HITLER LAUNCHES DRIVE AGAINST SOVIET RUSSIA

RED ARMY TAKING UP FORTIFIED POSITIONS ALONG THE STALIN LINE

(By Radio) Friday, June 27 - It is reported to-night that the Red Army is retreating from Lithuania and northern Poland to take up fortified positions along the Stalin line inside the borders of Soviet Russia proper.

Heavy fighting between the German and Russian armies continued to-day with strong forces of tanks, mechanized divisions and planes being thrown into the fray.

Heavy bombing raids were carried out by the Soviet air force against Finnish ports where large numbers of German troops are said to be landing.

HITLER CARRIES OUT LONG AWAITED ATTACK VERSUS RUSSIA SUNDAY, JUNE 22

LONDON, June 22 - At dawn to-day German troops, mechanized divisions and bomber and fighter planes opened its long-threatened drive against Soviet Russia in a gigantic thrust aimed at the rich Ukrainian oil and wheat fields. Soviet high command reports the shooting down of 65 German planes during the first day of fighting between Germany and the Soviet.

In a radio broadcast Sunday Prime Minister Winston Churchill pledged all aid to Russia.

In a terrific air duel over the English Channel last Friday and Saturday British fighter pilots shot down over 70 Nazi planes.

OIL FIELDS SET ABLAZE.

MOSCOW, June 27 - Russian bombers to-day attacked and set afire the vital Rumanian oil fields. Flames from the burning oil wells could be seen for miles away.

A British delegation arrived in Moscow Friday to begin work on a joint Soviet-British plan of war cooperation against Germany. Other British military experts are due to arrive in Moscow shortly. In charge of the Soviet end of these negotiations is M. Litvinoff, former Soviet Foreign Minister and one-time Russian ambassador to Britain.

WERNECKES ARRIVE FROM SOUTH BY PLANE

Livingston Wernecke, General Manager for the Treadwell Yukon Corporation Ltd., accompanied by Mrs. Wernecke and daughter Claire, arrived at Mayo Lake by plane 4 o'clock last Saturday afternoon and will be remaining in this district for the next few weeks.

Mr. Wernecke is here on his annual summer tour of inspection and supervision of T. Y. operations in this district. He made a trip to Mayo by car on Wednesday of this week, returning to Mayo Lake the same evening. Since his arrival here a week ago the T. Y. General Manager has been busy reviewing his company's operations in this district.

TWO PLANE LANDINGS TO-DAY

Flying the Travelair "BPV," Pilot Bill Emery came in from Whitehorse to-day, bringing mail and John Whitney as passenger for Mayo. From Mayo Pilot Emery went on to Dawson, returning south via the McQuesten and Mayo this afternoon. Airmail from Dawson was brought in on the plane and an airmail was dispatched from here.

On Thursday Pilots Wasson and Woods flew the Fairchild to Mayo from Whitehorse and went on to Dawson. The plane brought airmail. Mrs. Humen, a tourist, was a passenger on Thursday's northbound flight. Bishop Geddes boarded the plane here for the flight to Dawson.

R. A. F. IN HEAVY RAID OVER CHANNEL PORTS

LONDON, June 27 - For the 17th. night in succession bombers and fighter planes of the Royal Air Force carried out heavy air raids against Germany and German-occupied channel ports Friday night. Fires could be seen for miles away from this side of the channel. It was the heaviest RAF raid yet carried out so far during the war.

MAYO MORE THAN DOUBLES ITS QUOTA

DRILLING OPERATIONS ON HAGGART THIS SUMMER MAY LEAD TO LARGER MINING OPERATION NEXT YEAR

If drilling operations in the Haggart Ck. area prove successful this season, the Potter interests will enter this mineral field on a larger scale next year.

So Robert S. Potter informed the Miner this week.

The new Armstrong Bucyrus diesel powered drill which Potter shipped to Mayo this summer, was freighted out to Haggart last week and is now in operation at Murphy's pup, five miles above the McQuesten. Paul Doal, who arrived here at the same time as Mr. Potter from Matheson, Ontario, is in charge of drilling operations. Other members of the drilling crew include Jack Harcourt, and George Barnes, both from the east, and Louis Brown, well-known Yukon trapper and prospector.

Mr. and Mrs. Potter left for Haggart Creek on Wednesday of this week and expect to live on the Creek for the balance of the summer. Potter has purchased lumber here and this has already gone out to Haggart where a house is now being built for the Potters at the Barker camp. Mr. and Mrs. Harcourt will also live at Haggart during the summer.

"Our present drilling company - the Mayukon Placer Gold Mines Ltd., is only a small organization at the present time," Potter explained. "We are capitalized at \$100,000 and the company is controlled by just a few shareholders. If we can produce results this season after giving the ground a thorough test with the drill, we plan on entering the mining field here on a larger scale next year. At the present time the Mayukon company has a lease on 12 miles of ground on Haggart, below the Barker operations, in which the well known eastern mining magnate is also interested.

Last week members of the drill crew fixed up a temporary bridge at the log jam on the McQuesten. "We just did enough work," Potter stated, "to allow the drill to be freighted across. "It is only a temporary bridge."

Last week a new Dodge station wagon arrived here for the Mayukon company. This car will be based at the summit for the time being, according to Mr. Potter. The main idea in bringing in the type of truck was to insure a quick means of transportation to Mayo in case of accident or sickness out on Haggart Creek.

"Between four and five men will be engaged on the drill when it is swinging," Potter declared. Operations will continue throughout the summer and fall and probably during part of the winter.

Mining operations will be started next summer if the drilling tests this season prove favourable, Mr. Potter said.

MRS. C. G. MAY LEAVES FOR EDMONTON

To undergo medical treatment, Mrs. C. G. May was an outgoing passenger on the Pilgrim plane Wednesday, en route to Edmonton.

ALEX DAME, veteran northern flier who was a member of the White Pass flying staff last winter, is back in the saddle again for Yukon Southern Air Transport.

YUKON SUBSCRIBES OVER HALF A MILLION TO VICTORY LOAN

Mayo More Than Doubles
Quota with \$51,850.

In an airmail letter received to-day by the Miner from Wm. E. Thomson, Yukon Organizer Victory Loan, 1941, he wishes to express the thanks of the Central Committee of the Victory Loan 1941 Campaign for the splendid performance of the Mayo and district residents.

"The ability of your Community," writes Mr. Thomson, "to double their quota under the present circumstances speaks well not only for the Committee but for the co-operation which they must have received from every single resident."

As predicted in last week's issue, the Mayo district doubled its original quota of \$25,000 and then added another \$1,850 as well.

The final Mayo figure reveals that \$51,850 was subscribed in this district.

Owing to the returns from outlying camps not being in completely, the Mayo Committee received a one-day extension, the books closing here Monday night. In comparison with other Yukon centres Mayo's quota rate at 2.03 is just a shade below Dawson's at 2.1 and above Whitehorse with 1.04. Had complete returns been in by Monday it is believed Mayo's quota rate would even have topped Dawson's. Subscriptions from Haggart Creek were not included in arriving at the quota rate of 2.03.
