

REPORTED NEW PHASE OF TH WAR ABOUT TO BEGIN

RESHUFFLING OF BRITAIN'S CABINET SEEN AS DIRECT CHALLENGE IN GERMANY

LONDON, April 4 - It has been reliably reported that the German air force is now ready to strike in full force against England. The recent re-shuffling of Britain's war cabinet has been accepted in Germany as a direct challenge that the war is to be prosecuted in grim earnest by the Allies.

LONDN, April 5 - A delegation is now in Sweden to open further trade pacts between the Allies and the neutrals of the Baltic. It is understood that attempts are being carried out to the fullest for Britain to buy up huge quantities of Swedish ore. The new discussions are seen as a forerunner of a tightening up of the Allied blockade against Germany.
