Yukon Employment and Skills Survey 2022

Highlights:

- In the fall of 2022, based on the population aged 18 to 65 years, Yukon's labour force totalled 24,290 people; 23,481 employed and 809 unemployed.
- Private businesses and corporations employed the largest proportion of workers in 2022 (48.4%), while government employment accounted for 41.9% of workers. Employees working for non-profit organizations made up 6.4% of the employed workforce.
- Harvesting, landscaping and natural resources labourers averaged the most hours worked per week at 64.9 hours.

In the fall (September to November) of 2022, Yukon Bureau of Statistics (YBS) conducted the Yukon Employment and Skills Survey to collect data from individuals in the age group of 18 to 65 years living in a randomly drawn sample of Yukon households (see note on methodology on page 17). The survey collected data on employment; unemployment; skills, education and training; as well as on selected demographic variables. The purpose of the survey is to produce labour supply data as supplement to the labour demand data produced by the <u>Yukon Labour Demand</u> <u>Survey</u> and the <u>Yukon Business Survey</u>.

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

In the fall of 2022, based on the population aged 18 to 65 years, Yukon's labour force included 24,290 people, accounting for an 80.8% participation rate; 5,465 people were not in the labour force. Of the labour force, 23,481 were employed and 809 were unemployed, resulting in a 78.1% employment rate, and a 3.3% unemployment rate.

EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION

Multiple Job Holders, Yukon, 2022

In the fall of 2022, 74.9% of employed persons working in Yukon, held only one job (17,405 people); 15.7% (3,651 people) held two jobs; 2.2% had three jobs (506 people); and 1.1% (250 people) held more than three jobs.

In the fall of 2022, Harvesting, landscaping and natural resources labourers averaged the most hours worked per week (64.9 hours). Retail sales supervisors and specialized sales occupations averaged the lowest (33.8 hours). Yukon's overall average was 41.8 hours per week.

Workers in **Senior management occupations** reported the highest average wage rate at \$58.73 per hour. Workers in **Sales support occupations** reported the lowest average wage rate at \$18.26 per hour. The overall average wage rate in Yukon was \$36.80 per hour.

Harvesting, landscaping and natural resources labourers had the highest average numbers of years in their current jobs at 18.6 years.



Of those people who had both three years or less experience in their current primary position in the fall of 2022, and also were employed in a different occupational category in their previous role:

- 258 people left a position in the Trades, transport, equipment operators and related occupations, to a • position within the Service support and other service occupations, n.e.c.;
- 183 people left a position in the Occupations in education, law and social, and community and • government services, to a position in the Specialized middle management occupations; and
- 141 people left a position in the Health occupations, to a position in the Professional occupations in law • and social, community and government services.

In the fall of 2022, 48.4% of Yukon workers were employed by a private business or corporation* in their primary job, 6.4% were employed by non-profit organizations and 1.5% were employed by Other employers.

Government^{**} employment accounted for 41.9% of the employed labour force (primary job), with two-thirds of government workers (6,424, or 66.0%) employed by the Yukon government. First Nations governments employed 1,432 workers (14.7%), the federal government employed 1,145 workers (11.8%) and municipal governments employed 620 workers (6.4%).

In the fall of 2022, a total of 552 Yukon residents were employed outside Yukon. This accounted for 2.3% of all employed persons in Yukon. The most common reasons for not working in Yukon were: **Employer is** outside Yukon (45.1%); Pay is higher outside Yukon (19.6%); and Personal/family responsibilities (13.9%).

Overall, 83.0% of respondents felt they **did** have enough opportunity to use the knowledge and skills they had in their primary job. There were five occupation categories where all respondents reported they **did** have enough opportunity to use the knowledge and skills they have.

The occupation with the highest proportion of workers who **did not** feel they had enough opportunity to use the skills and knowledge they had, was Sales support occupations (28.7%) followed by Service supervisors and specialized service occupations (21.1%); and Technical occupations related to natural and applied sciences (20.1%).

Overall, 2,612 people, or 11.2% of those working in Yukon, felt that they did not have enough opportunity in their current primary jobs to use their knowledge or skills.

The most common knowledge or skills that respondents were not fully using were: Leadership and communication skills (46.8%); Analytical, trouble-shooting, problem-solving skills (33.5%); and Trades related skills (25.3%).

Overall, 89.7% of respondents felt they **did** have adequate skills and training for their current primary job.

There were nine occupation categories where all respondents reported they were adequately skilled and trained for their current jobs.

The occupations with the highest proportion of workers who did not feel they were adequately skilled and trained for their current job were Administrative and financial supervisors and administrative occupations (14.7%); Care providers and educational, legal and public protection support occupations (12.3%); and Technical occupations in health (11.8%).

Overall, 1,324, or 5.7% of people in Yukon aged 18 to 65, felt they were not adequately skilled and trained for their current primary job.

The most frequent responses given for what skills or training they felt were missing were: Leadership and communication skills (40.3%); Computer and technical skills (35.3%); and Business and administration related skills (30.6%).



Respondents were asked what minimum level of formal education or training would be required to get the type of primary job they currently have. Overall, 8.8% of current primary jobs would not require a Formal education, 15.8% would require a High school diploma or certificate, 14.8% would require a Bachelor's Degree, 5.1% would require a Master's Degree, and 3.8% would require a Professional degree.

There were 2,776 jobs, or 11.9%, that would require less than a High school diploma or certificate.

In the fall of 2022, 12,692 people, or 54.6% of employed Yukon residents aged 18 to 65, required a licence, ticket or certificate in their current primary jobs. The most common reported requirements were for **Workplace health and safety** licences, tickets or certificates (60.0%); **CPR and/or First Aid** (57.9%); and various classes of **Driver's licences** (53.9%).








Current Students, Yukon, 2022





Note on Methodology

The Yukon Employment and Skills Survey is designed as a stratified random sample survey of Yukon households. The sample of the survey includes one randomly drawn individual belonging to the 18- to 65-year age group in a household from an eligible subset of households in the Dwelling-Based Household Survey Frame using community, age and sex as strata.

For the 2022 survey, the eligible subset of the frame included 16,095 Yukon households with at least one adult member belonging to the 18- to 65-year age group. A total of 3,441 individuals with these characteristics were randomly selected for the survey. The survey was fielded in the fall (September to November) of 2022. After adjusting for non-responses, analytical weights were derived and applied to the responses to generate representative estimates. The response rate for the 2022 survey was 58.1% and the refusal rate was 16.6%.
