FIFTH VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN OPENS MONDAY

INTERESTING ADDRESS BY REGION'L REPRESENTATIVE WARTIME P. & T. BOARD

Thirty local businessmen attended a meeting in the court-room Monday night which was addressed by Mr. Walter S. Campbell, regional representative of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board with headquarters at Edmonton. Mr. O. O. Davis local representative of the Board occupied the chair.

After expressing thanks for the co-operation and assistance which had been extended by the local businessmen to Mr. Davis the speaker gave a brief outline of the organization of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board and of the War Industries Control Board and indicated the close co-operation existing between the two boards. He next described their scope which covers industry, commerce and finance. The methods of operation were dealt with in detail and illustrations cited as to how complaints were dealt with whether they emanated from a wholesaler, retailer or consumer. Primarily, stated Mr. Campbell, our efforts are directed to maintaining the purchasing power of money in terms of goods. We are planning today for the world of tomorrow. The speaker then illustrated the progress which had been made during the past years in this direction.

Referring to "black markets" Mr. Campbell emphasized the fact that their existence is impossible unless there be both a buyer and a seller, both equally guilty in the eyes of the law and both traitors to their country in wartime. No one, stated the speaker, should hesitate to report such traitors either to the Board's representative or to the police.

Mr. Campbell then dealt with the Cost of Living Index describing how the figures are secured, calculations made and estimates arrived at. He pointed out that whilst there were slight variations from time to time in various districts these were for the most part, of a reasonable nature and corrected themselves within a few months.

Rentals in Whitehorse, and the method of appeal, were discussed in detail by the speaker stating that there had so far only been one appeal made in this area.

Referring to supplies needed in remote areas where wartime projects on a large scale were being carried on, Mr. Campbell assured his listeners that the problem of supply and demand, as far as the local market was concerned, would



NATIONAL LEADER C. C. F. PARTY IN CANADA SUPPORTS FIFTH VICTORY LOAN.

Mr. M. J. W. Coldwell, national leader of the C. C. F. party in Canada, in a radio address over the C. B. C. network Monday night made an all-out plea for the support of the Fifth Victory Loan which opens Monday. In the course of his address he stated, in effect, that anyone disparaging investment in this new loan was doing this country a great dis-service. He emphasized the fact that those who invested in victory loans or war certificates were protected one hundred per cent by the Dominion Treasury for every dollar so invested.

Mr. W. E. Thomson of the National War Finance Committee, who is organizer for Northern British Columbia and the Yukon, arrived from the coast Tuesday and addressed the local committee in charge of the Fifth Victory Loan drive. He returned to the coast yesterday morning.

receive first consideration immediately local merchants laid their problems before the Board's local representative.

Before concluding his address Mr. Campbell paid a fitting tribute to the construction of the Alaska Highway and the part it was bound to play in the future not only in the opening up of this great northland but also in further cementing the bonds of friendship and good fellowship which have existed between the United States and Canadian citizens.

MASTER SGT. R. F. DOOLAN PRESENTED WITH U. S. ARMY LEGION OF MERIT.

An association begun 20 years ago in the United States War Department at Washington, D. C., was climaxed last Saturday when the Army's Legion of Merit was pinned on Master Sergeant Richard F. Doolan by Colonel Kenneth B. Bush. In 1923 Doolan, then 17 years old, went to work as a clerk for Bush, then a captain in the Adjutant General's Office at Washington. Colonel Bush at that time was helping to administer the soldier's bonus. Today he is chief-of-staff of the Northwest Service Command.

Doolan resigned his civilian position in the War Department and went to the Yukon as a private. Whitehorse during the winter of 1942-43 was the coldest post under the American Flag. At temperatures reaching 65 degrees below zero, in temporary CCC buildings, Doolan had charge of organizing the complete files and records section of the entire Command. He did his job so well, under such difficult circumstances, that a few weeks ago the War Department awarded him the Legion of Merit.

On the parade grounds at Whitehorse Colonel Bush, in the absence of Brig Gen. James A. O'Connor, who is in the United States for several weeks, pinned the decoration on Master Sergeant Doolan, who two decades ago was his clerk in Washington, D. C.

Doolan's home is in Washington, D. C., where he has a wife and infant son.

ALL HANDS TO THE WHEEL

The fifth Victory Loan campaign
opens Monday. The amount to be
raised on this occasion is a mini-
mum of \$1,200,000,000. The denom-
inations and interest are similar to
those of the last loan and the slogan
this time is "Speed the Victory."

This new loan is \$100,000,000 more
than the last one and consequently
the quotas have been increased and
allocated proportionately. For the
Whitehorse area the quota has been
set at \$220,000 which is \$70,000 more
than our quota last April. Since
our sales in the last campaign ap-
proximated \$250,000 whilst our
quota was \$150,000 there should be
no difficulty experienced in ex-
ceeding our quota on this occasion
provided we all put our shoulders to
the wheel and do our part to the ut-
most of our ability.

Statistics compiled from official
and other reliable sources disclose
that there is more money now
available for investment purposes
than there was during the last cam-
paign and it is an undeniable fact
that there is no finer investment
procurable than Dominion of Can-
ada bonds. This is confirmed by
the fact that previous issues of Do-
minion Victory Bonds, which are
more than a year old, are eagerly
sought by United States investors.
What clearer evidence could be ad-
duced as to the safety and sound-
ness of Canadian government bonds?

As far as Whitehorse and the
southern end of the Territory is con-
cerned, the campaign is again being
undertaken by those who made such
a signal success in the last campaign.
It could not be placed in better
hands. Arrangements are now
about completed whereby a syste-
matic canvas of the territory will
again be carried out in order that
everybody will be afforded an op-
portunity of subscribing to this new
loan. Be prepared, therefore, when
the canvasser makes his call, to in-
form him for what amount you wish
to have your application form filled
out. It will save much valuable
time and we all know how busy
everybody is nowadays.

We should realize by now that the
greatest problems and possibly the
greatest battles still confront the
United Nations. What success has
so far been accomplished has been
the direct result of the closest co-
operation of all the United Nations

acting as a single unit. The greater
their efforts the greater becomes our
individual responsibility to furnish
the funds necessary to provide them
with all the ships, tanks, foodstuffs
and munitions to enable them to
complete their task successfully. Our
armed forces are relying upon us
implicitly to this end. Upon them
we are relying for an Allied victory.
Both are contingent upon each other.
Those in the Services will not fail
us. We must not fail them.

MESSAGE OF FINANCE MINISTER

It has been my duty to ask you to
lend your money in four Victory
Loans. Now—I ask you to accept
personally the challenge of the Fifth
Victory Loan.

I would like to underline that
word "Fifth." There is some danger
that we might be casual about the
recurring responsibility which it
suggests. This loan is not just an-
other financial step in a series—it is
a great blow struck at a powerful
enemy by Canadians at home. It is
larger—and it is more important
than any which has gone before.

No one should assume from the
war news of to-day that he is justi-
fied in reducing his commitment. To
do so would be to put his personal
opinion above the judgment of the
wisest heads of the Allied Command.
No matter when the war should end,
we must remember that men will
continue to offer their lives until
the very moment of armistice. We
at home must try to match this
spirit as best we can.

All Victory Loans are directed to-
ward tremendous ends. They pro-
vide about half the money required
to pay the costs of war. They re-
duce spending at home, and will be
of help to all of us after the war.
Every man, woman and youngster
earning money should buy Victory

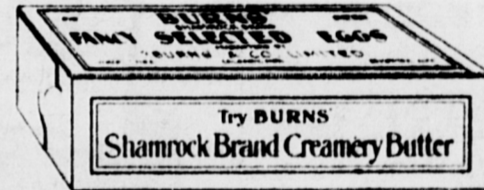

The last payment on 1st April 1944, covers the final payment of principal, plus .64 of 1% in the case of the 3% bonds and .37 of 1% in the case of the 1¾% bonds representing accrued interest to the due dates of the respective instalments.

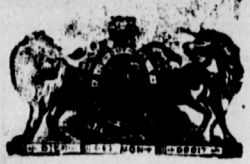
The Minister of Finance reserves the right to accept or to allot the whole or any part of the amount of this loan subscribed for cash for either or both maturities if total subscriptions are in excess of \$1,200,000,000.

The cash proceeds of this loan will be used by the Government to finance expenditures for war purposes.

Subscriptions may be made through any Victory Loan Salesman, the National War Finance Committee or any representative thereof, any branch in Canada of any Chartered Bank, or any authorized Savings Bank, Trust or Loan Company, from whom may be obtained application forms and copies of the Official Prospectus containing complete details of the loan.

The lists will open on 18th October 1943, and will close on or about 6th November 1943, with or without notice, at the discretion of the Minister of Finance.

Synopsis of Mining Law Yukon Territory

Any person eighteen years of age or over shall have the right to enter, locate, prospect and mine upon any lands in the Yukon Territory, whether vested in the Crown or otherwise, for the minerals defined in the Yukon Quartz Mining Act and the Yukon Placer Mining Act, with certain reservations set out in the said Acts.

No person shall enter for mining purposes or shall mine upon lands owned or lawfully occupied by another until adequate security has been furnished to the satisfaction of the Mining Recorder for any loss or damage which may be thereby caused.

Where claims are being located which are situated more than one hundred miles from the Mining Recorder's office, the locators, not less than five in number, are authorized to meet and appoint one of their number as emergency recorder, who shall as soon as possible deliver the application and fees received to the Mining Recorder for the District.

If two or more persons own a claim, each such person shall contribute proportionately to his interest to the work required to be done thereon, and when proven to the Gold Commissioner that he has not done so his interest may be vested in the other co-owners.

The survey of a claim made by a duly qualified Dominion Land Surveyor shall be accepted as defining absolutely the boundaries of the claim surveyed, provided the survey is approved by the proper authority and remains unopposed during the period of advertisement.

A person about to undertake a bona fide prospecting trip may secure from the Mining Recorder written permission to record, at his own risk a claim within six months.

A legal post must stand four feet above the ground, squared or faced for the upper eighteen inches and measuring four inches across the faced portion. The post must be firmly fixed in the ground.

Priority of location shall be deemed to convey priority of right. Certain disputes may be heard and determined by a Board of Arbitrators.

Grants of claims grouped or owned by one person may be made renewable on the same date.

PLACER MINING

Creeks means any natural water course having an average width of less than one hundred and fifty feet between its banks.

Creek claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length, measured along the base line by one thousand

feet on each side of the base line. Other claims shall not exceed five hundred feet in length by one thousand feet in depth. Claims shall be as nearly as possible rectangular in form and shall be marked by two legal posts, one at each end of the claim, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. Location posts of creek claims shall be placed on the base line, and of all other claims parallel to the base line, and on the side of the claim nearest the creek or river towards which it fronts.

A discoverer shall be entitled to a claim 1,500 feet in length, and a party of two discoverers two claims, each of 1,250 feet in length.

The boundaries of any claim may be enlarged to the size of a claim allowed by the Act, if the enlargement does not interfere with the rights of other persons or terms of any agreement with the crown.

An application for a claim may be filed with the Mining Recorder within ten days after being located if within ten miles of the Recorder's office. One extra day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof. A claim may be located on Sunday or any public holiday.

Any person having recorded a claim shall not have the right to locate another claim in the valley or basin of same creek within sixty days of locating first claim.

Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with respect to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to a grant for one year and shall have the absolute right of renewal from year to year thereafter, provided during each year he does or causes to be done \$200.00 worth of work of the claim, files with the Mining Recorder within fourteen days after the expiration of the claim an affidavit showing a detailed statement of the work, and pays the required renewal fee.

GROUPING

Under certain conditions claims may be grouped and the work required to be performed to entitle the owner or owners to renewals of the several claims grouped may be performed on any one or more of the claims in the grouping. If the claims grouped are owned by more than one person a partnership agreement creating a joint and several liability on the part of all the owners for the joint working of the claims shall be executed and filed with the Mining Recorder.

Taxes and Fees

Royalty at the rate of two and one-half per cent. on the value of all gold shipped from the Yukon Territory shall be paid to the Comptroller.

QUARTZ MINING

Subject to the boundaries of other claims in good standing at the time of its location, a mining claim shall be rectangular in shape and shall not exceed 1,500 feet in length by 1,500 feet in width.

Every claim shall be marked on the ground by two legal posts, one at each extremity of the location line, numbered "1" and "2" respectively. On the side of No. 1 post facing No. 2 post shall be inscribed the name of the claim, a letter indicating the direction to No. 2 post, the number of feet to the right or left of the location line, the date of location and the name of the locator. On No. 2 post, on the side facing No. 1 post, shall be inscribed the name of the claim, the date of location, and the name of the locator.

The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of the mining Recorder's office; one additional day shall be allowed for every additional ten miles or fraction thereof.

Adjoining claims not exceeding eight in number may be grouped, the necessary representation work for each claim may then be performed on any one or more of the claims in the group.

Every application for a full claim shall be made on Form "A" and for a Fractional claim on Form "A-1".

No person is entitled to locate more than one claim in the same mining district within twenty days.

The timber on a mineral claim is reserved until the Mining Recorder certifies that the same is required for use in mining operations on the claim. The Commissioner, however, may issue a permit to holders of other claims to remove the timbers for use in their mining operations where other timber is not readily available.

Title

Any person having complied with the provisions of the Act with regard to locating and recording a claim shall be entitled to hold it for one year from the date of the record, and thereafter from year to year, provided during each year he does or causes to be done work on the claim to the value of \$100.00 and shall, within fourteen days after the expiration of the year, satisfy the Mining Recorder that the work has been done, and pay the Certificate of Work fee. One hundred dollars may be paid in lieu of assessment work.

When \$500.00 has been expended or paid the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, obtain a lease for a term of twenty-one years with the right to renewal for further terms of twenty-one years. Claims located prior to July 7, 1917 may upon fulfilling similar requirements, be Crown Granted.

Leases, renewals of leases, and documents relating to leased claims shall be recorded with the Mining Recorder in triplicate.

Dredging

A lease may be issued for a period of fifteen years for a continuous stretch of river not exceeding ten miles in length giving the exclusive right to dredge for gold, silver and platinum. The lessee must have at least one dredge in operation on the leasehold within three years.

Petroleum and Natural Gas

A lease may be issued for a period of twenty-one years for an area of not to exceed 1,920 acres giving the right to the petroleum and natural gas on the area leased. A rental is charged of 50 cents per acre for the first year and \$1.00 per acre for each subsequent year.

Assay Office

An Assay Office is maintained by the Government at Vancouver where gold exported from the Territory will be purchased at its full value.
