INTERESTING MINING LECTURE SERIES TO BE DELIVERED NEXT MONTH.

The Whitehorse branch of the British Columbia and Yukon Chamber of Mines have arranged for a series of lectures on mining to be given here the latter part of next month. Due to the wide interest now being taken in various phases of the mining industry and to its future development in the Yukon Territory these lectures are bound to prove most popular as quite a large number of people already in this area have signified their readiness to become acquainted at first hand with the ores, rocks and minerals known to be existent here. The lecturers will be E. D. Kindle of the Geological Survey of Canada at Ottawa and Robert M. Thompson professor of geology and mineralogy at the University of British Columbia. Both are outstanding authorities in their respective fields.

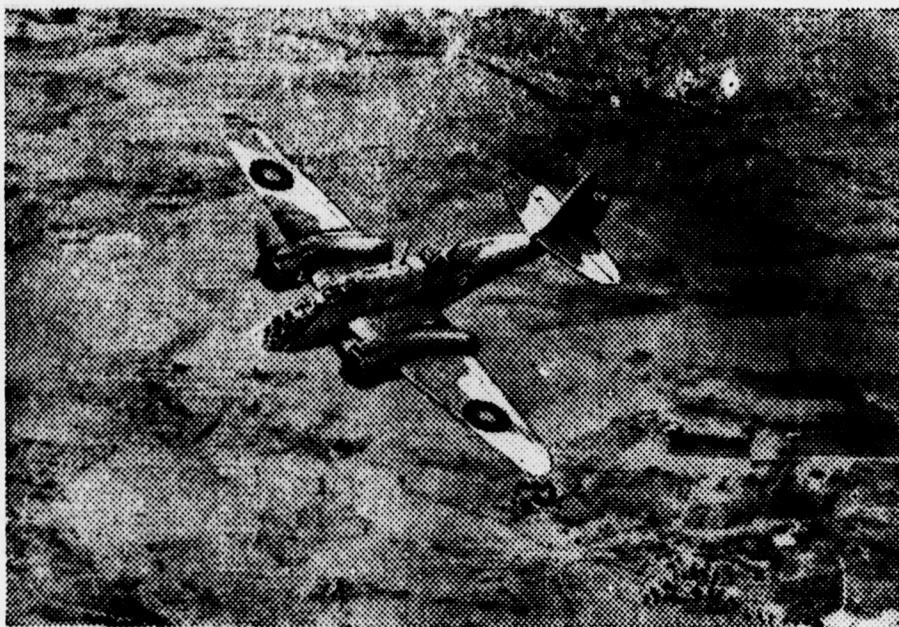
The lectures will be delivered in such form as to be readily understandable by inexperienced and old-time prospectors alike for whom they are primarily designed. And in order to make them as practical as possible in their scope, trays of specimens of all classes of rock and minerals will be on hand at all the lectures for inspection and study by those taking the course. "Know your Yukon" is the slogan to be used on this occasion and will be the theme running through all the lectures.

The time and place for these lectures are yet to be arranged and will be announced in our next issue. In the meantime it may be stated that both lecturers are expected to arrive in Whitehorse about May 20 next. It might also be here stated that quite a number of U. S. citizens, at present employed in the Territory, have evinced a genuine interest in the mining industry here and have already announced their intention of becoming members of the Whitehorse branch of the British Columbia and Yukon Chamber of Mines at a nominal membership fee of \$5.00 a year.

Those actively engaged in making the necessary arrangements for the holding of this series of lectures are convinced that they will prove most popular and be the means of giving an impetus to mining in the southern end of the Territory which will prove of lasting benefit to the local branch of the mining institution.

HALF MILLION DOLLAR FIRE IN U.S.E.D. MACHINE SHOPS AT CALDER.

Last Friday morning fire destroyed a heavy duty repair and machine shop of the Northwest Division U. S. E. D. at Calder, Edmonton. The blaze is stated to have started when a workman accidentally spilled a drop of gasoline on a hot electric light bulb which exploded and ignited the gasoline. Twenty men working in the building at the time of the conflagration (12.38 a. m.) all escaped without injury. A small hut adjoining the machine shop, and described as a liaison office of the M-H-KCB. Co's, containing company records, was also demolished. Besides the plant and equipment upon the premises the loss included two dozen motor vehicles two of which were school buses.

MONTAGUE NORMAN RESIGNS GOVERNORSHIP BANK OF ENGLAND.

Mr. Montagu Norman's decision to resign the governorship of the Bank of England—"The Old Lady of Threadneedle Street"—has caused much surprise in London as he had been proposed for re-election and himself expected to retain the governorship until next July when the bank will celebrate its 250th anniversary. His resignation was on medical advice as he has been in ill health for sometime past. Because of his financial policies he has perhaps been the most abused non-public man for the past ten years. Lord Catto, whose 21 year old son is now training with the R. A. F. in Canada, is the new governor of the bank.

MRS. JANE STEWART PASSES AWAY IN OTTAWA.

Mrs. Jane Stewart, wife of Hon. Charles Stewart, ex-premier of Alberta and now chairman of the international joint waterways commission, passed away in Ottawa on Monday at the age of 79 years. She left Edmonton to make her home in Ottawa in 1921 when her husband was called to fill the portfolio of Federal Minister of the Interior. Besides her husband she is survived by four daughters and three sons.

ODESSA RUSSIAN BLACK SEA PORT RE-CAPTURED BY RED ARMY.

Odessa, Russia's greatest Black Sea port, taken by the Germans two and a half years ago, has been recaptured by the Red Army. In the words of Marshal Stalin this advance has cleared away a major obstacle to "the central regions of Rumania." Incidentally it also constitutes one of Hitler's most humiliating defeats. The evacuation of Odessa was a sensational step in the German last-mile march out of southern Russia. Odessa was the first of the dramatic seizures by Germans of Russian cities, the other being Sevastopol, Leningrad and Stalingrad.

"CEILING" ON PEANUTS!

The Price Control Board announces an order establishing ceiling prices for wholesale and retail sales of roasted and salted peanuts. And so the lowly peanut "through circumstances beyond its control" is forced to join in the chorus "Unto this Last." ON LEADERSHIP

No one knew anything about the
tanned, bearded brigadier who
walked the streets of Quebec last
August during the historic Church-
ill-Roosevelt conference. His name
at that time was an official secret.
Last week it appeared in the casu-
alty list. Brigadier Wingate had
died in the jungles of Burma, where
he had trained a group of nondes-
cript civilians into a band of men
who could beat the Japanese at
their own game and where he had
worked out a strategy of warfare so
important and effective that Mr.
Churchill summoned him from In-
dia and took him to Quebec in his
own special plane.

Somehow warfare, and especially
modern warfare, seems to develop
those qualities of resourcefulness,
energy and courage which, coupled
with the ability to inspire people to
work together and give of their best,
constitute both an inspiration and a
guide. Would that we could find a
similar way to inspire people in
time of peace.

To produce this quality of leader-
ship, as exemplified by Wingate in
Burma, and to create the necessary
setting in which people will always,
of their own volition, want to give
of their best, is a sure mark of
genius, difficult to cultivate, of slow
growth and consequently possessed
by few to any appreciable extent.
Yet, strangely enough, the germ of
this rare quality can be observed in
almost any and every community.
Its growth, however, is often stunt-
ed and warped—almost beyond re-
cognition—and its efforts for the
common good stifled by a prepon-
derance of baser influences just as
weeds, by their rank propagation,
tend to choke the growth and
beauty of our choicest flowers.

Today we need leadership on the
home-front, as well as on the battle-
front; a leadership that will point
the way, and act as an incentive, so
that we may each do our best for
the commonweal, in whatever
sphere of life we may happen to be

placed, and by our united forces and
singleness of purpose strive to win
a decisive battle over the forces of
evil by upholding those moral prin-
ciples, "both with our lips and in
our lives," which form the very
bulwarks of Christianity and which
alone can give to this war-stricken
world that peace "which passes all
understanding" and that sense of
security for which the human soul
so earnestly yearns and so urgently
needs.

CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

Dr. William Temple, Archbishop
of Canterbury, has issued a state-
ment in response to a request that
he should take the initiative in try-
ing to find out to what extent there
existed a real and effective common
mind on fundamental decisions
which should govern the attitude
and actions of Christians in the
secular world.

"Our problem" wrote Dr. Temple
is to envisage the task of the church
in a largely alien world. . . Stand-
ing firm on its own ground it can
and must address the world." He
then goes on to state that a vague
theism is futile. Faith in God
should not be a substitute for scien-
tific study, but a stimulus to it.

"If we are to save freedom, we
must proceed from democracy of
the individual to democracy of the
person, and recollect that person-
ality achieves itself in the lesser
groupings within the state—in the
family, the school, the guild, the
trade union, the village, the city,
the country.

"We can today only regret the
timidity which led Christians in the
past to oppose the advances of sci-
ence. No enlightened Christian to-
day would question the right of sci-
ence to investigate everything that
it is capable of investigating.

"The first grave error character-
istic of our time is a too exclusive
occupation with politics to the ne-
glect of other equally important
spheres that can regain vitality and
health. The real crisis of our time
is primarily not a moral but a cul-
tural crisis. . . Christians must take
their part in re-creating a sound
social and cultural life. . . It is
obviously a task which can be suc-
cessfully undertaken with the ex-
perience of those who are exposed
to the daily pressure of the econ-
omic and political struggle.

"TIME BOMBS"

the truth is that you don't have to
remember what you said.

forming the whole world because
we have so small a part to play in
it. The harder task is to think of
reforming ourselves in which we
have to play the stellar role.

tute for character.



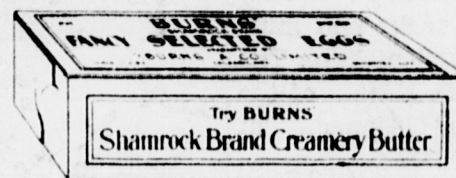

Income Tax Returns

FOR 1943 MUST BE IN NOT LATER THAN
30TH OF APRIL 1944

1. WHO MUST FILE RETURNS?

If you are single, and your income was over \$660.00 —
 Or, if married, and your income was over \$1,200.00 —
 Or if you had tax deducted in 1943 — **you must file returns.**

2. WHAT FORMS TO USE

For income under \$5,000.00 use Form T.1 Special.
 For income over \$3,000.00 use Form T.1 General.

3. WHERE YOU CAN GET FORMS

You can get income tax forms from —

1. Post Offices.
2. District Income Tax Offices.

Your early co-operation is requested. Over 2,000,000 Canadians will be filing income tax returns. You can help by getting your forms **now**, and mailing them **promptly**.

It is important that income tax returns be filed promptly. **First**, these returns must be filed to obtain credit for tax deductions. **Second**, to claim any refund to which you may be entitled. **Third**, to establish the Savings Portion of your tax, which will be paid back to you with interest after the War.

Make your returns now, but not later than 30th of April to avoid a penalty of 5% of your tax.

The unpaid balance of your 1943 tax may be paid any time before 31st of August WITHOUT PENALTY.

GET YOUR "T.4 SLIP" FROM YOUR EMPLOYER

To get a record of your 1943 earnings and tax deductions, ask your employer for a copy of the "T.4 Slip" he filed with the Government. Do this. It will save you time, and help prevent errors.

COALITION CABINET PLANNED IN ITALY.

SORRENTO, Italy.—Leaders of the six opposition parties virtually agreed Thursday to participate in a coalition "war government" of liberated Italy if and when King Victor Emanuel retires by designating Crown Prince Humbert as his lieutenant. In the meantime the Allied advisory council for Italy is tackling the problem of re-organizing the Italian government.

GENERAL GIRAUD REFUSES RECOGNITION OF ACTION BY DeGAULLE IN ABOLISHING POST COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

General Charles de Gaulle discharged General Henri. H. Giraud Sunday by abolishing his post of commander-in-chief of the French army and appointing him inspector-general. In a sharp formal letter Giraud, who escaped from France in 1941 to assume the leadership of French forces in North Africa on the side of the Allies, refused point blank to recognize such abolition and charged de Gaulle with violating French republican law as well as French National Committee ordinances. The fat is in the fire and it will take a lot of diplomacy to handle the matter adroitly. So far the United States government has not officially recognized the French Committee of National Liberation. The British government has done so. In commenting upon this phase of the situation, in reporting Mr. Cordell Hull's Sunday broadcast, the London News-Chronicle states "In effect de Gaulle is taking himself completely authoritarian powers . . . The British and American democracies do not wish to see France, when freed, governed by a dictator." The refusal of the U. S. government to recognize the French Committee of National Liberation is considered by the British as a blunder and it is pointed out that for Brit-

ain and the United States to try and by-pass this body could have only one effect—to put de Gaulle more firmly into power. If, on the other hand, the committee were recognized, this would raise its prestige and authority. There would no longer be any doubt about the intentions of both governments either inside or outside of France.

EASTER SERVICES HELD ON BATTLE GRONTS—FIRING CEASED BY GERMANS TO HEAR ALLIES' SERVICES.

Whilst thousands of Canadians attended divine service Easter Sunday throughout the Dominion similar services were being held on all the Allied battle-fronts and elsewhere. In Hyde Park, London, a sunrise service was attended by thousands of various nationalities. At Gargiliano, on the Italian front, where the Allied and German troops were less than 400 yards apart, the Allied 5th Army's Protestant and Roman Catholic services were broadcast to the Nazis who, within sight of the Allies' field altar, held their fire. The address was given in both English and German. The chaplain's greeting to the enemy troops said in part. "Should not all Christendom be jubilant on this day? . . . Christ died and rose again for all men . . . Therefore I wish you also, on behalf of my soldiers, a happy Easter."

Communion wines, wafers and prayer books were parachuted to troops far behind Japanese lines in the jungles of Burma.

U. S. SECRETARY OF STATE CORDELL HULL ISSUES WARNING AGAINST DISUNITY.

WASHINGTON. — Secretary of State Cordell Hull appealed to the American people Sunday not to let the controversies of an election year create disunity and destroy their effectiveness in world affairs. In his broadcast discussion of foreign policy he stated "Once before in our lifetime we fell into disunity and became ineffective in world affairs by reason of it. Should this happen again, it will be a tragedy to you, and to your children, and to the world for generations." Mr. Cordell Hull's foreign policy is based on the assumption that the United States, Great Britain, Russia and China will co-operate for peace as well as war. If they do not, he stated, there is no hope of avoiding another great conflict in the next 20 to 25 years. He also assured his radio audience that neither he, nor President Roosevelt, have made or will make any secret agreement, or commitment, either political or financial.

FORMATION OF COALITION GOVERNMENT FOR U. S. MOOTED "FOR DURATION."

Some credence is being given in certain quarters to the rumors circulating in Washington, D. C. to the

effect that President Roosevelt may try to form a coalition government to carry on until the end of the war. In such an event, it is reported Wendell L. Willkie would be asked to run for the office of vice-presi-

dent in the forthcoming November election.

As a matter of fact the president's government, as at present constituted, is partially a coalition one since Secretary of War Stimson and Sec-

retary of the Navy Knox are both republicans. Public feeling throughout the country would seem to indicate that the majority of the people want President Roosevelt to retain office until peace is signed.

BRITISH COAL MINERS' STRIKE ENDED—LABOR PICTURE MUCH BRIGHTER.

The walk-out staged by Yorkshire and Belfast coal miners, which at one time involved 100,000 miners, is all but over with the men deciding to return to work again. The two-weeks' strike in Yorkshire centered on the men's protest against deduction of two shillings (48 cents) from their weekly wages for coal taken home by them for their own use.

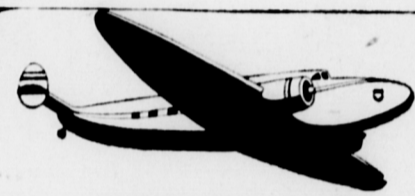
