## FRENCH ABANDON PARIS AS NAZI DRIVE CONTINUES

BRITISH BOMBERS ATTACK  
ITALIAN MILITARY  
BASES

PARIS, June 13 - The French high command announced to-night that Paris was "an undefended town" as French and British troops abandoned the capital and took up positions to the south and east.

Heavy reinforcements of British troops are being rushed daily to the aid of the French defenders.

ITALY DECLARES WAR: ROME, June 10 - Italy has entered the war on the side of Germany and Mussolini to-day handed the British and French ambassadors a declaration of war.

BRITISH BOMB BASES, LONDON, June 12 - British bombers bomb main Italian bases in Libya. Airdromes, planes and ammunition dumps set on fire. Heavy bombardment of Italian bases in East Africa.

PRESIDENT'S SPEECH, Washington, June 10 - President Roosevelt, in a ringing speech to the world, declared he had done everything in his power to pacify Mussolini without avail. The President declared that "all our material resources will be placed behind the Allies."

HON. NORMAN ROGERS KILLED. OTTAWA, June 10 - Defence Minister Norman Rogers and 3 members of the crew of an RCAF plane carrying Rogers from Ottawa to Toronto, were killed when the plane crashed 35 miles east of Toronto.

Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of Defence for Air, took over the duties of his late colleague.

H. R. MacMillan, timber magnate of Canada, is mentioned as possibly entering the cabinet.

Flags in Mayo have been at half mast this past week for the late Minister of Defence.

ITALIAN SHIPS SEIZED, LONDON, June 12 - The British navy on Tuesday seized 14 Italian ships. Ten others are in British ports and three have been scuttled.

MORE U. S. PLANES. OTTAWA, June 12 - 73 additional long-range U. S. bombers have been dispatched overseas this week for the Allies.

## WERNECKE ARRIVES

Livingstone Wernecke, General Manager for the Treadwell Yukon Corporation Ltd., arrived in Mayo aboard his private Bellanca plane, piloted by Charles Gropstis, Friday night.

Mr. Wernecke was accompanied on his flight North this summer by his wife and daughter Claire. The plane passed over Mayo at 7.45, landing at Mayo Lake.

The General Manager for the T. Y. is here on his annual summer trip of inspection and supervision. This is the first trip back to Mayo for Mrs. Wernecke and Claire in the past number of years. During their stay they will be residing at the Wernecke home at Mayo Lake.

AKSALA MAKES FAST TIME: S. S. Aksala sprang a surprise on Mayoites at 12.30 this morning when she steamed into port after a near record trip of 44 hrs. 25 minutes from Stewart City.

The steamer left again at 5 a. m. to-day with 450 tons of ore.

Incoming cargo consisted of 7 sacks of mail, 3 tons of freight. There were no passengers. The Aksala left Stewart City 4 a. m. Thursday on her last up-river trip.

PLANES: Pilot Kubicek returned to Mayo from Dawson with the White Pass Ford Friday forenoon and continued south with the air mail. Joe Amicono returned on the Ford from Dawson while enplaning here for the flight south were: Messrs Trotter, Campbell and McNeill, commercial travellers.

FAIRCHILD IN TO-DAY - Lionel Vines, Chief Pilot for the White Pass, came in from Whitehorse at noon to-day with the Fairchild; landing on the river. Pilot Vines planned to make a bush trip out of Mayo to-day and will go to Dawson upon his return.

OTTAWA, June 10 - With Britain needing every aircraft and every engine in its factories, the Ministers have intimated that the Canadian air fighters may go into action with United States fighting planes and bombers instead of British service types.

The Veteran commercial traveller, Ernie Ball, has left Dawson en route to Mayo by steamer.

are now on sale here at the Bank of Montreal  
or at the Post Office.

Certificates are being sold in amounts from  
\$5. to \$100, maturity value at 7½ years. The  
war certificates yield 3% interest.

War savings stamps are also being sold at  
the local post office enabling investors to  
buy certificates by instalments. When 16  
stamps have been bought, having a value of  
\$4.00 the cards may be signed and application  
filled out for a \$5. certificate.

KING'S BIRTHDAY OBSERVED: June 13th. having  
been declared as the date for observance of  
the King's birthday, the Government offices  
and the bank were closed for the day; also  
the Mayo Public School.

## COUNCIL NEARS END OF BUSY SESSION

After one of its busiest sessions in recent years, the Yukon Council was nearing the end of its labors on Friday when Controller Jeckell submitted the estimates for sums required for the public service of Y.T. for the year ending March 31, 1941.

**NEW TAXES:** Acting upon suggestions from the Federal government that the Yukon should impose taxation so that it may bear a proper share of the increased financial burdens incident to these war times the Council has passed ordinances imposing an income tax, a tax on gasoline and fuel oil and increased license fees throughout the Territory.

A large number of other ordinances and bills have been passed this session including an ordinance to amend the "Sale of Beer" Ordinance, An ordinance to amend the "Yukon Liquor Ordinance," and ordinances amending the "Dental, legal profession, the Yukon Medical ordinance, the legal profession ordinance, the assessment ordinance and others.

Further details of the Council session will be published upon the return of E. J. Corp, Mayo member.

## CAPTAIN PADDY MARTIN CROSSES LAST DIVIDE

It is with profound regret that we report the death of Captain Paddy Martin, veteran Sourdough and colorful character of the Yukon since the early days. Capt. Martin passed away in Whitehorse General Hospital last Tuesday, June 4th. at the age of 76. He had been ill for a long time.

Familiarly known as the "Skipper" Captain Martin was a seafaring man from his early days and brought the first steamer from Victoria to Whitehorse, via St. Michael during the gold rush. The steamer was the old Canadian.

Interment will be made in Victoria.

The late Captain Martin is survived by his wife, two daughters and son Wilfrid, now a prominent lawyer in Eastern Canada.

## CANADA WILL RISE TO MEET NEW DUTIES

MacKenzie King  
Broadcasts

OTTAWA, June 10 - MacKenzie King in a nation-wide broadcast, declared Canada would rise to the challenge of new responsibilities in a widening war and said: "If new enemies oppose us, we may be sure that old and new friends will arise to help us. The government is exerting all its efforts to conform to the swiftly-changing scene. Every port in Canada will be another Calais, and every harbor will be another Dunkirk, before the men and women of our land will allow the light and life of their Christian faith to be extinguished by the powers of evil, nor yield their liberties to the tyranny of Nazi brutality. All is not dark in the skies above us. The first series of enemy gains will not end this war any more than it ended other wars in which the British and French fought side by side."

## PRINCESS JULIANA IN CANADA

OTTAWA, June 10 - Princess Juliana, heiress apparent to the Netherlands throne, with her two infant children, arrived at Halifax Tuesday aboard a Dutch warship. They will reside in Quebec for the time being.

## CANADIANS MUST HAVE PASSPORTS TO STATES

OTTAWA, June - The immigration department announced that the Canadian government contemplates no move similar to that of the United States, making passports necessary for admission into the States of Canadians.

SEATTLE, June 10 - Widespread protest against the new U. S. order re passports for Canadians entering the States after July 1st has arisen in Seattle and Western Washington. The Seattle Chamber of Commerce is trying to have the order modified or lifted.

## GERMANS ATTACK RAF AIRDROMES

LONDON, June 7 - In an effort to destroy RAF airdromes the Germans on Wednesday and Thursday nights of last week launched the biggest bombing raids on Britain so far along 275 miles of coastline. The Air Ministry announced that six persons were injured but no serious damage caused.

## ALLIES ANXIOUS OVER SPAIN

LONDON, June 12 - Anxiety over Spain's neutrality has been increased by the fact that there are 60,000 Nazis in that country and the Italian staff officers have a great influence in the Spanish army.

MUNITIONS PLANTS, OTTAWA, June 12 - In association with the French and British governments, Canada will begin construction of two munition plants with a capitalization of \$20,000,000 Minister of Munitions Howe announced.
