U. S. THROWS FULL AID TO BRITISH EMPIRE

(Synopsis of Events)

JUNE 17 - Marshall Philippe Petain, new Premier of France, announces that France will

sue for peace with Germany.

Petain communicates for peace with German High Command immediately after taking office from Paul Reynaud (who had been pledged to a fight to the finish).

Diplomats from France meet Hitler to learn

his terms.

Fierce battle continues in France while

peace terms being formulated.

LONDON, June 17 - Capitulation of France will make no difference to determination of

Britain to fight on.

One of the uncertainties of the hour is the future of the French fleet. If it escapes the general capitulation order it will be of great value to Britain. Ifhanded over to Germany it will be a serious blow.

Germany's attempt to subjugate Britain ab-

out to start.

WASHINGTON, June 17 - For several months Britain must stand the siege alone without decisive assistance from the United States but it is believed here Britain can do it.

By Autumn, not before, the unequalled productive sources of the United States will begin to pour out airplanes in quantity sufficient ultimately to give Britain superiority in the air.

BERLIN, June 17 - Hitler and Mussolini meet on Tuesday to formulate attitude of Italy and Germany towards France's request for terms on

which she would lay down her arms.

WASHINGTON, June 17 - The United States acted to-day to facilitate delivery of war planes to Britain by authorizing the ships to be

flown across American borders.

LONDON, June 17 - The Admiralty announced Sunday that 4 enemy subs had been destroyed in the Mediterranean. More than 210,000 tons of Italian shipping scuttled or captured in first week of warfare with Italy.

LONDON, June 17 - Bulk of non-combatants in England may be evacuated to Canada and islands converted into huge fortress.

LATE FLASHES

(By Radio - June 22) - The French Gov:t. under Marshall Petain, new Premier, signed an armistice with Germany today after deliberating over the terms for six hours.

The French fleet, acting independently of the Gov't. armistice, has raised the British flag on all its ships.

The French air force and huge French "mystery army" in Syria, acting independently, decides to carry on the fight in conjunction with the Allies.

Russia moved army of million and a half men and thousands of tanks on the Prussian border, facing Germany, Russia occupies Baltic States of Lithuania, Estonia and Latvia.

TERRIFIC BOMBARDMENT BY RAF, OF GERMANY

LONDON, June 22 - Using what is probably the world's most secret war weapon, believed the gyroscopic bomb sight as perfected in the States, bombing squadrons carried out the most extensive air raids over Germany since the start of the war. Terrific damage was done to airdromes, oil depots, supply trains and bases and other military objectives including troop trains. The hits were so accurate that even trains, appearing as slim ribbons, were hit directly from altitudes safe from antiaircraft fire.

ITALIAN planes last night bombed Alexandria with little success, most of the bombs dropping into the sea.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The attention of all persons concerned is hereby directed to the provisions of the gasoline and fuel oil tax ordinance, under the provisions of which all gasoline and fuel oil purchased or used in the Yukon Territory on & after June 15, 1940, is subject to a tax of 3¢ per imperial gallon, payable to the Territorial Treasurer.

Gasoline & fuel oil used in stationary engines & fuel oil used for heating are exempt from the tax.

Apart from this one exemption the tax must be paid on every gallon of gasoline or fuel oil bought or used in the Territory on and after June 15, 1940, except such quantities as were actually in the tanks of vehicles before said date.

STATES RUSHING SUPPLIES TO THE ALLIES

CANADIAN TROOPS STILL IN BRITAIN

OTTAWA, June 17 - The 1st. Canadian Division of the Canadian Active Service Force is still in England, it was learned to-day.

The first and only Canadian known to have been included in a British Expeditionary Force casualty list is Lance Corporal W. Sutherland who has been wounded. Sutherland of Battleford, Sask., is a member of the Seaforth Highlanders of the British Army.

TROJAN JACKASSES IN U. S. LULLED PEOPLE INTO SLEEP.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. June 17 - Jas. H. R. Cromwell, former United States Minister to Canada, said yesterday the United States is unprepared for war because of "Trojan jack-horses that stalk the halls of Congress."

"These Trojan jackasses in our House and Senate," said Cromwell, "lulled our people to sleep for years with their consistent statements that the United States had no interest in what was going on in Europe."

BRITAIN HAS now called to arms a total of 2,800,000 with the registering recently of 300,000 28-year old men for service.

REYNAUD HAS NARROW ESCAPE

BORDEAUX, June 17 - Former Premier Paul Reynoud had in reconnection from doubth Sui-

day when German planes bomboo a village in Central France shortly after he had left & killed and wounded 98 persons, including members of Reynaud's military staff.

EGYYPT PONDERS WAR

ALEXANDRIA, June 17 - Italian naval airmen were reported last night to have riad ed the Egyptian Mediterranean ports of Saloma and Sidi Barrani - an act such as Egypt has said might constitute one reason for her going to war.

REPORT TURIN RUINED: NEW YORK, June 17 - A broadcast on the wavelength of the French radio station intercepted this morning by the National Broadcasting Co. said the entire industrial centre of Turin, Italy, had been destroyed by French air raiders. There were no further details exept that antiaircraft guns failed to function.

U. S. DESTROYERS TO CONVOY AMERICA'S SUPPLIES TO ALLIES

WASHINGTON, June 17 - Of greatest importance in connection with the States renewed efforts to aid the Allies is the move in Congress to let U. S. destroyers convoy America's shipping and supplies to Britain for that would not only relieve the British Navy but would commit this country to the final prosecution of the war.

STARVATION FACES EUROPE.

WASHINGTON, June 17 - In the background of all the reasoning that the U. S. A. will eventually be drawn into the war on the Allied side, is the certainty that famine, a dark, invisible enemy, is sneaking up on Hitler from the rear.

If the British blockade continues Europe will be near starvation next winter, Sective of Agriculture Wall-ace stated.

With the United States help that blockade can be maintained. No goods will move across the Atlantic to the continent of Europe but everything this continent can produce and spare

will go to Britain.

Americans now understand that the U. S. A. will, in view of the European situation, become a military nation for the first time since the Civil War. The whole U. S. industrial strength is now being geared up to war production on a scale undreamed of in the past by any nation and will soon be sending an avalanche of supplies to the Allies.

FIERCE BATTLE RAGES.

LES VERIERS, Switzerland, June 17(At the French Border) - Two hours after Premier Petain's broadcast ann ouncement that he had asked the Germans for peace, a fierce battle began to-day on the plain, beyond and behind Pontarlier, where large numbers of German mechanized units found their path blocked by hand-fighting French infinty. Light artillery fire of the French Maginot line began shelling German positions in Baden. German westwall guns replied.
