Population Report Second Quarter, 2022

Highlights:

- The estimated population of Yukon on June 30, 2022 was 43,964; an increase of 774, or 1.8%, compared to the revised figure for June 30, 2021 (43,190).
- Comparing June 30, 2022 to June 30, 2012, Yukon's population increased by 7,681, or 21.2%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 6,719, or 24.0%; Dawson City increased by 351, or 17.7%; and Watson Lake increased by 4, or 0.3%.

Notes on methodology:

Official population counts prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make the approach more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population count of April 2011 was calibrated to a census-based estimate adjusted for net undercoverage.


In 2020, the model was updated by prioritizing residential addresses over mailing addresses in the assignment of communities. This update allowed for separate reporting of population estimates for Johnson's Crossing and Mendenhall, and changes in the organization of Whitehorse subdivisions. The changes have been applied to all population estimates from June 2019 onwards.

Changes in community and subdivision populations from one time period to another are not only due to natural population change and migrations, but may also be due to the reassignment of residential addresses as additional administrative data become available.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Given that the number of non-binary individuals in Yukon's administrative files is very small, non-binary individuals are distributed between males and females to protect confidentiality.

Monthly Population, June 30, 2002 to June 30, 2022



- From 2004 through 2014, Yukon's population increased almost steadily in most quarters of every year except in 2013. Positive growth rates often very high have been recorded in each quarter, from 2015 onwards. The June 30, 2022 population at 43,964 is the new record-high¹ for Yukon.
- On June 30, 2022, Yukon's population (43,964), increased by 216 people, or 0.5%, from the revised figure for March 31, 2022 (43,748), and increased by 774 people, or 1.8%, from June 30, 2021 (43,190, revised).



- During the second quarter of 2022, Yukon's population increased by 216 people from 43,748 (revised) on March 31, 2022 to 43,964 on June 30, 2022.
- Comparing the months of April through June of 2022 to their respective 2021 months, population increased: 1.7% in April; 1.9% in May; and 1.8% in June.

- 15 to 29 years = increased by 125 people, (1.7%);
- 30 to 44 years = increased by 3,151 people, (39.8%);
- 45 to 59 years = decreased by 496 people, (-5.4%);
- 60 to 74 years = increased by 2,930 people, (65.0%); and
- 75 years and over = increased by 1,002 people, (92.1%).






Annual (June 30th) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2012 to 2022


Yukon's annual (June 30th) population increased by 7,681, from 36,283 in 2012 to 43,964 in 2022. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.9%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a low growth of 0.8% in 2013 to a high growth of 3.0% in 2017.




Distribution of Yukon Population by Age Group and Gender, 2012 and 2022

The dependency ratio — the ratio of the combined population aged 0-19 years and 65 years and over to the population aged 20-64 years, multiplied by 100 — for Yukon increased from 47.3 in 2012 to 55.0 in 2022, an increase of 7.8 over the 10-year period.







- On June 30, 2022, 16.0% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 69.5% was between 15 and 64 years, and 14.5% was 65 years of age or older.
- Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2012, 16.7% of Yukon's population was under 15 years of age, 73.9% was between 15 and 64 years, and 9.4% was 65 years and over.



• Ten years earlier, on June 30, 2012, the gender gap was slightly larger: there were 17,710 females (48.8%) and 18,573 males (51.2%).


- the proportion of population in the age group of 15-64 years decreased each year from 73.9% in 2012 to 69.5% in 2022; a decrease of 4.4 percentage points.
- in contrast, the proportion of population in the age group of 65+ years has steadily increased from 9.4% of the total population in 2012 to 14.5% in 2022; an increase of 5.1 percentage points.

Annual (June 30th) Indigenous Population Growth, 2020 to 2022




The Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) decreased by 2 from 9,550 in 2021 to 9,548 in 2022. This represents a annual growth rate of 0.0%.

Distribution of Indigenous Population by Age Group and Sex, 2022

On June 30, 2022, the Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) in Yukon was estimated at 9,548. Of this total:

- 21.7% were under 15 years of age; 68.5% were between 15 and 64 years; and 9.8% were 65 years of age or older.
- 49.9% were males; 50.1% were females.
- 5,580 (58.4%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,968 (41.6%) resided in rural communities.



The Indigenous population (9,548) represented 21.7% of Yukon's population (43,964) in 2022. The median age for the Indigenous population was 34.2 years; for non-Indigenous, it was 40.5 years.





Annual (June 30th) Population by Aggregated Whitehorse Subdivisions, 2020 to 2022 (within municipal boundaries)





Comparing 2022 to 2021 (revised), the population in all aggregated subdivisions of Whitehorse grew, with the exception of Takhini³ where the population decreased by 19 people (-0.6%). The aggregated subdivision of Porter Creek/Crestview⁴ (which includes Whistle Bend) experienced the largest increase in population (561 or 7.1%), followed by Downtown/Marwell (52, or 1.6%), Whitehorse West² (32, or 0.4%), South Highway¹ aggregate (28, or 1.3%), Riverdale aggregate (23, or 0.4%) and North Highway⁵ aggregate (2, or 0.5%) over the same time period.

International Migration To and From Yukon, July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022^(p)


