





Nails became brittle
from the extreme cold
and had to be heated before using to prevent
their breaking. Gasoline
shovel was used to excavate the basement while
the footings were done
by hand.

The building is of simple wood frame construction. Exterior walls are sheathed with redwood siding and protected with common oil stain. About 55,000 board feet of red wood was used on the structure which contains 49,000 square feet of office space. It is heated by circulating warm air; the furnace fuel, natural gas. Construction was completed by March, 1943, and BPC started moving was not completed and accepted by BPC and fully occupied until May, 1943. Jesuit College building was evacuated almost completely by the NWSC this week and the bulk of Rear Echelon personnel, exclusive of the Railhead staff, moved into the BPC building on Jasper Avenue.
