GOVERNMENT CONTROL DURING THE CRISIS

LONDON, May 22 - Prime Minister Winston Churchill became a virtual dictator of Britain to-day as the newly-formed British Cabinet voted to place Britain under Government Control during the present grave crisis. As a result of this latest move the Government is empowered to take over control of practically everything in the nation.

by General Maxime Weygand, new commander-inchief of the Allied armies, forced German tank columns driving southwestward toward Paris to abandon their advance to-day, military authorities here announced.

The Germans abandoned their drive in the face of the French counter-offensive, fear that the British forces retreating in western Belgium might wheel and attack their right flank and powerful French pressure on their left

The Germans swung their main offensive toward the northwest despite terrible losses suffered by five of their mechanized divisions which were attacked ferociously in the Saint Quentin region.

Force of the Allied counter attack has led to the recapture of strategic key cities gained by the Germansin their initial drive through the northern extension of the Maginot Line.

The new allied commander amounced on Satur day that Allied troops would have the gap fill ed within forty eight hours.

Weygand ordered the counter offensive ag the German bulge on the northern French plains, it was learned. The immediate result was to bring a halt to the German drive on Paris although their swing northwestward toward the channel ports brought the threat of war closer to Britain.

Despatches here said the fighting had lost none of its ferceity. The French 75!, brot into action against the German tanks for the brot first time last Friday, were wreacking havoc with the wedge-shaped German tank columns.

historic old Dawson News Publishing Company
was the scene Thursday night of the latest
outbreak of fires which have caused heavy
General Maxime Weygand, new commanders to historic old Dawson landworks this week. In addition to the Dawson News plant the jewellry store and premises of H. Peters, voteran Dawson jeweller, were razed by fire the same night.

The most serious fire occured mednesday night when the M&N corner, the Yukonia Hotel, the Orpheum Theatre, Jimmy's Place, the store of Ernest Schink, the Fashion Shop and part of the Arcade Cafe burned. It is believed the fire started in the Theatre Building, owned and operated by Harry Gleaves who is also proprietor of the Arcade Cafe. From reports at hand the fire was halted at the Arcade Cafe on front street and at the Rochester Hotel, situated across the narrow lane as one turns the block.

It is rumoured that a fire bug has been responsible for the sudden splurge of fires.
Evidence, so it is alleged, was found in
the Peters' jewellry store where a hole had
been cut through the building, that would indicate the fire there to have been been caused by a fire bug. It is also reported that evidence has also been found under the old postoffice building which, apparently, was also to have been the scene of an-

other conflagration.
Razing of the M&N block, the Yukonia Hotel and adjacent property, runs into thousands of dollars damage and comes as a severe blow to the owners. Especially to J. A. Segbers, owner of the Yukonia Hotel who was burnt out only a littleover a year ago. The Dawson News plant was not damaged, apparently, so badly that it had to discontinue publication. A brief message from Harold Malstrom, Manager of the Dawson News, states that "plant was undamaged. Going strong."

Since the report that there is a shortago of men in Dawson got around, quite a fow have gone over to the Gold Metropolis from Mayo during the past week while others are contemplating making the trip over soon. It is understood that the Dawson company will hire men already in the Yukon in pref-

orence to strangers from outside.

Since the recent outbreak of fires in
Dawson the shortage of labor there will undoubtedly be more acute than before.

BRITAIN PUTS BAN ON SILVER EXPORT

LONDON, May 20 - The British Board of Trade has imposed a ban on all exports of silver and unprocessed tobacco except under government license.

No explanation was given for the Board of Trade's unexpected action but it was believed to have been caused by the recent heavy foreign demand for these items.

Bullion traders here are understood to have notified the authorities that the 2 pence rise in silver prices over the past week, was the result of a "mystifying" con

inental buying movement.

At the same time April trade figures show that the British export of tobacco, both raw and processed, reached the abnormally high level of 498,000 pounds.

WAR TO THE FINISH URGES CHURCHIL

CHURCHILL'S SPEECH

"Now one bond unites us all .. to wage war until victory is won, and nover submit ourselves to servitude and shame. Side by side, the British and the French people have advanced to rescue not only themselves bu the whole world "

"NEXT BIG BATTLE FOR OUR ISLAND" PRIME MINISTER WARNS

LONDON, May 20 - Prime Minister Churchill admitting that the situation is grave, declared Sunday in a broadcast to the nation that Great Britain and Fran France will wage war until Germany has been def-eated and will "never submit ourselves to servitude and shame."

He said it would be foolish to lose heart and courage, or suppose, that the powerful Allied armies could be brought to their knees in submission within the space

of a few weeks or even months, by Germany. "I speak to you for the first time in a solemn hour for the life of our country, of our own power, of our Allies and above all, of the cause of freedom," Churchill said.
"A tremenduous battle is raging in France

and Flanders. The Germans by remarkable com-bination of their bombing and heavily arm-ored tanks, have broken through the French defences north of the Maginet Line and strong columns of their armoured vehicles

are ravaging the open country."
But if the Germans are bohind the Allied Churchill told his people, the French are behind the German front at many points.

"We must not allow outselves to be intimidated by the presence of these armored forces behind our front," Churchill said.

The Prime Minister warned Britons that when the battle in France abates its force there, a battle will come "four our island."
"That," Churchill said, "will be the struggle."
"In the supreme emergency we shall not

he sitate to take every step, even the most drastic, and call forth from our people the last ounce and last inch of effort which they are capable.

"Relative to the balance of the British and German air forces, it is now considerably more favourable to us than in the

beginning of the battle!

"My confidence in our ability to fight it out to a finish with the German air force, has been strongthened by the fierce

encounters taking place.
"It would be foolish to disguise the gravity of the hour," Churchill asserted. "It would be still more foolish to heart and courage or suppose that the well trained and well-equipped armies numbering three to four millions could be overcome within the space of a few weeks or even months by a scoop or raid of mechanized vehicles however formidable."

ROYAL AIR FORCE PLAYING HEROIC PART IN WAR

Bombers Raise Havoc with Enemy Communications and Supply Trains.

LCNDON, May 20 - British bombers in 48 hours of intensive bombing raids have successfully blasted precious oil depots and refineries feeding German mechanized forces in the crushing advance in Belgium and France, the Air Ministry has announced.

Oil and gasoline depots and refineries at Bremen, Hamburg and Hanover in Western Germany were bombed and set afire by the British.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill asserted that the R. A. F. bombers attacking oil refunctions in the Ruhr Valley "probably" bombed Leuna, headquarters of the German synthetic gasoline production.

Loss of the Leuna plant and its storage tanks would be a hard blow to Germany because it produces part of the annual German output of 2,800,000 tons of synthetic gasoline.

At the same time the Royal Air Force relieving pressure on the fighting front, the Air Ministry said, by continuing harrassement of German communication lines, bridges, junctions and sidings and bombing and strafing of troop concentrations, highways, convoys and airdromes.

Pilots returning home from raids said relays of Whitley, Wellington and Hampdon bombers from 10 p. m. Friday, May 17 until dawn Saturday, and later in the day, dropped tons of heavy bombs despite terrific anti-aircraft fire, balloon barrages and German fighting planes. The Hermodene bombed Hamburg all mich

planes. The Hampdens bombed Hamburg all night.
Explosions of the heaviest bombs were followed by terrific gushes of flames that were visible as far away as Cuxhaven, one pilot said.

NEW ALLIED LEADER STRONG ON ATTACK

PARIS, May 20 - General Maxine Weygand, heir to the mantle of Marshall Foch, Sunday night was named generalissimo of the Allied armies replacing General Maurice Gamelin in an effort to turn the tide of Germany's drive which has swept to within 75 miles of Paris.

The Belgian-born strategist, flying home from Syria where he commanded the Allies army in the Near East, took over the high command in France's hour of peril as the French army battled furiously to halt the Germans northeast of St. Quentin, famous Great War battleground.

-Heit to Foch's policy of "L'attaque, tou-jours, l'attaque," Woygand undoubtedly will launch a plan of bold initiative in contrast

with Gamelin's extreme caution.

FIFTH COLUMN PLOT UNCOVERED
