SPECIAL RULES AND CONDITIONS OF THIS CLASSIFICATION

1. All articles will be charged at gross weight, without regard to weight given by shippers and inserted in bills of lading; except that when an estimated weight is given in the classification, such estimated weight will apply, unless the actual weight is greater.

2. When articles are shipped under false names in order to deceive the carrier, or to avoid this classification, Agents at destination will collect charges according to proper classification.

3. Charges for boilers and other articles which require two or more cars should be computed at actual weight, subject to minimum weights established by carrier for each car used.

4. When empty packages are offered for shipment at the rates provided in this Classification for returned empty packages, the Agent must satisfy himself that they have been used, when filled, in the transportation of a regular consignment over the road, showing on way bill covering the return packages the billing reference for original shipment when packages were forwarded filled. If Agents have reason to believe that the packages, when filled, were originally forwarded by express or by competing lines, they will make a note to that effect on the way bill and charge at the regular rates for new packages.

5. All freight is subject to transfer en route as the necessity or convenience of the carriers require, and should be loaded in such a manner that it can be transferred and reloaded without injury.

6. Carriers shall have the right to refuse to receive any freight offered for shipment which is likely to damage other freight, boats or cars.

7. Each package must be plainly marked, showing consignee and destination.

8. All freight of perishable character, such as fresh meat, etc., requiring refrigerator service, will be subject to the usual additional charges for such service.

9. Ice for the preservation of freight in carloads, loaded in refrigerator

cars, will be carried free. If the ice is furnished by the company a charge of \$10.00 for icing each car will be made. When ice is furnished by the company for L. C. L. shipments, it will be charged for on the basis of 2 cents per pound. Iced shipments in less than carload lots, the gross weights will be used. Freight charges will be assessed on the basis of gross weights.

10. Shipments forwarded consigned to shipper's order, or "To Order," "Notify _____," the name of the person to be notified must appear on the shipping receipt and bill of lading. Initial lines should see that this rule is carried out and full reference given on manifests or way bills to enable agent at destination to advise consignees promptly on arrival of the freight and to prevent delays, as all such shipments held on account of delays of this character will be subject to storage charges.

11. When not otherwise specified the rating given on shipments in boxes shall apply on shipments in barrels or kegs. The terms "boxed," "in boxes" and "in barrels" used in this Classification are intended to mean completely enclosed, and will apply only on such packages made of wood, and the term "crated" or "in crates" to mean enclosed on all sides by wood framework or slats; otherwise shippers assume all responsibility as to condition of goods on arrival at destination, on account of improper packing or not carrying out requirements of the Classification. All movable parts of machinery, boilers, etc., liable to breakages or loss from handling in transit must be detached and boxed; if this is not done the carriers will not hold themselves responsible for any breakage or loss of such pieces in transit.

12. All steel or iron articles shipped in bundles, including pipe one inch and under in diameter, must be bound with wire, and metal or leather tagged. Pipe over one inch in diameter, if not in bundles, each piece must be metal or leather tagged, or must be clearly marked with paint.

13. The rating on articles in cans, boxed or crated, should not exceed the rating on similar articles (in bulk) in barrels, tierces, kegs, boxes, etc., and vice versa.

14. Articles not named in this Classification which are classified commercially the same or analogous to those named, will take the same rate as the article to which they are analogous. But when articles are not classified or not clearly analogous to articles which are, a special ruling must be asked for.

15. When not otherwise specified in this Classification, an additional charge will be made for handling heavy packages, including boilers (page 38), and mining machinery (page 39), as follows:

Over 4,000 lbs. and not more than 6,000 lbs.,	add 10% to rate.
Over 6,000 lbs. and not more than 8,000 lbs.,	add 15% to rate.
Over 8,000 lbs. and not more than 10,000 lbs.,	add 20% to rate.
Over 10,000 lbs. and not more than 12,000 lbs.,	add 25% to rate.
Over 12,000 lbs. and not more than 14,000 lbs.,	add 30% to rate.
Over 14,000 lbs. and not more than 16,000 lbs.,	add 35% to rate.
Over 16,000 lbs. and not more than 18,000 lbs.,	add 40% to rate.
Over 18,000 lbs. and not more than 20,000 lbs.,	add 45% to rate.
Over 20,000 lbs.,	special contract.

16. Personal effects, curios and household goods must be fully prepaid and guaranteed.

17. Live Stock must not be included on Bill of Lading or Shipping Receipt with shipments of other freight.

18. Charges on Live Stock must be fully prepaid.

19. Separate Bills of Lading or Shipping Receipts must be made for per-

ishable and non-perishable freight, but in such cases carload rates will apply if the goods aggregate 20,000 lbs., and are all forwarded at one time from one shipper to one consignee. (Exception to Rule 24.)

20. Perishable freight and freight of doubtful value must be fully prepaid, excepting common potatoes, onions, hams, bacon, and smoked meats shipped between June 15th and August 15th, inclusive.

Note.—The following articles will be considered perishable.

Vegetables, fresh.
Beer (bulk) in wood
Butter, fresh.
Eggs, fresh.
Fruits, fresh.
Fish, fresh.
Meats, fresh.
Hams.
Bacon.

Also all freight of similar character and freight liable to be damaged by frosts or other climatic conditions, or by delays in transit.

21. When the Classification provides for limited or restricted valuation of articles, the release given by shippers should clearly state the limitation of valuation, and this should not be exceeded as a basis for settlement of any loss or damage for which carriers may be liable. Articles provided in classification at limited or restricted valuation and not provided for without valuation are subject to an additional charge of 25 per cent when shipped without valuation, except that when provision is made in body of classification for rating at unlimited valuation such rating will govern.

22. The amount charged for less than a carload of freight should not exceed the charges on a minimum carload of 20,000 lbs. If there is not actually 20,000 lbs. in one shipment, or enough to make up a minimum car, it will be permissible to increase the weight of the lowest class freight in the shipment, by adding enough to make a minimum carload.

23. In no case, unless specially provided for in the Classification, will a carload be considered less than 20,000 lbs.

24. Provisions for carload ratings shown in this tariff will apply only on shipments covered by one bill of lading from one shipper to one consignee. (See Rule 19.)

A. Carload rates are not applicable on freight consigned to agents for delivery to various parties, and agents at destination will not distribute carload shipments of property among two or more consignees.

B. Agents will not send notice of arrival to more than one party, and will make only one expense bill for the charges on the entire carload.

C. In case the original consignee will not accept notice of arrival and pay the charges on the entire carload and take delivery of the same, or if proper written authority is in the hands of the agent ordering delivery to more than one consignee, agents are required to make separate notices and expense bills, and correct the way bill and collect on each shipment at less than carload rates.

25. The special ratings made in this Classification are for shipments made subject to the following conditions:

No carrier or party in possession of any of the property provided for in this Classification shall be liable for any loss thereof, or damage thereto, from ANY CAUSES BEYOND ITS CONTROL, by breakage, chafing, crushing, loss in weight, changes in weather, heat, frost, wet or decay, rust of metals or metallic goods, escape of live poultry, tearing, cutting or soiling of fabrics or paper in bales or bundles, or fermentation of liquids.

Shipments not made on above conditions are subject to ordinary rates, equivalent to 25 per cent. additional.

26. Gold, gold dust, jewelers' sweepings and tailings, silver foil or leaf, bullion, specie, precious stones and valuable documents not taken. (Should be shipped by express.)
