Bobbie Greaves and John Peterson have been working the Bermingham-Settlemier ground this past winter and have considerable ore ready for shipment.


Bermingham, Peterson and Greaves expicted to leave for Galena to-day to continue silvor operations this season.



COUNCIL NEARS END OF BUSY SESSION

After one of its busiest sessions in rec ent years, the Yukon Council was nearing the end of its labors on Friday when Controller Jeckell submitted the estimates for sums required for the public service of Y.T. for the year ending March 31, 1941.

NEW TAXES: Acting upon suggestions from the Federal government that the Yukon should impose taxation so that it may bear a proper share of the increased financial burdens incident to these war times the Council has passed ordinances imposing an income tax, a tax on gasoline and fuel oil and increased license fees throughout the Territory.

A large number of other ordinances and bills have been passed this session including an ordinance to amend the "Sale of Beer" Ordinance, An ordinance to amend the "Yukon Liquor Ordinance," and ordinances amending the "Dental, legal profession, the Yukon Medical ordinance, the legal profession ord inance, the assessment ordinance and others.

Further details of the Council session will be published upon the return of E. J. Corp, Mayo member.

CAPTAIN PADDY MARTIN CROSSES LAST DIVIDE

It is with profound regret that we report the death of Captain Paddy Martin, veteran Sourdough and colorful character of the Yukon since the early days. Capt. Martin pass-ed away in Whitehorse General Hospital last Tuesday, June 4th. at the age of 76. He had been ill for a long time.

Familiarly known as the "Skipper" Captain Martin was a seafaring man from his early days and brought the first steamer from Vic-toria to Whitehorse, via St. Michael during the gold rush. The steamer was the old Canadian.

Interment will be made in Victoria.

The late Captain Martin is survived by his wife, two daughters and son Wilfrid, now a prominent lawyer in Eastern Canada.

CANADA WILL RISE TO MEET NEW DUTIES

> MacKenzie King Broadcasts

OTTAWA, June 10 - MacKenzie King in a nation-wide broadcast, declared Canada would rise to the challenge of new responsibilities in a widening war and said: " If new enemies oppose us, we may be sure that old and new friends will arise to help us. The govern-The government is exerting all its efforts to conform to the swiftly-changing scene. Every port in Canada will be another Calais, and every har bor will be another Dunkirk, before the men and women of our land will allow the light and life of their Christian faith to be en extinguished by the powers of evil, nor yield their liberties to the tyrnany of Nazi brut-ality. All is not dark in the skies above us. The first series of enemy gains will not end this war any more than it ended other wars in which the British and French fought side by side.

PRINCESS JULIANA IN CANADA

OTTAWA, June 10 - Princess Juliana, heiress apparent to the Netherlands throne, with her two infant children, arrived at Halifax Tues day aboard a Dutch warship. They will reside in Quebec for the time being.

CANADIANS MUST HAVE PASSPORTS TO STATES

OTTAWA, June - The immigration depart-ment announced that the Canadian government contemplates no move similar to that of the United States, making passports necessary for admission into the States of Canadians.

SEATTLE, June 10 - Widespread protest against the new U. S. order re passports for Canadians entering the States after July 1st, EMPIRE ACE has arisen in Seattle and Western Washington. The Seattle Chamber of Commerce is trying

to have the order modified or lifted.

GERMANS ATTACK RAF AIRDROMES

LONDON, June 7 - In an effort to destroy LONDON, June 7 - In an effort to destroy RAF airdromes the Germans on Wednesday and Thursday nights of last week launched the biggest bombing raids on Britain so far al-ong 275 miles of coastline. The Air Ministry announced that six persons were injured but no serious damage caused.
