ACKURGES

YUKON'S VETERAN MEMBER and EX-SOLDIER DECLARES NOW IS LOGICAL TIME TO FORM NATIONAL GOV'T. TO CARRY ON WAR EFFORT

Captain George Black, Yukon's Sourdough ex-soldier member of parliament for 14 successive years, came back to Mayo this week living in a regular "Hell's hole."
feeling fit as a fiddle and with the glint Norway protested to Britian ove of a new election campaign in his eye.

His candidature assured by the acclaim of scores of supporters and friends throughout the Yukon, the genial pioneer barrister is enthusiastic at the opportunity of again contesting the Yukon seat in the forthcoming

Dominion election on March 26th.

He sounded off the keynote of his campaign this week in these terse, characteristic remarks:

" If elected I will support the Hon. Dr. Robert Manion in his policy of forming National Government composed of the ablest men and brains in Canada - regardless of party politics - whose one aim will be win the war."

With Canada engaged in a gigantic war effort, standing shoulder to shoulder with the Mother Country, there has never been a period in the Dominion's history when National Government has been more essential and necessary, Mr. Black pointed out.

"This is no time to bargain and bicker over party politics," he declared. " Now is the logical time to form a Union Government comprised of leaders who are willing anxious to forget their party affiliations and stand shoulder to shoulder, with all true and loyal Canadians in a united effort to help the Allies win the war against tyranny, dictatorships and oppression.

With this policy foremost in mind, Captain Black, veteran of many a hectic political campaign in the Yukon, is asking Yukoners once again for their support and confidence in this election.

There is not much doubt that the former Speaker of the House will be accorded that support.

To date no opposition candidate has been

named.

"Naturally," Mr. Black said," I would appreciate the honour if Yukoners elected mo by acclamation. But, candidly speaking, I will also be disappointed if there is no contest. (Cont'd. on Page 5)

LATE RADIO NEWS

BRITISH SEAMEN RESCUED, London, Feb. 19 -A British destroyer, entering neutral waters, attacked the Nazi prison ship Altmark in a Norwegian fjord, killed five of its crew and rescued 326 British merchant seamen whom they found battened down under its decks and

Norway protested to Britian over the attack but the Admiralty retaliated by accusing Norway of mishandling the whole affair. The incident aroused widespread indignation protest in Germany and it was feared trouble between Norway and Germany might ar-ise out of the affair. Germany was reported to be planning retaliation with a new marine and air attack against British and neutral shipping. Britain has announced that all ships will now be armed for their own protection.

C. GETS BIG ORDER, Feb. 23 - Vanc. B. C. Britain has placed orders for 14 mine sweepers to cost 9 million dollars with B.C. firms. This is in addition to last weeks order for ships to cost 6 million dollars.

2 MORE SUBS SUNK, London, Feb. 22 - Two more German submarines were sunk in the North Sea last night the Admiralty announced to-day.

FINNS BEAT BACK INVADERS, Helsingfors, Feb. 19 - An attempt by the Red army to break through the Mannerheim line in a new offensive this week, resulted in the annihilation of a whole division of 17,000 Russian troops, according to reports from the High Command. A large amount of equipment and supplies were reported taken.

ARMY FLIER CRASHES, ALASKA, Anchorage, Feb. 17 - The amphibian plane piloted by Captain Benton Davis of the U. S. Army crashed half an hour after Davis had taken off from Anchorage for Cordova. Ten Alaskan fliers joined in the search for the missing ship which was finally spotted by Kenneth Neese, Anchorage pilot, and Wild Life Agent Collins. The rescue fliers stated they saw Davis waving his arms at them although he was caught in the wreckage. Rescue parties were sent hurrying to the scene of the crash.
