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KEEP AMERICA

BUT STRONGLY EMPHASIZES REVISION OF NEAUTRALITY ACT

(By Radio)

In his speech to Congress which met in special session Thursday, President Roose-velt declared that he would do everything in his power to keep America out of war but that he strongly emphasized revision of the Neutrality Act to allow belligerent nations to buy arms and military supplies from the States on a cash and carry basis.

The President's speech was greeted with optimism in Britain and France.

The Premier of the Roumanian Gov't. was shot and killed by Pro-Nazi Storm Troopers on Thursday while en route by car to the broadcasting station in Bucharest to deliver a speech to the nation.

King Carol immediately set up a military Govit, and the first steps were to round up and execute the Premier's assasins.

Premier Mackenzie King on Tuesday announced the following changes in the Dominion Cabinet:

The Hon. Ian Mackenzie, formerly Minister of Defence, now assumes the portfolio of Pensions and National Health. The Hon. Norman Rogers has been named Minister of Nation-al Defence. He was previously Minister of Labor.

The Hon. G. C. Power, former Minister of Pensions and National Health, has been app-

cinted Postmaster General.

The Prime Minister also announced the Canadian Government has decided to raise two expeditionary forces for service overseas. The first contingent is expected to leave Canada around the first of the year. The other will be kept in Canada pending future developments.

Those who have already joined the Colors for home defence will be given the first opportunity of joining the expeditionary force for overseas duty.

ACTION ON WESTERN FRONT: The British & French were reported on Thursday to be driv-

ing ahead on the Western Front.

According to the British Blue Book, which reveals the various diplomatic stages prior to the war andready this week, the Russo-German secret pact to "carve up" Poland, was known as early as August 16th.

CAPTAIN GEORGE BLACK RETURNS TO DAWSON.

Ed. picked Mr. Black up at Van Cleave's roadhouse Saturday night. Thursday week ago he showed his collection of moving pictures at the Calumet, then proceeding with Tommy McKay to Keno, here he

spent Friday.

According to Mr. Black the water was too high in the Mayo River for good fishing.

HEAVY TOLL FROM HEAT WAVE.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 21 - 55 deaths resulted in California during the past week from one of the most severe heat waves in many years. Thousands of persons were prostrated by the extreme hot weather. Temperatures soared to new all-time high records, in many centres.

CARDS STILL TRAIL - NEW YORK, Sept. 21 - The St. Louis Cardinals, making a determined bid to overhaul the Cincinnati Reds in the final pennant dash for the National League championship, were still trailing the leaders by 2½ games following to-day's play.

The winners will meet the World's Champion New York Yankees in the World's Series starting early in October. The Yanks cinched the American League flag last week.

VETERAN DAWSON WOOD DEALER MURDERED

On Monday morning, Sept. 11, John Sipkus, a pioneer wood dealer and highly respected resident of Dawson for many years, was shot and instantly killed on the river front by D. J. McPhee.

According to the telegraphic report to hand it all happened over an argument about wages and that only over a trivial matter of three or four dollars are reported by McPhee to the police.

It was while Sipkus was talking to Sergeant Eddy, RCMP., in front of the Yukon Hotel, that McPhee opened the window of his room in the hotel and fire the fatal shot. He then turned the rifle upon himself. He was removed to St. Mary's Hospital in a critical condition and died Tuesday morning.
