BRITISH FLIERS BLAST BERLIN FOR SEVEN HOURS SOLID

140 GERMAN PLANES SHOT DOWN BY RAF FRIDAY

LONDON, Sept: 26: Berlin received its heaviest pounding of the war last night when waves of RAF bombers attacked the city for seven hours. Kiel naval base was also attacked and channel ports blasted again. London outskirts were heavily bombed but centre of the city was comparatively quiet. The new defence of outer London came into action last night for the first time and proved effective.

The Admiralty announced that the British submarine H-49 sank two merchant ships and Italians admit a torpedo boat was sunk in the

Aegean sea by British sub.

General De Gaulle's force and supporting British warships were withdrawn from Dakar, on the African coast, when it became apparent that the port could not be taken without a major military operation. Two of three French submarines which left the harbor to engage the warships were sunk. The Vichy government announced they now consider the Dakar incident closed.

British warships again shelled Italian positions at Sidi Barani and British planes bomb

ed Italian base at Tobruk.

French planes bombed Gibraltar in retaliation for the British attack on Dakar.

LONDON, Sept. 27 - One hundred and forty. German planes were shot down in air battles over England in Friday's fighting. Eighty Nazi raiders were downed Thursday while the RAF lost 25 machines but many of the pilots were saved.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 - There are some hints in controlled German and Italian sections that Hitler's scheduled invasion of Britain may be postponed until next year. It is the first time since the battle of Britain opened that the Axis commentators have admitted such a possibility.

LONDON, Sept. 23 - It was officially announ ced Sunday that a refugee ship en route to Canada had been torpedoed with the loss of 293 lives, 83 of which were evacuee children. The attack occured 600 miles from land. Many who got away from the ship, which sank in 20 minutes, perished from exposure before being picked up 20 hours later.

FIRE RUINS BANK OF MONTREAL PREMISES ON FRONT STREET

A. T. HALL, MANAGER OF THE LOCAL BRANCH OF THE BANK OF MONTREAL ANNOUNCED TO-DAY THAT THE BUSINESS OF THE BANK WILL BE CARRIED ON IN TEMPORARY QUARTERS, FOR THE NEXT TWO WEEKS AT LEAST, IN A SUIT OF ROOMS IN THE MERVYN HOTEL, MESSRS HALL AND MCNAUGHTON PLAN ON MOVING INTO THE TEMPORARY QUARTERS THIS WEEK END AND WILL BE CONDUCTING THE BANK BUSINESS THERE, STARTING MONDAY MORNING, SEPT. 30TH.

Fire, which broke out with explosive swiftness in the kitchen of the Bank of Montreal
building on front street about 6.30 o'clock
Thursday night, practically ruined the interior of that two-story frame structure,
Mayo's busiest and most up-to-date business
centre.

None of the bank's books, currency or important papers, which were locked up in the big safe at the end of the building, were damaged. But the bank's furniture and fixtures and the furnishings and personal effects of both A. T. Hall, Manager, and Fraser McNaughton, Teller, were a total loss. These included a large amount of clothing, furniture, radios, cameras and other personal belongings to the value of \$1,000 apiece.

CARRY ON MORNING AFTER: With their bank premises gutted and charred by the flames & smoke, Bankers Hall and McNaughton "carried on" Friday in temporary quarters in the White Pass office, pending instructions from the Superintendent's Department in Vancouver.

Only fifteen minutes before the fire broke out, Mr. Hall had left the bank to go out to dinner. Everything was O. K. in the building when the manager locked up. Fraser McNaughton, Teller, had gone out to dinner a short time before Mr. Hall. A small fire had been left burning in a heater in the kitchen but this stove had been turned off tightly.

Mickey Nobuto, baker at the G. N. Cafe, this side of the bank building, was packing in an armful of wood behind the cafe when he heard what sounded like an explosion, he related. Then he saw flames sprout up inside.

BANK FIRE (Cont'd)

Running to the siren on the corner opposite Mervyn's Hotel, Mickey turned in a general alarm. Fortunately there was scarcely any wind blowing at the time.

Dozens of Mayoites, including members of the volunteer fire department, leapt up from their dinners upon hearing the siren's whine and rushed downtown.

By that time the red glare of the flames could be plainly seen against the black curtain of

Valuable minutes were lost in getting a line of hose into action when the fire department's truck wouldn't start, allegedly because there was no gas in the tank. A good oatburner, such as the famous old fire horse in Dawson years ago, would have been at the fire in jig time.

Willing volunteers jumped into the breach and helped rush the hose line from the pumping plant to the burning building where flames roared out the kitchen window and up the east side of the building, spewing twisting billows of smoke thruout the interior. As soon as the fire fighters got the hose pounding full blast, the blaze was quickly put under control and extinguished. Members of the volunteer squud under Fire Chief Joe Longtin and energetic helpers, did yeoman service in checking the fire. George Nagano and Wickey Nebuta Long Telephia aid by manning Mickey Nobuto lent valuable aid by running a smaller line of hose from the hotel to the blaz-

ing building.

FLYING GLASS: An exciting moment occured when either pressure of a blast from the big power hose or the force of the heat drove one of the bank large, plate glass windows in front of the bank building, hurtling out across the street. A number of spectators had to duck the flying glass.

It is generally believed that some sort of explosion in the kitchen caused the fire to break

out and spread so rapidly. One or two other Mayoites who were passing near the bank building at the time the blaze broke out, say they also heard a sharp report, then saw the flames.

The kitchen is located in the north-east cor-

ner of the building and that's where the worst damage was done as revealed by the crisp, charred

MODERN BUILDING: Situated on the second lot removed from the Mervyn Hotel, going east, the two-story frame building was erected two years ago by Eugene Binet, former pioneer Mayo business-man, for occupancy by the Bank of Montreal on a rental basis. The structure was the most modern of its kind in Mayo, if not in the whole Yukon, while the finishings were all done with outside lumber brought in specially for the purpose. Manager Hall and members of his staff during the past two years had spent much time and effort in fixing up the banking lobby and living quarters, Only recently Fraser McNaughton , present Teller, completed a very thorough painting and varnishing job on the interior, in his spare time. new and modern, many of them installled by Mr. Hall and members of the staff personally, from time to time.

As recently as last Saturday McNaughton had moved a newly-purchased studio couch That, too, went up in into his apartment.

Mr. Hall believes that owner Eugene Binet holds a three-year insurance policy on the damaged building. This policy, he thinks, was due to expire in about ten day's time.

YUKON EXPERIENCE: Since he has been manager for the Bank of Montreal in Mayo, Mr. Hall has undergone a major flood (the flood of 1936 when he transacted banking business from the wallet in his hip pocket) and now a serious fire. It is a strange coincidence that nearly twenty two years ago, to the very date and hour of Thursday night's fire, he was a participant in another great flagration - the battle during the Great War at Canal du Nord on the western front. He was eighteen then, in active service with the British army at one of the toughest and hottest spots on the entire battlefront. Jack Hawthorne, well known Mayo silver miner, was in the same outfit; there at the same time.

Fortunately Thursday night's fire occured at a slack time as far as the bank staff is concerned. Had the fire happened a week earlier the bank staff would have been greatly hampered in handling the big rush of business occasioned when the main T. Y. operations closed down and so many Silverites were in town fixing up their affairs before heading

FAIRCHILD SOUTH TO-DAY VIA MAYO; BELLANCA & VINES WENT DIRECT

After lunching here "Doc" Kubicek hopped for Whitehorse with his passengers. He brought regular mail and airmail from Dawson; took

Mayo airmail south.

Whipped along the skyway by a strong headwind, Pilot Kubicek made a record trip to
Mayo last Sunday of 1 hr. 15 minutes and only
2 hours flying time from Whitehorse to Dawson,
not counting his brief stop here. Kubicek also made remarkable time flying south Monday but remarkable for its slowness. Bucking terrific headwind most of the way, it took him nearly six hours elapsed time to reach the Gateway City, from Dawson, via Mayo.
