

BOEING AIRCRAFT TO CONSTRUCT A MILLION DOLLAR REPAIR PLANT AT NEW WESTMINSTER.

The department of munitions and supply has approved the construction of a \$1,000,000 repair depot at New Westminster upon a 19-acre tract formerly used by the provincial government. This plant it is stated will relieve the main Boeing centre of repair work which is retarding production of new aircraft feet.

GENERAL MacARTHUR APPOINTED TO SUPREME COMMAND OF UNITED NATIONS FORCES IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC.

General acclaim followed the announcement that General Douglas MacArthur of Phillipine fame had been appointed to the supreme command of the United Nations Forces in the Southwest Pacific. The distinguished officer arrived in Australia a few days ago as also substantial American forces. The elevation of the hero of Bataan has had a salutory effect upon the morale of the allied forces.

U. S. ARMY REQUESTS BRITISH COLUMBIA TO POLICE HIGHWAY.

VICTORIA, March 17.—Provincial police forces are being largely augmented in the Peace River area, it was announced by Attorney-General R. L. Maitand, K.C., this morning.

The additional constables are being taken on at the request of the U. S. mililtary authorities directing the building of the Alaska road. It was felt that in view of the importance of the work there should be a force available for the enforcement of the civil laws of Canada.

SIDE-LIGHTS ON INDIA.

in order to rectify the spread of misconceptions on India Sir Robert Holland has prepared the following brief statement which was first published in the Vancouver News Herald.

- 1. There is no single Nationalist party in India demanding independence from Britain.
- 2. Britain has for the past nundred years been endeavouring to weld the diverse peoples of India into a single nation and with that object has inculcated democratic ideas and fostered the growth of representative institutions.
- 3. In 1937, democratic self-government was inaugurated in the eleven provinces of British India, covering 55 per cent of the area of the continent. The remaining 45 States in treaty relations with Brit-school children contribute generain
- Indians have not been able to then any scheme which would federate the diverse units and permit the establishment democratic self-government at the centre, but at the present moment the governor-general's cabinet consists of eight non-official Indians and only four Englishmen.
- 5. The British government now sending Sir Stafford Cripps to India wth a new plan for consideration by the various elements in India's national life, in the hope that it may lead to reconciliation of their differences.
- 6. The major Congress party wants immediate independence for India with a parliamentary system of government based on manhood suffrage, which would place Hindus in permanent power at the centre. The Moslems, a minority party of 90,000,000, hotly oppose this. They seek, for the perioid of the war, safeguards against a landslide towards the ideal of Congress, but ultimately they want the division of India into two independent states, onepredominantly Moslem and the other predominantly Hndu, in flat the ground"-London Times Corcontradiction of the Congress partys respondent

demand. The Indian States would rather remain aloof from any federation than be dominated by the Congress party There are other cleavages whic hpresent obstacles to the early attainment of nationhood by India.

7. Nevertheless, India is insensibly approaching Dominion status in her relations with the outside world. Her agent-general in America (Sir Girju Shankar Bajpai) signed the 26 Nations Agreement in Washington last January, and India has a seat on the Imperia War Cab

The Indian administration is now manned mainly by Indians, only 573 Englishmen now holding posts in he Indian Civil Service

- 8. We cannot hope to 'retain India's goodwill," and stimulate nei war effort by acceding to the Congress party's demands and thereby antagonizing the other great elerents in India's natioal life.
- 9. We must hope devoutly that Sir Stafford Cripps' mission will be successful, but in the meantime it may be noted that India's voluntarily recruited army has passed the million mark; that half of that army are Moslem's and that India's factories have been, and are pouring out arms, ammunition and equipment for the forces of the United Nations.



GASOLINE RATIONING MAY HAVE TO BE CURTAILED IN APRIL.

The Canadian Oil Controller some time ago announced the quantities which he thought would be available to consumers for pleasure driving for the three-month period commencing April 1st, 1942

The Oil Controller indicated that the announced quantities, which were very reasonable, might have to be reduced in the light of events transpiring between the date of his announcement and April 1st. Since the announcement the gasoline situation has become umch more critical and it is possible that the announced quantities may have to be reduced There will be a definite announcement by the Oil Controller about this on or about the 1st of April.

SHORTAGE OF MATERIALS

The serious shortage of materials is presenting a problem. A survey reveals inability to supply such staples as flannelette, sheeting and factor cotton. Every effort is being made to fill requirements from branches, reported Mrs. Ramsden. "It is most essential to knit only articles needed and asked for", she

B. C.'S QUOTA

She explained the quota system instituted by the National Red Cross to control the type and quantity of civilian clothing, allotting certain sizes and quantities to each province. B. C. was given layettes, toddler's outfits, boy's and girl's clothing for ages two to eight years, a certain amount of women's clothing in three sizes and men's shirts in three sizes. She urged that workers make from Red Cross materials only those articles included in B. C.'s quota.

To the time war broke out on the Pacific all supplies were shipped Overseas, but since then, none have been shipped out of the Province.

1941 WAR SERVICES DRIVE COLLECTED OVER \$6.850,000 COST 4.6 PER CENT CASE OF AIR RAID.

The various agencies interested take pardonable pride in the fact that the Canadian War Services Fund campaign in the spring of 1941 netted a pledged total of \$7,140,000. Of this amount \$6,890,000, or 961/2%was received in cash as at December 31, 1941.

So far a total of \$5,900,000 has been disbursed among the various participating agencies leaving a credit balance on hand of \$423,999.

A memorandum re "Trust account commitments and disbursements December 31, 1941" shows the amound paid and still owing, on the basis of the government approved budget, to each agency as follows:



SHIPS FROM RUSSIA REACH BRITAIN WITH CARGOES OF RAW **MATERILAS**

The British Foreign Minister, Mr. Anthony Eden, recently announced that ships sent to Russia loaded wth aeroplanes and tanks from Britan were returning filled with cargoes of raw materials. Russia is also sending her own vesseels to Britain for the first time since the outbreak of war, and in this picture a Soviet cargo steamer is seen at a British port havng its cargo of timber unloaded.

VANCOUVER AND SEATTLE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OUT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CONNECTING LINK WITH B. C.-ALASKA HIGHWAY.

As soon as the route of the new B. C.-Alaska Highway was made known the Seattle Chamber of Commerce sent a delegation to interview Premier John Hart in Victoria to urge the construction of a connecting link between the Cariboo Highway and the new B. C .-Alaska Highway which is to be constructed. Hope that British Columbia could provide several thousand Japanese for construction of the proposed link was voiced by Foster McGovern, assistant manager of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, who was given assurance by Premier Hart that the suggestion would be considered. Major Austin C. Taylor, head of the B. C. Security Commission, has also promised to consider the matter from this angle Assurance of support was also forthcoming from the Vancouver Board of Trade through its vicepresident S. S. McKeen who stated "Rest assured that if we do not get this connecting link started now it will be many long years before it will be undertaken. We must strike now. With your co-operation we can do it."

The conferees favoured a route from Prince George past Summit Lake, over 2850 ft. Pine pass and through Promotion Pass to Dawson Creek. This route would be 238 miles long, with 136 miles of new construction at an estimated cost of \$3.400,000.

The alternate route would run from Prince George to Vanderhoof, Fort St. James and up the Peace River to Fort St. John northwest of Dawson Creek. This route would be 435 miles long with only 116 miles of new construction entailed at an estimated cost of \$2,900,000.

Detailed plans and maps are being rushed to Ottawa and Washington, D. C., with recommendations that federal funds be used for the carrying out of the undertaking.. •••••••••••••••••••••••
