BRITISH SHOOT DOWN 60 NAZI RAIDERS IN 14-HOUR AIR DUEL

BRITISH AND ITALIAN . FORCES ENGAGED IN FAR EAST.

LONDON, Aug. 9 - In the fiercest aerial engagement of the war to date over the English Channel Thursday, British fliers shot down a total of 60 German raiders, 24 being bombers, 36 fighters, while losing 18 machines themselves.

Waves of German battle planes and bombers swooped over the Channel to attack an armed convoy. Only a few small British merchant ships were lost. The battle over the Channel lasted for 14 hours when the invaders fled.

RAIDS ON GERMANY: In retaliation for the German bombing attack on shipping Thursday, RAF bombers raided all important centres in Germany Thursday night, scoring hits and causing much distruction on German harbors, airdromes, docks and oil depots.

LONDON, Aug. 9 - Buly two raids were reported over England Friday. Two German bombers raided the northeast coast where bombs were dropped causing casualties but only 1 killed. Both German planes were shot down.

Two fast German fighter planes pulled a hit and run raid on a southwest coast town but failed to inflict serious damage.

ITALIAN COLUMNS DRIVE TOWARDS RED SEA

LONDON, Aug. 9 - Columns of Italian troops are moving against British Somaliland and heavy aerial and land fighting has occured Thursday and Friday near the Egyptian Border. Italian columns are also reported driving towards the Red Sea.

Although greatly outnumbered, British RAF planes broke up heavy formations of Italian bombing attacks Thursday when 15 enemy ships were shot down while the British lost 2 planes.

British sources expressed belief that Mussolini has put an army of half a million in Africa in preparation for a drive against Egypt and against the British Somaliland.

READY STRIKE, NEW YORK, Aug. 7 - RAF secret service men, back from scouting flights, said they are convinced the Germans have about completed plans for a blitzkreig attempt vs England, Columbia Broadcasting Co. in London reports.

SILVER PRODUCTION IN CANADA INCREASES

OTTAWA - Silver production in Canada during 1939 totalled 23,116,861 fine ounces valued at \$9,359,553 compared with 22,219, 195 cunces in 1938. The average price of silver in 1939 was 40.563 conts per fine ounce as against 43,447 cents in 1938. (N York prices transposed to Canadian funds) (New

British Columbia was by far the largest producer, the output coming mainly from the Sullivan silver-lead-zinc mine. Important contributions were also made by Silbak Premier, Barlorne, Pioneer and several other gold-quartz mines.

The Yukon production was mainly from the silver-load ores of the Mayo district.

Principal silver producing enterprises are located in British Columbia, Yukon and Northwest Territories, Flin Flon area in Saskatchewan-Venitoba, Ontario and Quebec.

MINING MAGNATE WILL INSPECT CLEAR CREEK OPERATIONS.

General A. D. McRae passed through Whitehorse last week on the P. A. A. plane, en route to Alaska to inspect his various mining enterpirses on Coal Creek and Woodchopper Creek where dred-

ges are now operating.
From Alaska General McRae planned to return to the Yukon to inspect his new mining operations at Clear Creek, in the McQuesten district. Hundreds of tons of freight, mining equipment and supplies have been shipped to Clear Creek for Canadian Placers this season as the eyes of the mining world are focussed on this new placer development in the Yukon where a crew of some 20 men are enagaged this season.

It is understood that General McRae may possibly acquire interests in promising placer properties in this Mayo district although nothing definite is known at this time of writing.

The Clear Creek camp means considerable to Mayo in that orders have been shipped from local stores to Canadian Placers this season. Mayo is the closest outfitting centre to the new camp, serviced by a downriver haul of 80 miles to the mouth of the McQuesten, from which point a first class road is nearing completion into the camp. So far this season Ed. Kimbel has shipped a considerable quantity of lumber from his mill here to Clear Creek for the Mc-Rae people.

Acquisition of placer properties in Mayo area by General McRae would mean a big boost to

this camp at the present time.

PREPARED, London, Aug. 7 - First Lord of the Admiralty Alexander told the Commons that airplanes had completed arrangements to deal with the German invasion, no matter what methods may be used and expressed supreme confidence the navy, air and armed forces could successfully combat a blitzkreig.

MONTREAL MAYOR JAILED, Montreal, Aug. 7 -

Camilien Houde, mayor of Montreal, was interned Tuesday, charged under a section of the War Measure Act . Houde had made a public statement telling the people not to regard the National Registration.

PLEADS FOR AID, Washington, Aug. 7 - General J. Pershing, in a broadcast, urged the United States to send a minimum of fifty destroyers to Britain's aid, asserting that "we shall be failing in our duty to America if we do not do it."

NAVY LOSES, London, Aug. 7 - Bearing the heavy burden of the war, the Royal Navy has lost 6,221 officers and men killed or missing since the war began. RAF casualties in eleven months of fighting were placed at more than 4,000.

SECOND DIVISION CROSSES, London, Aug. 5 Canada's second division, under command of Major-General Odlum, arrived at a northern British port last Friday on board an armada of luxurious liners under escort of naval guns and British planes without having sighted a single German bomber of the vaunted force Hitler boasts is effectively blockading United Kingdom. This contingent was the largest yet to cross the Atlantic.

BRITAIN ROUNDS UP JAPANESE, London, Aug. 5 Great Britain followed up the arrest of prominent Britons in Japan with an Empire wide round up of Japanese Saturday, including powerful Mitsu Bishi and Mitsui banking interests. The arrests here and elsewhere in the Empire were coupled with inconfirmed reports of uncovering a widespread spy ring branching from London, throughout the Empire, notably Canada, Australia and Burma.

Tension between Britain and Japan appeared

to ease Tuesday.

FIVE-MAN CABINET, LONDON, Aug. 5 - Lord
Beaverbrook, Canadian-born minister of Aircraft Production, has been invited by Premier
