LONDON, Oct. 4 - The Admiralty has announced the sinking of seven German submarines & 2 Italian subs. Attacks by enemy U-boats it was pointed out, have been more successful against shipping lately on account of the Nazis being able to use French ports more accessible for striking at British shipping.

A state of siege has been placed on Dakar and strong measures are there from joining General DeGaulle's supp-orters. It is reported that many Frenchmen in Dakar are swinging over to the cause of Free Frenchmen led by DeGaulle.

The Miner is in receipt of a short dispatch this week from Capt. George Black, M. P. stating that recruting has now started in the Yukon.

Mr. Black's letter, dated from Whitehorse,

Oct. 1st. reads in part:

"The Officer Commanding R. C. M. P., at Dawson, Inspector Grennan wired me here today that he has been instructed to recruit in Yukon 150 men for the Canadian Army, from Dawson, Mayo and Whitehorse.

The R. C. M. P. at each of those places are to act as recruiting officers. The civilian doctors at each place will make the medical examinations. The men as enlisted will report to Colonel Beeston at Victoria for further orders."

ALIENS NATURALIZED SINCE 1922 MUST REGISTER_

The Registrar General of Enemy Aliens desires it to be known that the Defence of Canada Regulations now require all persons who have become naturalized British subjects since the first day of September, 1922, who at the time of their naturalization were of German or Ital ian nationality, or of the nationality of any territory which was under German or Italian control at the outbreak of war, to report for registration without delay to the nearest Registrar of Enemy Aliens. (R. C. M. P. post in Mayo). Notices to this effect have been posted around town.

Persons coming within the scope of this order should clearly understand that this registration is in addition to, and entirely separate from, National Registration.

CRUCIAL WORLDS SERIES GAME ON SUNDAY

BRITAIN PREPARES COUNTER MOVES AGAINST NEW JAPANESE, ITALIAN, GERMAN ALLIANCE

LONDON, Tues. Sept. 30 - Great Britain was reported to be preparing a threefold answer to the new triple alliance uniting Japan with the exis powers. This would be the reopening of the Burma road, allowing more supplies for China, the conclusion of a new Pacific defence arrangement with Australia and the United States and increase of Dominion goods and essential raw materials from Japan Great Britain and the United States.

Japan's threat to enter the war on the side of her new partners met a prompt British warning that Britain is stelled in experience and in a different mood from a

year ago.

President Roosevelt has already declared an embargo from the United States of vital sorap iron for Japan and is further speeding up all vital defences.

LARGE SCALE ATTACKS AGAINST BRITAIN MONDAY

LONDON, Mon. Sept. 30 - Large scale daylight attacks on Britain were resumed today after a comparative week-end hull. So far no official figures have been released.

Last night's attacks were heavier usual and the Merseyside area was raided continually throughout the night and many

fires were started.

The Royal Air Force ranged over wide areas in Germany last night. Military objectives in Stuttgart and Magdeburg were subjected to concentrated attacks. The Bosch magneto concentrated attacks. factory was successfully attacked.

British long-range guns pounded against Calais today and the German artillery replied

by dropping shells into Dover.
On Sunday 10 enemy planes were destroyed and only 4 British ships lost.
