicol.

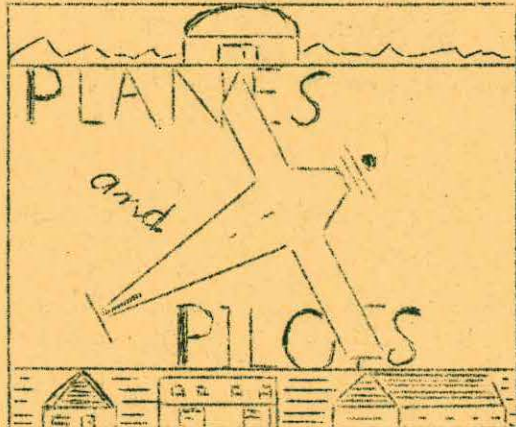

**SENTENCED:** For Stealing Grips From S. S. Whitehorse Southbound

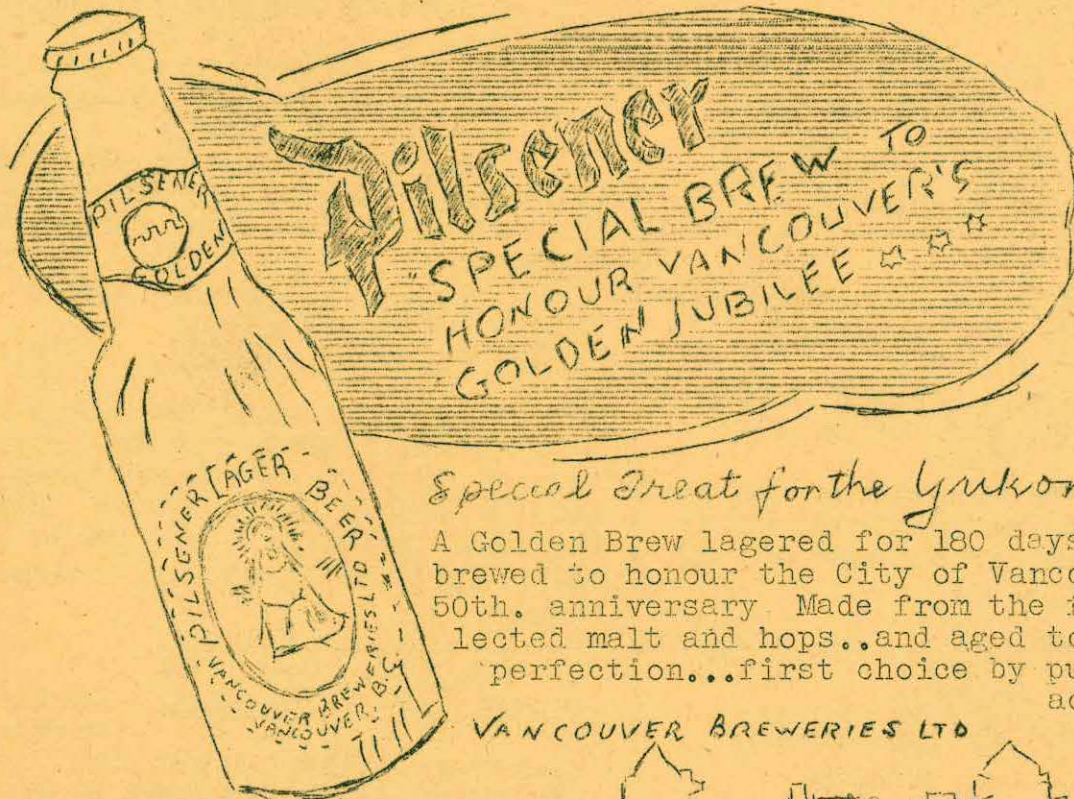
