MAMMOTH AIR TRAINING PLAN TO BE STARTED IN CANADA

IDEA IS TO BUILD UP STRONGEST
AIR FORCE IN THE WORLD

LONDON, Oct. 11 - The British Government to-day announced the inception of a gigantic Empire Air Training Plan in Canada for the purpose of building up one of the largest & strongest air fleets in the world.

News of the British Government's new move to establish this Empire Air Training Plan was received enthusiastically in Canada where it will undoubtedly prove an immense boon to the aviation industry of this country.

The new plan is being widely acclaimed throughout the Empire in general.

Under this training scheme air pilots & mechanics from Britain, New Zealand, Australia and Canada will undergo extensive air training in the Dominion. The new plan also calls for the establishment of new plane factories and equipment to speed up production.

FRENCH PREMIER SAYS
"NO" TO HITLER PEACE
PROPOSALS.

PARIS - Premier Daladier has declared that France and Britain will not lay down their arms until a peace which excludes all possibility of hegemony in Europe by one state or group of states is "effectively ensured."

His declaration came after semi-official sources in France had scorned Adolf Hitler's peace formula, describing it as "based on the exploitation of Central and Eastern Europe."

Prime Minister Chamberlain was scheduled to announce Great Britain's answer to Hitler's peace proposals on Thursday.

Britain and France want a durable peace, resting on honour and respect for one's word, guaranteeing the security of France and all nations, he declared.

ARMISTICE RUMOR IN
BERLIN CAUSES
REJOICING

LONDON, Oct. 11 - Profound rejoicing in Berlin on Tuesday followed the rumor of an armistice which swept through the city. It was only after the official German broadcasting agency denied the rumor that the hoax became known and, even then, reports state, jubilant Germans would hardly believe that the rumor of an armistice was untrue.

GENERAL MANAGER T. Y.
CORP'N. LEAVES FOR
THE SOUTH.

After spending the past several weeks in this district supervising T. Y. operations, General Manager Livingston Wernecke planned to hop off Thursday from Mayo Lake in his private Bellanca plane piloted by "Chuck" Gropstis.

The Wernecke plane is float equipped and has been based at Mayo Lake since Mr. Wernecke's arrival last month. It is understood that ice is already forming on the lake.

CANADIAN WEATHER
REPORTS CURTAILED

JUNEAU - Radio reports on Canadian weather have been banned by order of the Civil Aeronautics Authority. A CAA message received here by the Alaska Aeronautics and Communications Commission says:

"Effective immediately, discontinue radio broadcast and radio transmission of Canadian weather and information by all CAA and associated systems."

The weather order is one of Canada's war measures, designed to keep information from the enemy.

NORWAY, SWEDEN
UNEASY.

LONDON, Oct. 11 - Sweden has to-day ordered work to start at once on its two new battleships which have been under consideration for some time. The Norwegian and Swedish armies and other branches of the service are being brought up to full strength.

These measures followed upon the heels of recent European developments in the Baltic whereby Soviet Russia has obtained important and strategic air bases, etc. from Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

Summoning of the Finnish Foreign Minister to Russia has further heightened the tension in Norway and Sweden. It is understood that the Soviet will attempt to gain important concessions in Finland as in the other Baltic States. The Finnish army and air and naval units has been mobilized with a stubborn resolve to resist any attempt to detract from Finland's independence.

USA LENDS OVER MILLION FOR PLACER DEVELOPMENT

Chas. G. Lewis, General Manager for Livengood Placers, Inc., announces that the Reconstruction Finance Corp'n. of the United States Government has granted the loan of \$1,050,000 to the company for the development of its property.

This means immediate opening up of a large, placer gold property, some 5 miles in extent, 90 miles from Fairbanks. Work is being started at once on winter operations. The Livengood district is credited with having produced no less than \$15,000,000 by earlier methods of mining. The camp is said to have a productive life of 25 years more.

On Tuesday morning Pilot Wasson hopped off for the Gold City. Passengers from Mayo who made the flight over to Dawson were: Miss V. Page and H. J. Taylor.

On Tuesday Pilots Vines & Oakes brought the Ford "AZB" in from Dawson, southbound. Aboard the big ship were several well-known Dawsonites who were headed south, including Harry Gleaves, Phil Burich and others. Alex Forbes got off at Mayo to spend a few days here before continuing south.

Mr. Rogers was a returning passenger for the south on Tuesday's plane.

BROTHER OF AIR PILOT LES COOK KILLED ACCIDENTALLY

A recent issue of the Whitehorse Star just to hand carries an account of the accidental death of Jim Cook, brother of Les Cook, Chief Pilot for Northern Airways Ltd.

The accident took place Sept. 16th. From meagre reports it is understood that Jim was accidentally killed while making a rifle set to capture a bear which had been robbing his meat cache.

Mrs. Cook, young widow of the unfortunate victim, made a 300 mile hiking trip and boat journey from the head of Ross River, where the Cooks had operated a trading post, to Selkirk to report the tragedy. Arriving at Selkirk, Mrs. Cook sent a wire through to Les Cook, her husband's brother, in Atlin.

Les flew into the district to assist the bereaved wife.

The parents of the ill-fated young trading post operator reside at Pincher Creek, Alberta.

"HAM" OPERATORS IN YUKON WILL AGAIN BE ON THE AIR

The Dawson News of last Thursday carries the following account of interest to amateur radio fans in this district:

When the operation of amateur radio broadcasting sets was prohibited by the government as a war time measure, Captain George Black at once wrote to the authorities protesting against such prohibition applying to Yukon and explained the great use and value of such broadcasts to isolated places, and that there is no possibility of the licensed amateurs distributing anything of value to the enemy.

Last week Captain Black received a radio message from Mrs. Black at Ottawa saying: "Most radio licenses will be allowed. Have sent letter by air."

KING MAY CALL GENERAL ELECTION

NATIONAL GOVERNMENT MAY BE FORMED IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Oct. 6 - The Quebec provincial election, in which Premier Duplessis is proceeding to stir up racial hatreds, may possibly lead to a war time general election if Quebec sweepingly endorses the theory of non-participation.

No such course, however, has yet been discussed here, much less decided on. Developments must be awaited, and there is far from being any concession of a Duplessis victory.

If, however, Duplessis should win, especially by a decisive majority, the clear intimation is that Messrs Lapointe, Cardin and Powers will retire from the Federal Government, leaving Quebec high and dry in the matter of cabinet representation.

Their indicated position is that it would be illogical to remain in a government prosecuting a war effort, whose purpose is repudiated by the people of their province.

A situation like that might bring on an election. Naturally, the suggestion is that a national government would be formed before hand.

U. S. A. SHIP IROQUOIS DOCKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 11:- Carrying a large load of American refugees from Europe, the U. S.A. 6,500 ton steamer Iroquois docked to-night.

President Roosevelt was informed last Thursday by Grand Admiral Erich Raeder of the German fleet, that the Iroquois would be sunk as it approached American waters under the same circumstances as the British ship Athenia the day after war broke. A fleet of U. S. warships and destroyers went out to meet the Iroquois following this warning which was described in Berlin as "merely an act of comradeship."

FUEHRER THREATENS WAR OF HORROR IF PLAN REJECTED

BERLIN, Oct. 6 - Adolf Hitler to-day proposed a European peace settlement "on a comprehensive basis," but added that if the Allies rejected his "outstretched hand," this "statement will have been my last."

"Then we shall fight," he went on, and pictured the new war as one sure to bring unprecedented horror to the world.

"May those peoples and their leaders who are of the same mind (as himself) now make their reply," he said in his hour and twenty minute speech to the Reichstag and the world.

"And let those who consider war to be the better solution reject my outstretched hand. He challenged the Allies to "interpret these opinions of mine as cowardice if they like."

Collaborators said Hitler regarded his proposals as "formal" and that he would now wait for Britain and France to act on them.

QUAKE FELT FAIRBANKS

FAIRBANKS - An earthquake at 9.50 a. m. yesterday caused minor damage here.

GENERAL McNAUGHTON TO COMMAND CANADIAN FORCES

OTTAWA, Oct. 7 - Major-General A. L. G. McNaughton, who commanded the Canadian artillery during the last year of the Great War has been given command of the First Canadian Division, Defence Minister Norman Rogers announced last night.

McNaughton will relinquish his post as president of the National Research Council to become inspector general of units, 1st. Canadian Division, Canadian Active Service force, the announcement said.

IL DUCE ADVISED AGAINST HITLER PEACE MOVE

LONDON, Oct. 7 - Adolf Hitler was understood Friday night to have made his Reichstag peace proposals against strong Italian advice.

Usually well-informed embassies heard that when Count Ciano, Italian Foreign Minister, arrived in Berlin Sunday, he conveyed a conciliatory peace plan which Premier Benito Mussolini had evolved. It provided for re-creation of an independent Poland of restricted size to be guaranteed by all the great European powers instead of by Germany and the Soviet Union.

Mussolini was also reported to have suggested all other questions, ranging from colonies and disarmament to an economic new deal, should be dealt with in a 5-power conference by Germany, Russia, France, Britain and Italy.

SABOTAGE ON BIG U. S. SHIP?

SAN PEDRO, Oct. 7 - All leaves of sailors aboard the Battleship U. S. S. Arizona were cancelled to-day, reportedly following discovery of evidence of sabotage plot aboard the warship.

Naval authorities declined to make any comment on a report that an effort had been planned to damage the big dreadnaught which is one of the units of the navy's main battle-force.

YANKES WIN WORLD SERIES IN 4 STRAIGHT

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 - The Yankees slugged their way to a 7-3 win over the Cincinnati Red Sox in Crosley Field last Saturday to win their third straight victory in the World's Series. On Sunday the Yanks bumped the Reds out of the picture by walloping the National Leaguers 7-4 to win their fourth straight Series title. In the third game the Yanks hit four homers, two being slammed out by Rookie Keller.

PLEA SEEN AS VALEDICTORY

LONDON, Oct. 6 - A bold-faced, single word "NO," captioned the main editorial of Lord Beaverbrook's Evening Standard, sounded the keynote of early British re-action to Hitler's proposals for an all-inclusive peace conference.

"Hitler's speech changes nothing," the Standard said. "If he has made his last peace offer, he also has made his last war... The power of democracy in Britain and France has taken the decision from his hands."
