Reporting to the Executive Director, and with significant interaction with Chief and Council with respect to the overall implementation of the KFN Final Agreement (FA) and Self-Government Agreement (SGA), this position oversees all negotiations related to the Agreements as the primary non-political representative for KFN. The position is responsible for assisting Council and KFN Committees in establishing priorities for devolution and developing responsibilities and action plans to deal with changes in other government's policies or legislation, for managing and supervising KFN communications and information management programs, and for coordinating committee support.

#### Important Events and Dates (1917—2021)

- 1917 T.A. Dickson writes to the Bishop of Yukon,
   Dawson asking for a school in Burwash Landing.
- 1950's Kluane Lake School in Destruction Bay is built.
- \* 1970's Student protest, by walk from Burwash to Whitehorse. Asking for a school in the community of Burwash.
- 1978 1985 Kets'ádan kỳ in Burwash is founded and operates for 7 years until closed by YG.

- \* 1950's 2009 Parents have to arrange for their children to get to school. No transportation is provided by Yukon.
- 2003 KFN signs their Self-Government Agreements.
- 2015 Diesel spill at KLS, children attend school in Burwash at the Jacquot Hall.
- 2020 (June) KFN and YG sign an Education Agreement.
- \* 2021 (November) Community Engagement about school design.

#### Temporary employment opportunity for Kluane First Nation citizen

Yukon Geological Survey is looking for assistance in supporting a geothermal research project that is underway in the Burwash Landing area.

**Project Description:** The study involves assessing the geothermal energy potential of the Denali Fault in the Duke River area. As part of the study, we recently installed nine seismometers in the Duke River/Burwash Creek area. These seismic instruments measure naturally occurring ground movements from earthquakes, and will be in place over the next two to three years. The data they collect will help us to "see" what the Denali fault looks like in the subsurface. This information will be useful as we plan to drill a deep well next spring to directly measure the ground temperature.

Each station consists of a buried seismometer, a hard plastic box containing a battery and a data logger,

and a solar panel to charge the battery (see example pictured here).

What we are looking for: YGS is looking for someone to visit the nine stations once every 6-8 weeks and provide a brief status report by email. The work scope is detailed below.


At each of the nine stations, complete the following tasks:

- Brush off any snow or debris on the solar panel.
- Check visible wires, boxes and panels for any damage or disturbance. (Note: If there is any damage to the instruments, notify YGS immediately.)
- Take a photograph of the instrument installation.

After each round of visits to all nine sites, send a brief email summary with the following information:

- The date each station was visited.
- Photos of each station including the solar panel, instrument box and wires.
- The status of each instrument (e.g. everything looks fine; an animal has chewed the wires, etc.).

The individual will be responsible for providing their own means of access to the stations (some locations will require an ATV or snow machine) and will need access to email for reporting. YGS will pay \$800 per round of visits to all 9 stations up to a maximum of 10 rounds per year. All equipment and transportation costs will be covered by the individual.



The map to the left shows the locations of the nine stations.



Research results will be shared online via KFN's Facebook and inperson in Burwash if possible.

For Ally, the research conducted

with KFN will result in a thesis which she will present to the University of Ottawa for her Master of Arts in Anthropology. Want to share your opinion on the development of traditional leases in Cultus Bay and Duke Meadows?

KFN is working on research with University of Ottawa Master's student Ally Tedesco. The research is for land development in Cultus Bay and Duke Meadows.

#### Who is Ally?

Ally Tedesco is an anthropologist completing research for her thesis at the University of Ottawa.

As a Master's student, Ally has always wanted to partake in a partnership-based research project with an Indigenous community, which fulfils the community's own research aims.

This research with KFN allows Ally to meet goals of: a) providing results that KFN values, and b) writing a thesis on KFN's land management of their Traditional Territory from community perspectives.

#### Kluane First Nation N'tsi (Wind) Energy Project Update



Kluane N'tsi (Wind) Energy Project: the wind farm will be located between the communities of Burwash Landing and Destruction Bay. The turbine will be integrated into the existing grid along with battery energy storage which will allow us to turb the diesel generators off at certain points!

The turbines are forecasted to displace 315,000 litres of diesel per year, or 53% of the diesel consumed by Atco's diesel-electric generators to provide electricity to Burwash Landing and Destruction Bay.

Grant Funding is Expected to Provide All of Capital the Required to Construct the Wind Project. We are seeking funding approval from the Smart Renewable and Electrification Pathways Program's grant – we have received strong indications that our submission will be favourable received – final approval is expected in ~ November 2021.

#### **Funding Obtained**

- \$8.0 Million of Grant Funding: KFN has conditionally secured grant funding as follows:
- \$1 million secured from the Yukon Territory Government
- \$1 million secured from INAC REACHE
- \$2 million secured from NRCAN
- \$0.4 million secured from the Innovative Renewable Energy Initiative
- \$3.6 million secured from the Artic Energy Fund

Energy Purchase Agreement with Atco Nearly Completed: we have re-engaged with ATCO Electric Yukon to negotiate the terms and conditions of the Energy Purchase Agreement for our project. We are close and expect to finalize the contract in a few weeks.

In-Service Date Summer 2022/Spring 2023: the target in-service date is late Summer 2022 or Spring 2023. The exact timing depends upon the time required to manufacture and ship the wind turbine (i.e. we will not know until we place the order; we cannot place the order until the grant funding is approved).
