CANADA CELEBRATES HER SEVENTY-FIFTH BIRTHDAY WITH "ARMY WEEK."

Wednesday was the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Union of the Provinces of Canada. Three quarters of a century ago the keystone for a United Canada was "well and truly laid" by the Act of Confederation.

This week is "Army Week" which is being fittingly commemorated throughout the Dominion in honor of those who today are safeguarding our freedom and national institutions and all therein implied.

The spirit which actuated "The Fathers of Confederation" lives on and today is best exemplified by those now serving with the Armed Forces in various parts of the world. God bless and prosper them abundantly wherever they may be.

MILLIONS U. S. DOLLARS TO FINANCE BASIC METALS.

In order to relieve a serious shortage of basic metals in American wartime industries the Reconstruction Finance Corporation has agreed to finance the development of marginal and sub-marginal copper, zinc, lead and graphite mines in Canada.

Canada is one of the largest producers in the world of these minerals and for sometime past has been shipping these base metals both to the United States and Great Britain.

As a result of this new arrangement it is expected that new basic metal mines will be opened and existing mines enlarged all over Canada and particularly in British Columbia, Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick. There is no reason why the Yukon should not also be investigated as it is well known that some of these basic metals, especially copper, lies in large quantities in the Southern Yukon awaiting development. The Mayo district also is a fertile field in the estimation of those who have prospected in those parts for years past. As a matter of fact Dr. Bostock is at the present time conducting a thorough investigation into certain scheelite claims on Dutch Gulch in behalf of the Dominion Government.

It is pointed out that the terms of the arrangement are extremely elastic and can be extended to include other strategic metals such as tungsten and vanadium. Gold, silver and other precious metals are excluded. As smelting operations in Canada are now being worked to full capacity all further production will be shipped to the United States for processing.

The project is being handled through Mr. Bateman, Metal Controller, and Wartime Metals Ltd., a Dominion Government corporation.



CANADIAN SUPPLIES FOR BRITAIN.

Taxation on Incomes, Services Commodities Heavily Increased. Income And National Defence Taxes Are Combined

Last week the Hon. J. L. Hsley, Minister of Finance, presented in the House of Commons the biggest budget in the history of Canada. Three billion, nine hundred million dollars is to be raised in the coming year to meet the governments "operating charges" of which amount one billion, six hundred and seventy-two millions is to be raised by direct taxation on income and profits and indirect taxation on commodities and services without striking at the necessities of life.

Sharply increased income and national defence taxes are now to be combined in one tax and where possible are to be collected at the source. The compulsory savings plan calls for most of us to lend the government from \$80 a year upwards, according to our income, repayable after the war with 2% interest. An important item of this plan is the provision that payments into superannuation funds and life insurance coverage is deductible from the tax.

By combining the national defence and personal income tax an entirely new system of assessment is being adopted. It will ensure that no male person's income will be reduced lower than \$660 and \$1200 for those married.

The excess profits tax has been raised to 100%, but 20% of the total amount collected is to be refunded after the war. As far as taxation on commodities go here are a few examples in a nutshell.

• You'll bank up to \$300 a

year on orders of the government and receive 2 percent interest on it until the war ends.

• You'll pay more income tax than you did last year in addition to the money you have to place in the bank.

• You'll pay one per cent more national defence tax if you are single and two per cent if you are married.

• You'll obtain no income tax deduction for your children over the age of 18, because the "deductible age" has been reduced to that—unless the children are attending school or university.

• You'll pay approximately 50 cents more for bottled spirits with an added tax of \$2 a gallon placed on it.

• You'll receive only seven cigarettes in a 10-cent package, or 18 in a 25-cent package in order to provide the \$2 a thousand tax added.

• You'll pay 25 percent more for your cigars and 35 to 50 cents

SING AND LIKE IT

The Minister of Finance instituted a new era in the economic affairs of Canada when he presented his budget in the House of Commons last week. A substantial increase in taxation was confidently anticipated but the introduction of compulsory saving is an innovation which will undoubtedly have a salutary effect upon those who still persist in spending all they earn. On the other hand those who have consistently practised thrift will no doubt welcome it as another avenue for saving small amounts and thus creating an investment which may be extended indefinitely. Just as mighty oaks from acorns grow so can a sound investment be built up by saving small amounts in the first instance.

It may take a little time for some people to grow accustomed to this compulsory means of saving but it will nevertheless have a tendency to make all live within their income and that most assuredly is a wholesome lesson well worth learning both from a national and individual standpoint.

The die being cast and the principles involved being just it is up to us to view the matter sanely and govern ourselves accordingly.

LOOKING AHEAD

It was the inimitable Charles Lamb who divided people into two classes—the borrowers and the lenders. Today people may similarly be divided into two groups. The one group is spending money as fast as they get it. The other is practising thrift and "salting down" all they can possibly save in War Savings Certificates and Stamps.

As war production increasingly curtails the manufacture of many peacetime commodities the spending group is finding it more difficult to buy expensive articles. There is one conclusion which may be safely drawn from such a set-up and one certain prediction which may be made in the circumstances. When the war is terminated and peace is declared those who will be purchasing new furniture for their homes, new cars, electric washing machines, radios and the like, or taking

holiday trips to famous summer resorts in Canada and the United States or across the seas, will not be those who are now spending their quarters and dollars with reckless abandon. The spending after the war will be conducted largely by those who are now investing all they possibly can in Government war securities.

PAPER SHOWER

We're giving Germany a paper shower. You'd be surprised to see how many different articles made of paper can be brought to a shower of this kind.

One used envelope is transformed into a cartridge wad; 12 old letters become a box to hold cartridges; 6 books, a mortar shell container; 2 1/4 lbs. of waste paper make 448 washers for rifle grenades.

Bren guns, Lewis guns, 2 inch mortars. Vickers guns. Tommy guns and ordinary rifles are all now using paper in ammunition.

In a single month the local authorities of Great Britain have collected 100,000 tons of waste paper for munitions.

This record quantity was amassed by displaying to the public how the British industry turns the dustman's waste paper into ammunition for the guns; chewing it up by hot revolving knives, converting it into a thick liquid in huge containers which come out at last in long clean sheets of cardboard.

"The whirl-i-gig of time brings about its revenge". Now it is our turn to make our scraps of paper count. We are not forgetting the "scrap of paper" incident of 1914 when a solemn treaty with Belgium was regarded by the Kaiser as of no account. History is repeating itself. After twenty-five years our scraps assume a more deadly form.

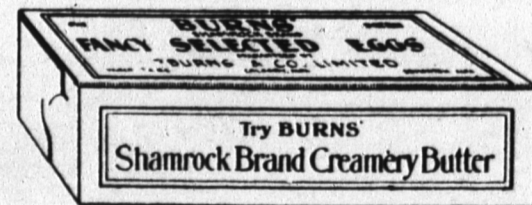
