BERLIN BOMBED

(By Radio)

LONDON, June 8 - Squadrons of RAF bombing planes bombed Berlin Friday night in retaliat-ion for the German bombing attack on Paris this week.

BIG BATTLE STARTS, June 5 - The Germans unleashed their latest drive against France at an early hour to-day. Thousands of German mech anized troops, battle planes and tanks were thrown into the latest thrust towards Paris.

The French forces are reported to be hold-ing the latest Nazi drive in northern France.

Hundreds of German tanks have been captured as Allied forces closed in after the German tanks had rushed through the line. French 75's have been raising havoc with the German tanks. The Allies have discovered a weak point in machine gun fire.

RUSSIA WARNS ITALY

JUNE 8 - Although Italy has called in all her ships from neutral points, M7ssolini still sits on the fence. Soviet Russia on Friday warned Mussolini that any action taken by It-aly against the Balkan states will be counter ed by the Soviets.

350,000 ALLIED TROOPS EVACUATED

LONDON, June 4 - Premier Churchill told the Commons to-day that 335,000 British, Fr-ench and Belgian troops had been successfully evacuated from Flanders. The losses of the B. E. F. in two weeks of fighting were 30,000 killed, wounded or missing. Material losses have been heavy. More than a thousand guns & transport and mechanical equipment had to be left behind as a result of the Belgian surrender. Germans followed up Sunday's bombing of Paris with a 3-hour attack upon Le Havre

U. S. PLANES, Wash. June 6 - The United States army and navy are turning in their first line planes for delivery to the Allies.

PARIS BOMBED. PARIS, June 3 - The Gormans Enplaning at M bombed Paris to-day for the first time in 9 were: Ed. Kimbel months of war. Forty-five persons were killed and Joe Amicona.

NAVY LOSES 30 SHIPS, LONDON, June 3 - The admiralty announced to-night that the Royal Navy lost 30 ships, including six destroyers and 24 minor craft, in evacuating the Allied forces from Dunkick - a feat which is now described as the most extensive and difficult operation in maval history.

Britain gathered an armada of 887 ships for the rescue. Of these 222 were naval ships and 665 other craft.

"British, French and Belgian troops have been brought back safetyly to this country from Belgium and northern France in numbers, which, when the full story can be told, will surprise the world," and admiralty statement declared.

The Belgian port of Zeebrugge, which for a time was an outlet of German submarines in the last war, has been blocked by sinking concrete-filled ships.

SHOOT TO KILL, LONDON, June 3 - Troops and special police are now patrolling all approaches to military areas, airdromes and minition factories, with orders to "shoot to kill" in all cases where persons refusing to stop and present credentials.

Two persons who failed to act on such a demand to stop were killed over the week -end

in southeastern England, it was revealed. STEADY FLOW PILOTS, OTTAWA, June 3 - Ann-ouncement that a "steady flow of pilots and subsequently of air crows generally, will pro-ceed monthly from Canada," to augment the Royal Air Force was an outstanding development in the war situation here to-day.

It is a partial consequence of the speeding up movement for which clamor has been very great. How many will go under the monthly plan will depend upon the extent of training before they leave. VANCOUVER TO TRAIN PILOTS, VANC, B.C. June

Vancouver will train several hundred pilots for the Royal Canadian Air Force this year, it was revealed here to-day by Leslie J. Martin, Aero Club president just back from Ottawa. Construction of 7 buildings, includ-ing a hangar and cuarters for 200 men, will be undertaken at the airport.

U. S. MAY CONTINUE TO BUY SILVER

NEW YORK, May 29 - The bill to discontinue further purchase of foreign silver seems stymied between the House and the Senate, the former body standing on the claim that as a revenue-producing measure it cannot constit-utionally originate in the Senate. The chanc-es are that it will be lost in the shuffle.

Though there is no good accomplished by ac-quiring more silver of foreign origin, there is no point in arguing it should be discontinued as a step toward economy.

Buying silver, domestic or foreign, at any price the secretary of the treasury chooses to pay, less than \$1.29 an ounce, does not increase the national dobt. There has been some demand for silver of late which temporarily put the market price above the treasury price. Silver very 1 por experied to gold.

RAINSTORMS visited Mayo on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Thursday's storm was accompanied by a short period of thunder and lightning.


