BRITISH FORCES HAND ITALIANS CRUSHING DEFEAT IN EGYPT

40,000 Prisoners, Great Quantities of Guns, Supplies, and 5 Generals Fall Prisoners to Lightning British Thrust.

CAIRO, Dec. 14 - The Italian flight from Egypt following the sudden lightning offens-ive launched by the British forces at dawn Monday, has turned into a major disaster for Mussolini.

The British have encircled the fleeing Italian forces in a bottleneck through which they must either pass or be captured or annihilated. Royal Air Force planes are attacking the fleeing columns from the air while British naval units are pounding them from

"At least 40,000 Italian prisoners have been taken by the British in addition to thousands of trucks, motorcycles, guns and military equipment. Five generals are included with the present prisoners.

Striking with lightning swiftness at dawn Monday the British land, sea and air forces took the Italian lines completely in a surprise attack. British tanks and mechanized units broke through the Italian outposts and made possible the encirclement of the strongly fortified Italian base at Sidi Barrani. For three months Good Graziani had fully fortified Sidi Barrani, captured summer when the Italians drove through into Egypt. In three days the British forces, employing Blitz tactics copied from the German invasion of France, drove the Italins from Egypt and across the Libyan border. Raymond Collishaw, Nanaimo flier, who was

Canada's third ranking ace during the last war, is directing the Royal Air Force action against the Italians in the Middle East. In three days of fighting the RAF drove the Italian planes out of the air, shooting down 44 against 4 lost by the British.

Surprised and rattled, Italian troops are reported to have shown little fight and surr-

endered easily.

If the fleeing Italian forces are to escape they must depend on the Italian navy to rescue them. British warships are waiting this very opportunity to engage the balance of the Italian fleet.

In Albania the Greek forces continue to drive the Italian armies into the sea where frantic efforts are being made to evacuate them to the mainland. Fighting for their very lives Italian resistance on certain sections of the Albanian front was reported the stiffest yet encountered by the Greeks.

LORD LOTHIAN DIES SUDDENLY

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 12 - Lord Lothian, 58-year old British Ambassador to the United States, died suddenly at his Embassy home following a two-day illness. His sudden death at a time like this, has come as a heavy blow to the Empire. Lord Lothian had just returned recently from a trip to England and a few days before his illness presented a complete picture of Great Britain's resources to the Administration leaders of the States. In a speech Wednesday night, which had to be read owing to his illness, he stated that Britain needed all the help possible from the United States and added that with this help Britain was confident of defeating her enemies in 1942, if not sooner.

The funeral is being held Sunday and the ashes will be interred at Arlington Cemetry temporarily. Although the names of Anthony Eden and the Duke of Windsor have been mentioned as Lord Lothian's successor, it was believed Friday that the post would be offered to Britain's Minister of Supply in the Churchill cabinet.

DUKE, DUCHESS VISIT MIAMI

MIAMI, Florida, Dec. 11 - The Duke Duchess of Windsor arrived at Miami aboard the yacht Southern Cross early this week where the Duchess underwent a dental operation.

On Friday the Duke had a two hour talk with President Roosevelt aboard the U. S. cruiser Tuskaloosa in the Caribbean. He was flown to the cruiser by a navy plane. It is reported the Duke discussed important naval bases in the Bahamas with the President. These bases were recently leased from Britain by the States in echange for U. S. destroyers.

KING GEORGE'S BIRTHDAY TO-DAY

LONDON, Dec. 14 - His Majesty King George and Queen Elizebeth and their two daughters left for an unnamed part of the country day where the King will observe his 45th. birthday quietly. No special celebration of any kind will be held throughout the Empire in observance of the occasion except the flying of the Union Jack from all government and public buildings.

ETTER

KENO CITY, Dec. 11, 1940

TO THE MAYO MINER:

Am enclosing herewith, as promised, copy of reason given by the Governor in Council for disallowing Bills 7, 8 & 9 passed by the Yukon Territorial Council at the last session.

You will note that the right of the Territory to submit a Plebiscite to the people, to ascertain their will regarding Legislation on a purely local matter, has been ignored. It would therefore appear that any Legislation passed by the Territorial Council on any matter whatsoever, may be disallowed by the Governor in Council at his discretion, even though said Legislation may be well within the rights of the Territorial Council to enact under the jurisdiction granted the Territory by the Yukon Act of 1919. So what:

> Signed: E. J. CORP Keno Hill.

Reasons for Disapproval of Bills 7,8 & 9, passed by the Council.

(a) - There is no reason to believe that the sale of spirituous liquors by the glass or bottle in licensed premises, instead of being obtained as at present by purchase from the Government liquor stores, would be of benefit to the residents of the Yukon Territory.

(b) - The proposed sale of such liquors from the Government liquor stores to the licensees at a discount would result in a reduction in that part of the Territorial revenue which is raised inside the Territory.

(c) - That insemuch as the Territorial Governement depends on a substantial annual grant from the Federal Treasury, such proposed reduction in the locally raised revenue would not

be justified. (d) - The Liquor licensees would in most instances by hotelkeepers, who are at present licensed to sell beer on their premises. As the privilege of selling spirituous liquors in such premises, has not been granted in any of the Provinces of the Dominion, or in the Northwest Territories, there seems no reason why this practise should be introduced in the Yukon Territory.

- The dispensing of spirituous liquors by licensees lends itself to many abuses which may develop. These include such practises as diluting, altering and mixing of various standard brands resulting in uncertainty on the part of the public in regard to what they are receiving over the counter. The opportunities for private gain by the licensees are practically unlimited.

(f) - In addition to the expected reductions

of revenue to the Government liquor stores by the sale of spirituous liquors to licensees at a discount, there is to be taken into account the increased costs of inspection which would be necessary if such liquors in addition to beer, were to be dispensed over the counter.

(g) - The Sale of spirituous liquors by the glass or bottle in licensed premises in the Tukon Territory, would be a retrograde step and not in the interests of the Public.

HITLER MAY STILL TRY TO INVADE ENGLAND OR ATTACK ITALY

LONDON, Dec. 14 - Heavy concentration of German troops on the Swiss & Austrian borders are reported indicating that if Italy has to call for an Armistice the Nazis will march into Italy to beat the British to the important plants and factories in the North.

Hitler may yet try an inv-asion of England, some now believe, owing to the smashing blow dealt to Italy.

MOSCOW GAVE HITLER WORST SETBACK, WAR

LONDON, Dec. 10 - It has now been learned that Soviet Russia gave Hitler his hard-est blow of the war recently as a result of the parley between Molotoff and Hitler in which the Soviet Prime Minist-er warned the German leader that there was no room the Balkans for both Russia &

Germany. Hitler's speech before 12,000 factory workers on Monday was aimed directly at Moscow and more Communistic than Joseph Stalin himself could make, said the New York Times. His speech has been termed "an apologetic excuse." He made no mention of his threatened invasion against England, said nothing about the Italian defeats but told his listeners that Germany was safe from invasion. It was the first time Hitler has even hinted at such a progect of Germany being invaded.

U. S. FLEET IN MOTION

WASH, Dec. 10 - Following new sanctions on steel and iron to Japan, announced recently, the United States' Pac ific fleet began mysterious manoeuvres from Pacific bases this week. The recent United States embargoes will iously impede Japan's war effort, it is pointed out.
