Advanced Placement provides students with an opportunity to take first year university courses during secondary schooling. The A.P. Math 10 is a prep-course for such a programme. This is what some of these students had to say about math . . .

"I struggled for the first couple weeks and then gave up entirely. I soon realized how stupid I was being; I had never quit anything in my life. I am fighting and I will continue to fight until I have mastered the concepts.

"I've finally caught on to what those teachers have been saying about mastering, fortifying and memorizing. Math isn't a breeze anymore, but neither is life."

"My worst year for math is this year, my tenth grade year. I was told that this would be my hardest year. I didn't listen."

"...math has been an emotional roller coaster in my life. There have been many highs, a few lows and some positives and some negatives. However, in absolute terms the value of math in my life has been significant."






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












## A.C.E.S.

#### EDUCATION YUKON STYLE







Other highlights in inovations for students had to be our Co-operative Education program, which allowed students to get into the business community and learn about what is required to be successful.




















# A.C.E.S. 10

Mr. Jim Boyde, who has been in charge of the A.C.E.S. for almost 5 years now, does an excellent job of teaching all of these skills.



























## Yearbook





















## M.A.D.





#### French Immersion

This year will mark the first graduation of Immersion students in the Yukon. The pioneer class of French Immersion started out 13 years ago with over 30 students, but through the years, the number has dwindled to a mere 7 students.

Being in immersion means taking your schooling in an entirely different way. Up until Grade 12, it meant taking only half of your courses in French. The program has benefited all involved. We have participated in trips and learned a great deal about the French language, the culture and heritage, and gained a second language.

We are proud to be representing the pioneer class of French Immersion in the graduating class of 1993.

































#### ÉCHANGE SUR LES ÉTUDES CANADIENNES

#### Wrestling - A Female Athlete's View

Over the past 3 years I have had many experiences and challenges I will value for the rest of my life. When I first started wrestling, it was mostly for something to do in the winter and to keep fit, but now it has grown into part of my future goals and dreams.

Wrestling has taught me a lot about myself and others. For example, if I am going to be successful, then I have to develop a sense of commitment. My favourite word is tenacity because I admire people who are tenacious, and are worthy of my admiration. The pay-off for commitment and hard work is immeasurable.

For example, in the summer of 1993 two other women and myself were chosen to represent Canada at the World Wrestling Championships in Norway. Prior to competition, we attended a training camp that gave a whole new definition to hard work and stiff muscles. We trained 8 - 9 hours a day and were in top physical condition. It was not only physically hard, but mentally challenging as well. When we weren't wrestling, running or drilling, we were sleeping. The tenacity with which I tried to meet my goals is something I am proud of.

The World's were exciting, but not without challenges - we lost our luggage, we had to deal with eating food from a different culture, and we had to cope with the pressures of competing against the world's best athletes. I placed 6th in the 50 kg weight class. I was proud - both of my results and of being a Canadian.

I have now set my sights on the World's next year in Venezuela. I hope that women's wrestling will be in the Olympics in 1996 and that I'm on the team, representing Canada again.

I owe a great deal to my friends, my family and my teammates. They have inspired, taught and supported me through all the hard work. I have met some wonderful people through wrestling.

#### Wrestling - Pinning the Year Down

Looking back on the 1992/93 season, I get a good feeling of accomplishment. F.H. Collins had wrestlers in at least 7 tournaments. As well, F.H. wrestlers participated in 3 week-long training camps over the summer. Some of the tournament highlights would include our Alaskan tour with competitors from Sitka, Lake Hoonah, Metlakatla, Mt. Edgecumbe, Juneau, Tok and Skagway. In addition, the Canadian National Wrestling Championships held in Saskatoon provided extremely good competition.

The rest of a typical day was filled with three hours of wrestling before lunch, relaxing on the beach for a couple of hours, several more hours of wrestling in late afternoon under the guidance of some of the best wrestlers from Canada and the world. After of a week of this schedule, the sore muscles had disappeared; we were feeling pretty good.

Camps, such as those held in Alaska, Kelowna and Jasper, provided world class instruction, a promise of fun and plenty of bruises - they prepared us well for the tough competition of the Canada Summer Games in Kamloops.

During this type of competition, one practice we had to contend with was deliberate weight loss. Although it is not unusual to try to loose 2 to 4 pounds for small tournaments, there is pressure to loose up to 15 pounds before weighing in at the nationals. Sometimes the desire to do well overcomes common sense. Luckily for us, our coach frowns upon this practice and monitors our behaviour.

The 1992/93 season was a great one. We were fortunate to be helped along by our energetic coach, Mr. Sharp. F.H. Collins Wrestling team brought home many medals, but more importantly, we had a great deal of good fun and close competition over the season.
