NEW PEACE MOVE HALT WAR HINTED LONDON & BERLIN

BERLIN NON COMMITTAL ON REPORT

LONDON, Feb. 29 - A new peace move, proposed by Germany, is reliably reported to-day. The British Government is in possession of a list of the terms under which Germany would be willing to call off the war and make peace. The new peace plan is said to be authentic. Correspondents in Berlin trying to have the new peace move verified found the Nazi Government non-committal. They didn't deny the report nor did they confirm it.

FINNISH RETREAT MAY PROVE NEW TRAP FOR RED ARMIES

LONDON, Feb. 29 - Many observers were of the opinion that Russian occupation of the last key city in the Mannerheim line would only be a matter of time. Others believed that General Mannerheim was conducting an orderly retreat to form a new, huge trap for the invaders.

Meanwhile the people of Finland are undaunted and scoff at any idea of making concessions to Russia. Thousands of Red troops have been slaughtered in three mass attacks on the Eastern end of the Mannerheim line.

MOSCOW, Feb. 29 - The High Command announced to-night that the Red army advance of the past fortnight had been general and that 270 Finnish defence fortifications had fallen during the last drive.

FRENCH PREPARE FOR GERMAN ATTACK

PARIS, Feb. 29 - The French army and command is preparing for a massed German attack this spring.

BRITAIN STOPPING GERMAN COAL TO ITALY

LONDON, Feb. 29 - Britain has further added to her blockade measures by stopping all coal imports from Germany to Italy.

FLOODS IN CALIFORNIA CAUSE HEAVY LOSS

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 29 - The waters of the Sacramento river were reported to be falling rapidly to-night. Flood waters which were general throughout northern California the past few days left 4000 homeless, caused 4 lives to be lost and five million dollars damage.

LATE RADIO NEWS

BERLIN, March 1 - Sumner Welles, U. S. Under Secretary of State, now on a peace mission in Europe as the personal representative of President Roosevelt, interviewed Hitler's right hand man - Von Ribbentrop in Berlin to-day and found out Germany's attitude regarding the present war and peace. Secrecy veils the discussions but it is reported that the U. S. envoy is forwarding to the President "important information" as the result of his recent talk. He will interview Chancellor Hitler Saturday and it is believed Hitler will call a special session of the Reichstag soon after to divulge the nature of these important discussions.

LONDON, March 1 - German bombing squadrons carried out a heavy dawn to dusk attack on British shipping in the North Sea Friday. Although claiming to have sunk British war ships as well as merchant vessels, the British Admiralty announce the loss of but two merchant vessels as the result of the raid.

WASHINGTON, March 1 - The British freighter Southgate sent out a distress signal Friday that it was in danger of a submarine attack in American waters near Porto Rico. American navy men believed that the Southgate has mistaken several United States submarines on a practise cruise for enemy attackers as, so far, no foreign submarine has been reported in those waters.

LONDON, March 1 - British bombing squadrons carried out to-day their most extensive flights, covering nearly all parts of Germany. The flights took from 8 to 10 hours to complete with all members of the squadron returning home safely.

LOS ANGELES, March 1 - New floods caused by run off waters caused hundreds of persons to evacuate their homes in the Sacramento Valley. Flood conditions will remain acute for the next 48 hours it is stated.

WASHINGTON, March 1 - President Roosevelt landed at Pensacola naval base to-day after completing his recent 4,000 mile cruise and is expected to reach the White House late Saturday afternoon.

SHIPYARD CREWS ON WAY IN: According to the Whitehorse Star the White Pass & Yukon Route's shipyard crews were due to sail North from Vancouver yesterday and are expected to reach Whitehorse next Tuesday to begin the season's operations.
