"This operation," said Gen. MacArthur, "has driven a corridor from east to west through the Philippines, which is now definitely cut in two and will enable us to dominate the sea and air routes which reach to the China coast."

The new landing, representing an advance by liberations forces westward of about 600 statute miles, took Lt. Gen. Walter Krueger's 6th Army to within 200 miles or less of Manila,



Loans for these three purposes are available to veterans who served on or after 16 September 1940 and before the end of the war, and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, after active service of 90 days or more, or because of service—incurred injury or disability.

There are no set rules for every type of loan, but general—
