GERMAN AIR ATTACK VS BRITAIN THURSDAY DRIVEN OFF

R. A. F. PLANES DROP MORE LEAFLETS OVER GERMANY IN SUNDAY FLIGHT.

(War News in Brief)

SEPT. 28 - A German attempt to reach Britain by air met with failure to-day when a German bombing squadron was repulsed and driven off as it approached the Scottish coast.

Sept. 25 - A fleet of British planes again flew over Germany on Sunday, dropping thousands of leaflets.

Sept. 28 - The Soviet Union has signed a mutual non-aggression pact with the Baltic State of Estonia whereby the Soviet Gov't. will be permitted to establish important air bases in the Baltic Sea opposite Sweden.

Sept. 28 - The Soviet-German talks in Moscow continued to-day. Nothing is definitely known regarding this secret conference but it is believed that the discussions are for the purpose of "carving up Poland" between Russia and Germany. Many are of the opinion that a peace move may result from these recent talks in Moscow.

Sept. 28 - The Defence Command of Poland were to-night considering opening of armistice negotiations with Germany to prevent further strain and suffering by the defenders and civilian population of Warsaw. Definite negotiations were expected by Friday.

Sept. 28 - The British Admiralty to-day announced that it had definite proof that the super German liner Bremen was safe in a Soviet port in the Arctic.

Sept. 28 - Observers report sighting a U-boat off the south coast of Norway and of hearing an explosion shortly afterwards.

Sept. 28 - A German farmer was to-day executed for sabotage against the National Defence of the country. This makes the 2nd. German citizen to be executed for sabotage since the war started.

Sept. 28m- The U-boat which torpedoed & sank the British aircraft carrier Courageous has reached Wilhelmshaven and each member of the crew presented with an iron cross.

Sept. 28 - The French forces continue to drive North near the Luxemburg line and good progress is reported. A large number of prisoners are reported captured by the French.

Sept. 25 - Fearing a Soviet Coup in Rumania, extra precautions are being taken in Bucharest and more Rumanian troops called up and being rushed to the border.

Sept. 25 - The Swedish steamer Selisia was bombed and sunk Monday. 19 members of the crew were saved.

ARMS EMBARGO LIFTED BY THE U. S. A.

WASH. Sept. 28 - By a vote of 16 -7 members of the Foreign Relations Committee of the U. S. Senate to-day voted to repeal the arms embargo clause of the Neutrality Act. Arms and military supplies will be sold on a cash and carry basis to belligerent nations.

U. S. RENEWS SILVER AGREEMENT, CANADA.

Wash, Sept. 28 - Sect'y. of the Treasury Morgenthau to-day announced that the U. S. Treasury Dep't. had renewed for one month its agreement with Canada to purchase 1,200,000 ounces of newly-mined silver.

RUSSO-JAPANESE INCIDENT

LONDON, Sept. 28 - Outbreak of another Russian-Japanese incident was reported to-day when a Soviet patrol boat shot at a Japanese ship near the Manchuko border.

MORE SHIPS SUNK: Sept. 29 - Three Norwegian cargo boats were to-day reported sunk by German submarines.

Sept. 29 - It was reported by radio to-day that Propoganda Minister Goebells had been arrested and sent to an internment camp.

LOCALS: It was rumoured around town Thursday that a well-known pioneer Mayoite had passed away yesterday morning. The rumour proved untrue as the party in question was very much alive and active Thursday night.
