We Did it Before - - We've Done it Again!

YUKON AND ATLIN MOST SUCCESSFUL IN VICTORY LOAN DRIVE.

Whitehorse, Mayo and Atlin each exceeded their quotas in the Second Victory Loan campaign by substantial amounts. A telegram received here Tuesday morning from provincial headquarters gave the official standing at that time as follows:—

Dawson 61 applications	\$36,800
Mayo, 20 applications	\$ 8,650
Whitehorse 59 applications	\$51,000
Atlin 56 applications	\$14,600

Since the above figures were announced further subscriptions have been received. Whitehorse, for instance, has gone over \$59,000 at this writing and additional applications are still being received. From Atlin we received word Wednesday that their subscriptions had been increased to \$20,500 with others still in sight. If procurable at the time of our going to press the latest figures will be published elsewhere in this issue.

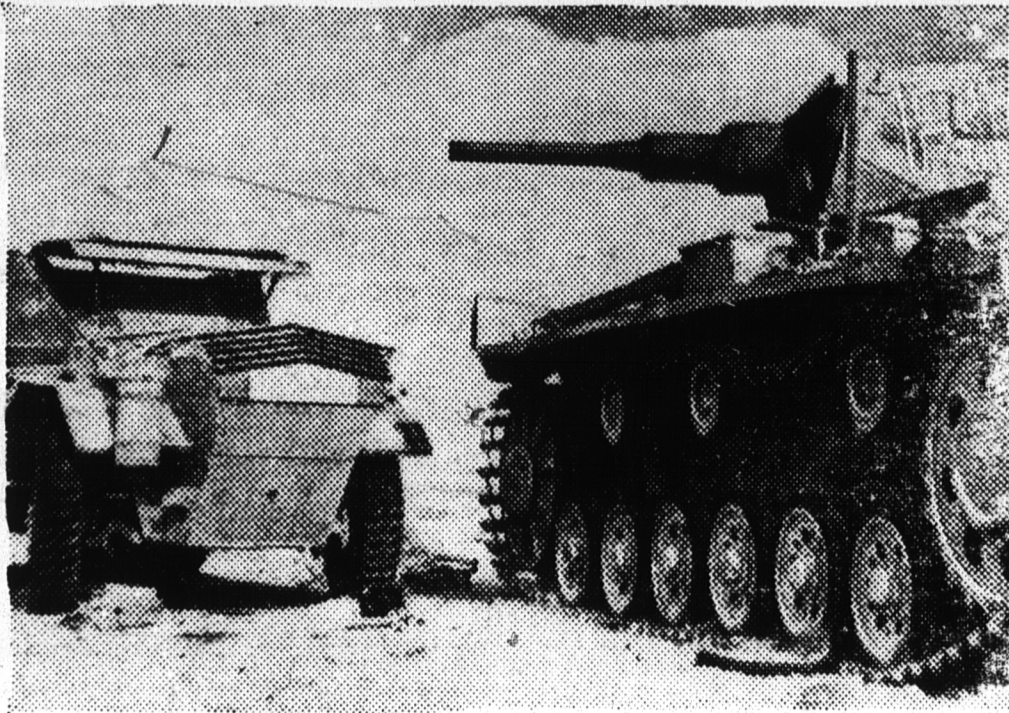
The provincial committee through its chairman has by wire expressed its heartiest congratulations for the splendid results achieved.

FRUITS OF THE BRITISH VICTORY IN LIBYA

The armored strength of Italy and Germany in Libya has been virtually destroyed by Britain's Eighth Army and the R. A. F. is constantly increasing this heavy handicap on the enemy by increased bombing.

DR. WILLIAM TEMPLE NOMINATED BY KING TO THE ARCHBISHOPRIC OF CANTERBURY.

His Majesty the King has nominated Dr. William Temple, at present Archbishop of York, to succeed the Most Rev. Cosmo Gordon Lang as Archbishop of Canterbury and primate of all England. The change becomes effective on March 31st next.

Dr. Temple is regarded as one of the most progressive leaders of the Anglican Church. He is 60 years of age, has been Archbishop of York since 1929 and will be the 98th Archbishop of Canterbury under the tabulation of the line of succession observed by the Church of England. He is a famous son of a famous father, Dr. Frederick Temple, who was likewise consecrated Archbishop of Canterbury in 1896, and died in December 1902.

CHURCHILL CONFORMS TO PUBLIC DEMANDS BY OUSTING FIVE MEMBERS FROM HIS CABINET.

On Monday Prime Minister Winston Churchill re-organized his cabinet in accordance with public demand by eliminating five-members for the retention of whom Mr. Churchill had been submitted to much adverse criticism from both press and public alike. The five members removed are Capt. David Margesson, Col. John Moore-Brabazon, Lord Moyne, Lord Leith, and Hugh Dalton.

Their successors are Sir James Grigg, Col. J. J. Llewellyn, Lord Portal, Viscount Wolmer and Dalton who relinquishes the portfolio of minister of economic warfare for the Board of Trade.

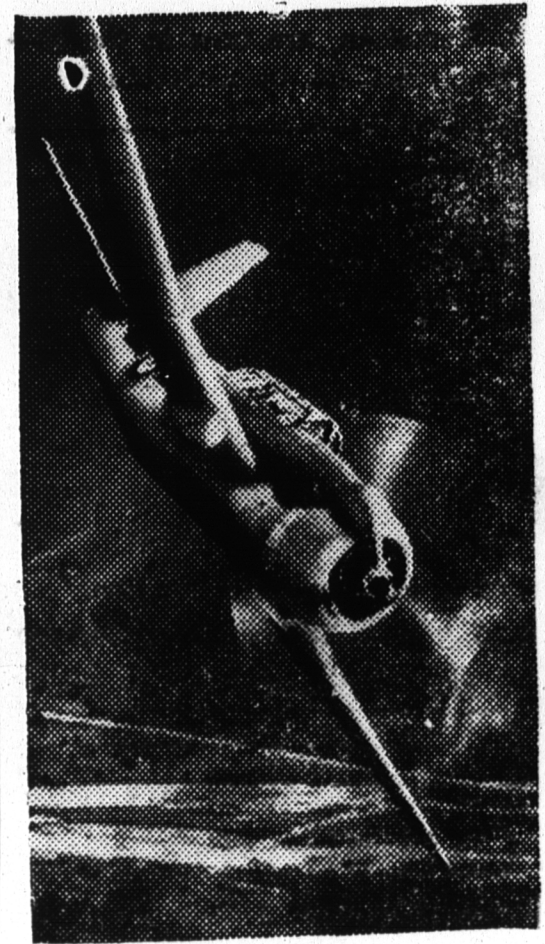

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT ADDRESSES CANADIANS ON EVE OF SECOND VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN.

Sunday night President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Mackenzie King spoke jointly over the radio network in connection with the Second Victory Loan campaign, the former from Washington, D. C., and the latter from Ottawa.

"Let us, remembering the price that some have paid for our survival, make our contribution worthy to lie beside theirs upon the altar of man's fair faith" said the President who added "It is not merely as good neighbours that we speak to each other in these eventful days but as partners in a great enterprise which concerns us equally and in which we are equally pledged to the uttermost sacrifice and effort" He recalled his pledge of four years ago at the opening of the International Peace Bridge at the Thousand Islands that the United States would "not stand idly by if Canadian soil were ever threatened by an aggressor" and the subsequent statement by the Canadian Prime Minister made at Woodbridge, Ontario, that the American pledge of assistance increased rather than lessened Canada's responsibilities toward the United States. "These pledges are now being implemented" stated the President "Instead of defending merely our shores, we are now joined with the free peoples of the world against an armed conspiracy to wipe out free institutions wherever they exist."

ALL ENEMY ALIENS MUST LEAVE B. C. DEFENCE AREAS BY APRIL 1st.

Official notices have been distributed by the R. C. M. P. at the coast notifying all male enemy aliens between the ages of 18 and 45 years that they must leave the designated protective areas of British Columbia by April 1st next. After that date no enemy alien of military age may return to the restricted areas without a special permit issued by the R. C. M. P.

The notice also prohibits the possession or use of any camera, radio transmitter, radio short wave receiving set, fire-arms, ammunition or explosives by any enemy aliens, male or female of any age, within such restricted areas.

BRITISH COLUMBIA-YUKON QUOTA IN SECOND VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN IS SIXTY-TWO MILLION.

The quota fixed for the Second Victory Loan campaign for British Columbia and the Yukon is \$62,000,000. That for the Yukon and Atlin, B. C. is \$200,000.

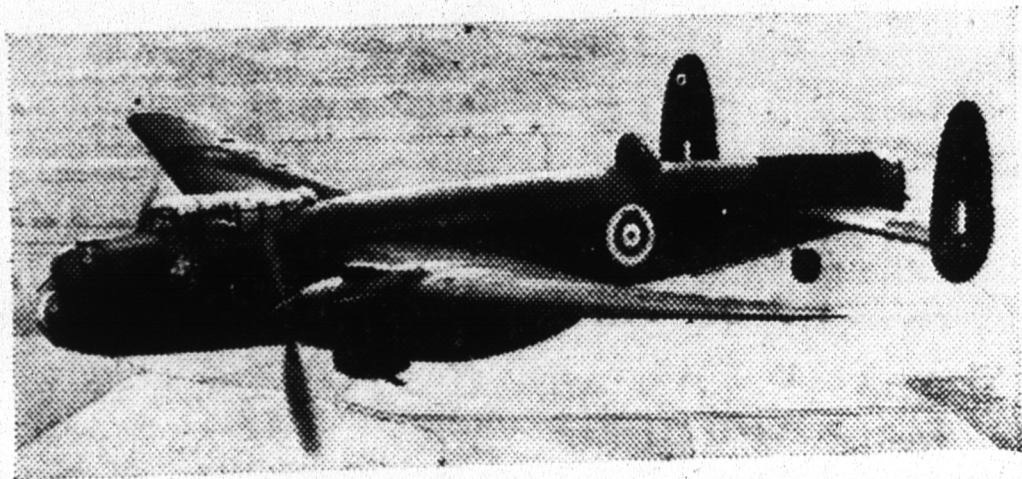

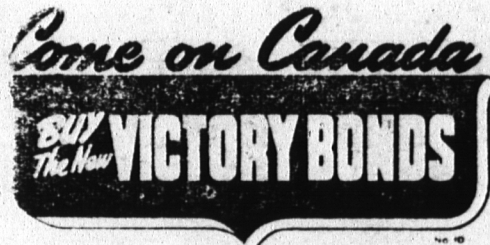

PRIZE WINNERS IN THE SCHOOL COMPETITIONS FOR SECOND VICTORY LOAN.

As stated in our last issue two prizes of \$5 each in War Savings Certificates have been generously donated by the British Columbia-Yukon Provincial Committee to be awarded for the best original poster and essay submitted by the pupils of the Whitehorse Public School relative to the Second Victory Loan.

There were nine entrants for the poster and six for the essay.

The prize for the best poster submitted has been awarded to Miss Betty MacBride whose design is now on display at the store of Messrs. Taylor & Drury Ltd.

The winner of the essay prize is Miss Rosalyn Cyr. who submitted the following essay:—

Canada's Second Victory Loan

The news in the papers and over the radio is getting more serious day by day. Singapore has fallen, Darwin, Australia, has been bombed, there have been nine ships sunk in the Caribbean. There is a prodigious effort in United States of America, not only to supply Britain and Russia with planes, guns and munitions of war but also to supply her own needs. All this brings home to us in Canada the danger of the present world situation and the need for drastic and immediate action.

We, the citizens of Canada, have been asked by Mr. Mackenzie King to place six hundred million dollars (\$600,000,000) at the government's disposal. This amount must be reached if not exceeded in order to win the war.

The needs of a nation at war are many: food for soldiers, sailors and airmen, money to keep the wheels of industry rolling, to keep smoke pouring out of factory chimneys, to maintain and even increase the speed of the assembly line. Some of the things this money will provide are medical supplies, doctors, nurses, civilians salaries who are producing corvettes, guns, motor cycles, metals, anti-aircraft shells, and all the bits and pieces to fit into heavy production.

In 1941, 968,000 Canadians subscribed. More than two-thirds of the subscriptions were for one hundred dollars or less—which means that little money is just as important as big. But everybody's money will have to answer the call if this year's drive is to go over the top.

Regarding the poster the award was made not only on the basis of originality of design but also on its execution. The essays were judged primarily upon their public appeal. Two members of the local committee acted as adjudicators.

ATLIN GOLD MINERS RIGHT ON THE JOB WHEN IT COMES TO SINKING SHAFTS.

Atlin can do a little boasting about real gold miners when it comes to sinking shafts to get that yellow metal known as gold. Here's one instance—Axel Nelson, Cust Johnson and a hired man over sixty years old by name Mark Edwardson (Axel and Gust are well over the half century mark). The shaft has been sunk around three hundred feet below the Jim Nevid cabin on Spruce Creek and in three weeks from the start of shaft it was down fifty four feet. The four feet being in bedrock. In that three weeks the shaft was timbered perfectly and if you wonder what the size of the shaft was we can tell you it was 9 ft by 6 ft. before timbering. Now Axel and Gust have driven six sets from the bottom of shaft and so far have run into two ounces of gold per set (10 by 4 ft.) A good start with, we hope, better prospects ahead. This is the ground commonly called after the name of Bill Hood.

LATE HANS GUNDERSON LAID TO REST.

The funeral service of the late Hans Gunderson was held at St. Martin's church on Sunday and was conducted by the Rev. R. P. Graham. The church was filled to capacity and many wreaths were in evidence from the deceased's many old time friends. The pastor spoke very kindly of the deceased while in life and his many sterling qualities. Mrs. Frank Henning presided at the organ the service closing with the hymn "Abide with Me."

Synopsis of Mining Law Yukon Territory

Any person eighteen years of age or over shall have the right to enter, locate, prospect and mine upon any lands in the Yukon Territory, whether vested in the Crown or otherwise, for the minerals defined in the Yukon Quartz Mining Act and the Yukon Placer Mining Act, with certain reservations set out in the said Acts.

No person shall enter for mining purposes or shall mine upon lands owned or lawfully occupied by another until adequate security has been furnished to the satisfaction of the Mining Recorder for any loss or damage which may be thereby caused.

Where claims are being located which are situated more than one hundred miles from the Mining Recorder's office, the locators, not less than five in number, are authorized to meet and appoint one of their number as emergency recorder, who shall as soon as possible deliver the application and fees received to the Mining Recorder for the District.

If two or more persons own a claim, each such person shall contribute proportionately to his interest to the work required to be done thereon, and when proven to the Gold Commissioner that he has not done so his interest may be vested in the other co-owners.

The survey of a claim made by a duly qualified Dominion Land Surveyor shall be accepted as defining absolutely the boundaries of the claim surveyed, provided the survey is approved by the proper authority and remains unopposed during the period of advertisement.

A person about to undertake a bona fide prospecting trip may secure from the Mining Recorder written permission to record at his own risk a claim within six months.

A legal post must stand four feet above the ground, squared or faced for the upper eighteen inches and measuring four inches across the faced portion. The post must be firmly fixed in the ground.

Priority of location shall be deemed to convey priority of right. Certain disputes may be heard and determined by a Board of Arbitrators.

Grants of claims grouped or owned by one person may be made renewable on the same date.

PLACER MINING

Creeks means any natural water course having an average width of less than one hundred and fifty feet between its banks.

Creek claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length, measured along the base line, by one thousand

feet on each side of the base line. Other claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length by one thousand feet in depth. Claims shall be as nearly as possible rectangular in form and shall be marked by two legal posts, one at each end of the claim, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. Location posts of creek claims shall be placed on the base line, and of all other claims parallel to the base line, and on the side of the claim nearest the creek or river towards which it fronts.

A discoverer shall be entitled to a claim 1,500 feet in length, and a party of two discoverers two claims, each of 1,250 feet in length.

The boundaries of any claim may be enlarged to the size of a claim allowed by the Act, if the enlargement does not interfere with the rights of other persons or terms of any agreement with the crown.

An application for a claim may be filed with the Mining Recorder within ten days after being located if within ten miles of the Recorder's office. One extra day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof. A claim may be located on Sunday or any public holiday.

Any person having recorded a claim shall not have the right to locate another claim in the valley or basin of same creek within sixty days of locating first claim.

Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with respect to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to a grant for one year and shall have the absolute right of renewal from year to year thereafter, provided during each year he does or causes to be done \$200.00 worth of work of the claim, files with the Mining Recorder within fourteen days after the expiration of the claim an affidavit showing a detailed statement of the work, and pays the required renewal fee.

GROUPING

Under certain conditions claims may be grouped and the work required to be performed to entitle the owner or owners to renewals of the several claims grouped may be performed on any one or more of the claims in the grouping. If the claims grouped are owned by more than one person a partnership agreement creating a joint and several liability on the part of all the owners for the joint working of the claims shall be executed and filed with the Mining Recorder.

Taxes and Fees

Royalty at the rate of two and one-half per cent. on the value of all gold shipped from the Yukon Territory shall be paid to the Comptroller.

QUARTZ MINING

Subject to the boundaries of other claims in good standing at the time of its location, a mining claim shall be rectangular in shape and shall not exceed 1,500 feet in length by 1,500 feet in width.

Every claim shall be marked on the ground by two legal posts, one at each extremity of the location line, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. On the side of No. 1 post facing No. 2 post shall be inscribed the name of the claim, a letter indicating the direction to No. 2 post, the number of feet to the right or left of the location line, the date of location and the name of the locator. On No. 2 post, on the side facing No. 1 post, shall be inscribed the name of the claim, the date of location, and the name of the locator.

The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of the mining Recorder's office; one additional day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof.

Adjoining claims not exceeding eight in number may be grouped, the necessary representation work for each claim may then be performed on any one or more of the claims in the group.

Every application for a full claim shall be made on Form "A" and for a Fractional claim on Form "A-1".

No person is entitled to locate more than one claim in the same mining district within twenty days.

The timber on a mineral claim is reserved until the Mining Recorder certifies that the same is required for use in mining operations on the claim. The Commissioner, however, may issue a permit to holders of other claims to remove the timbers for use in their mining operations where other timber is not readily available.

Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with regard to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to hold it for one year from the date of the record, and thereafter from year to year, provided during each year he does or causes to be done work on the claim to the value of \$100.00 and shall, within fourteen days after the expiration of the year, satisfy the Mining Recorder that the work has been done, and pay the Certificate of Work fee. One hundred dollars may be paid in lieu of assessment work.

When \$500.00 has been expended or paid the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, obtain a lease for a term of twenty-one years with the right to renewal for further terms of twenty-one years. Claims located prior to July 7, 1917 may upon fulfilling similar requirements, be Crown Granted.

Leases, renewals of leases, and documents relating to leased claims shall be recorded with the Mining Recorder in triplicate.

Dredging

A lease may be issued for a period of fifteen years for a continuous stretch of river not exceeding ten miles in length giving the exclusive right to dredge for gold, silver and platinum. The lessee must have at least one dredge in operation on the leasehold within three years.

Petroleum and Natural Gas

A lease may be issued for a period of twenty-one years for an area of not to exceed 1,920 acres giving the right to the petroleum and natural gas on the area leased. A rental is charged of 50 cents per acre for the first year and \$1.00 per acre for each subsequent year.

Assay Office

An Assay Office is maintained by the Government at Vancouver, where gold exported from the Territory will be purchased at its full value.
