RED CROSS DONATIONS TO DATE TOTAL LESS THAN HALF OF LAST YEAR'S CONTRIBUTIONS.

Local Canadian Red Cross donations collected to date total only \$1,208.45 as compared with \$3,350.00 collected last year. It is to be sincerely hoped that when the final check-up is made this year's amount will approximate that of 1943.

BRITONS STAND SOLIDLY BEHIND CHURCHILL.

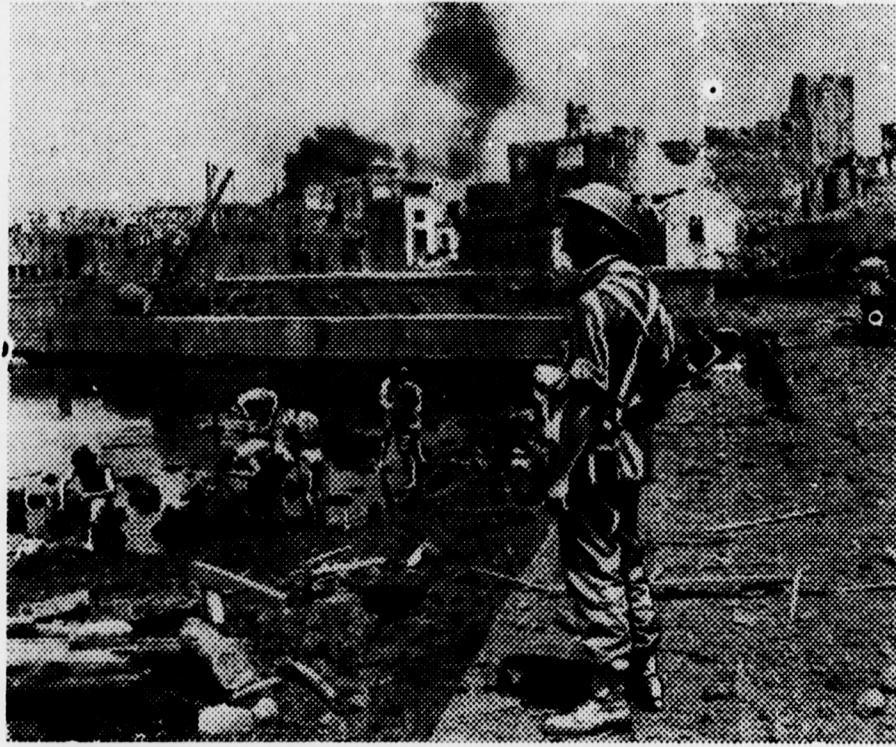
The London Daily Press report the result of investigations made recently by the centre of public opinion on Britain's feelings toward Winston Churchill and the government's conduct of the war. Despite voting at by-elections the investigation disclosed that 92 per cent of the nation still backs the Prime Minister and 75 per cent are satisfied with the government's conduct of the war up to the present time.

BUILDING MATERIAL TO BE RELEASED FOR NEW HOMES AT COAST.

The Vancouver News-Herald states "from an authorized source in Ottawa" that material will shortly be released for the building of several hundred individual homes in the coast city and that the Dominion government will provide financial assistance through the National Housing Administration.

DOMINION ELECTION ACT AMENDMENT RECOMMENDED.

The Commons election committee is recommending to parliament that the Dominion Election Act be amended for the next general election to permit of the extension of time between nomination and election days from fourteen to twenty-eight days to allow more time for the taking of the armed services vote. In making this recommendation the committee points out that it is not in order to afford more time for campaigning but to give election officers more time to take the vote among the armed forces who may be spread over various fronts by the time the election is called.



PANTELLARIA FALLS FOLLOWING INTENSIVE AIR-SEA BOMBARDMENT

After a taste of what the combined action of Allied Sea and Air forces could do in the way of concentrated bombardment, the Italian island of Pantellaria fell to the United Nations. Allied land forces occupied the island within 22 minutes of the time the white flag was seen flying from a hill top. HOUSE OF BISHOPS CHURCH OF ENGLAND TO MEET IN SEPTEMBER.

The House of Bishops of the Church of England in Canada will meet in Montreal on September 15 next. It will be the first general synod since the outbreak of war with the exception of the celebration held last Fall to mark the 50th anniversary of its establishment.

SOVIET AMBASSADOR TO CANADA NAMED.

OTTAWA.—An external affairs department spokesman yesterday confirmed that G. N. Zarubin has been appointed Soviet Ambassador to Canada succeeding Fedor Gusev who was previous to last August Soviet minister here but who, since last August has been Soviet Ambassador to Great Britain.

U. S. AIR ATTACHE TO TOUR NORTH.

Coming north on an inspection trip of the R. C. A. F. Northwest Staging Route and U. S. A. A. F. installations is Lt.-Col. David A. Burchinal, military air attache to the United States Embassy in Canada. He will be accompanied by Col. Francis J. Grayling, U. S. military attache at Ottawa.

Lt.-Col. Burchinal is reported as saying "I consider the Northwest Staging Route to be of top importance at the moment."

LONDON NEWSPAPERS CALL FOR CLARIFICATION OF ATLANTIC CHARTER.

The London Daily Herald and Daily Telegraph yesterday urged discussions among Allied governments to clear up misgivings about the application of the principles of the Atlantic Charter. The Herald asks "Can't we ask Churchill—without fighting his government—how he reconciles with the charter his secret plea to Marshal Stalin at Teheran where he agreed that slices of Poland ought to be ceded to Russia and slices of Germany to Poland?" The Telegraph states "An indispensable condition for success of the Charter is continual and closer consultation between the governments of the United Nations."

LATE UNITED STATES CASUALTIES.

From Washington, D. C., it was officially announced yesterday that casualties of the United States armed forces since the outbreak of the war total 165,061. The dead number 38,846 wounded 58,964; missing 35,521 and prisoners of war 31,730. Among the prisoners of war 1,894 have died in prison camps—mostly in Japanese occupied territory.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill is broadcasting to the British nation on Sunday. He will be heard over the C. B. C. network at about noon, Whitehorse time.

AMERICAN BOMBER FLEET WARN BERLINERS OF THEIR COMING AHEAD OF TIME.

In order to engage the Nazi fighters in combat the U. S. bombers very courteously warned them one hour ahead of their coming. Here's the message that was repeated every minute whilst the bombers were en route to their objective:

"We are coming. Our targets will be in the northern and northwestern districts of Berlin. Evacuate those districts at once."

This is a new code of ethics which no doubt dumbfounded the Nazis.

U. S. RELEASES 36,000 AIR TRAINING CANDIDATES.

WASHINGTON.—The release of 36,000 candidates for flight training to the United States Army ground and service forces and temporary suspension of enlistment of 17-year old applicants in the air corps enlisted reserve was announced Wednesday by the U. S. War Department as being steps taken within the army to meet a general shortage in the ground forces.

NOT CONSULTED

LONDON.—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons Wednesday that the British government had not been consulted beforehand in the Soviet Russian recognition of the Badoglio government in Italy and is asking Moscow why.

STRANDED AIRMEN AFTER DRIFTING ON ICE FLOE TO REACH PORT.

From an east coast Canadian port it is announced that the ice breaker Sorel is expected to arrive shortly carrying the three occupants of a Quebec airplane after spending a week on a drifting ice floe. No statement was made regarding the condition of the men.

HITLER TAKING A DANGEROUS GAMBLE.

LONDON.—The Red army's overpowering surge over the Dneister river into pre-war Rumania has forced Hitler to make one of his biggest gambles of the war—to use a large portion of his precious strategic reserve to bolster the tottering Balkan front. Simultaneously it is announced that the Rumanian premier and vice-premier have been summoned to Hitler's headquarters for "important talks." In the meantime a new puppet government has been set up in German-occupied Hungary.

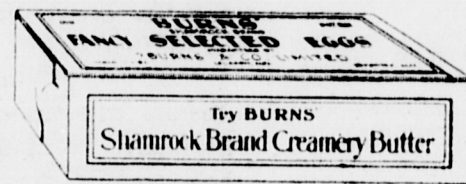

**WARTIME WAGE ORDER
REVISED BY GOVERNMENT.**

On Monday the prime minister announced revisions in the wage control order modifying restrictions on granting wage increases and eliminating the proposal to enlarge the National War Labor Board.

Under the revised order the national board will retain the right to review and revise regional board decisions but may not vary decisions without giving notice to the interested parties and providing an opportunity to them to make representations.

"OVER THERE" ITEMS

LONDON.—"Utility" cups in Britain are made without handles, to save labor. Caterers can replace only one piece of crockery for every one hundred meals served, and two pieces for every one hundred beverages served.

Britain still undergoes air attacks with many civilian casualties. The whole country has now had a total black-out for more than 1,600 consecutive nights. Canadian soldiers find the black-out one of the most striking wartime features of Great Britain, and, like the British people themselves, find it hard to bear. More than 300,000 unaccompanied children and 250,000 mothers with children are still evacuated from their homes. More than 70,000 infants have been born in Emergency Maternity Centres.

Britain's financial resources are all mobilized for war. War savings have yielded nearly \$25,000,000,000 since 1939, and Britain's foreign assets have been absorbed to pay for essential imports. Investment at home is controlled, and totalled only about \$15,000,000 in 1942, against a pre-war average of \$840,000,000. Nearly \$80,000,000 has been given to the Government in gifts, and over \$235,000,000 in loans free of interest.

Indirect taxes are very high in Britain. It is estimated that on an annual income of \$4,000, a married man with two children would pay about \$400 in indirect tax, in addition to \$1,600 in direct tax.

1,000,000 tons more cereals for bread and more than 250,000 tons more potatoes have been grown in Britain this year than in last year's record-breaking effort. This harvest is the greatest yield per acre of these products since official records have been kept.

HIGH COMMISSIONER

Vincent Massey, Canadian high commissioner in the United Kingdom has returned to London after his first wartime visit to the Dominion. His stay here lasted five weeks.

ROYAL WEDDING

King Peter of Yugoslavia and Princess Alexandra of Greece were married in the Yugoslav embassy in London on March 20.

Public Health Regulations

PRIVIES—Outdoor

1. Must have a metal receptacle.
2. Must be fly-proof.
3. Must be emptied **ONCE WEEKLY** from April 15th to October 1st, 1944.
4. Pit privies are not to be used.
5. Privies and surroundings must be kept clean; suitable disinfectant to be used in receptacle.

SLOPS AND GARBAGE

1. Liquid kitchen waste may be disposed of in covered cesspools or covered metal cans, the latter to be emptied at least once weekly.
2. Garbage must be kept in covered receptacles which shall be emptied once weekly. (It is strongly advised that all garbage be burned.)

REFUSE

1. All refuse shall be hauled away to the Town dump before May 1st, 1944, and is **NOT** to be deposited in or around any property. Thereafter, no refuse shall be deposited on any property.

Regular inspections will be carried out and offenders will be prosecuted. Penalties not exceeding \$100 and costs are provided for violation of these regulations.

The above regulations are made under authority of Section 5, Yukon Health Ordinance.
