• \$635,000 for Automation of Time, Labour and Leave Management System to upgrade and modernize the Yukon government's corporate HR information systems.

- \$132,000 for the American Sign Language Interpreting Program that provides that
 services of an accredited ASL interpreter at no cost to clients or service providers,
 to enhance the social and economic well-being and overall quality of life of deaf
 Yukoners and their families by enabling improved communications with Yukon
 government departments, health service providers, the business community and other
 organizations.
- \$917,000 for the Aboriginal Development and Recruitment Program (ADRP) to help Aboriginal people overcome barriers to employment and build their capacity to compete for Yukon government jobs.
- Yukon government was named as one of Canada's Top 100 employers, and one of Canada's top Family-Friendly Employers in 2016.

TOURISM AND CULTURE

- \$1.84 million funding for 11 museums and 7 First Nation Cultural Centers.
- \$68,000 funding for the Yukon Historical and Museums Association.
- \$450,000 for MacBride Museum Expansion (2015/16).

- \$5.6 million Archives Vault Expansion to ensure Yukon Archives has the capacity to continue to preserve Yukon's rich documentary heritage.
- \$180,000 to restore the 24-panel resin mural above the lobby in the Main Administration Building and the Centennial Totem Pole on Second Avenue.
- \$50,000 to purchase two ancient arctic camel skeletons, one for exhibit purposes and one for the paleontological reference collection.

WOMEN'S DIRECTORATE

- \$271,000 over 3 years for the Skookum Jim Friendship Centre to host a new Legal Advocate for women in response to recommendations in the Review of Yukon's Police Force's final report, "Sharing Common Ground", and the Advisory Council on Women's Issues' report, "Gaps, Needs and Options: Legal Advocacy for Yukon Women".
- \$84,000 for the Victoria Faulkner Women's Centre to support A Safe Place drop-in program that provides a supportive, low-barrier drop-in space for women and children on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings.
- New gender equality indicators website provides statistical and qualitative information on the status of women in the territory.
- \$150,000 for Aboriginal Women's Initiatives to support Aboriginal women's organizations in developing projects that respond to the recommendations made at the Yukon Regional Roundtable on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls held in February 2016 as well as to continue work on recommendations coming out of the second Yukon Aboriginal Women's Summit which was held in October 2012.
- \$20,000 for the Violence Prevention Initiative to complete work on three deliverables:
 - a toolkit to help managers address domestic violence in the work place;
 - a style guide insert for communicating violence accurately and clearly; and
 - an online training model to introduce response-based practices to Government of Yukon professionals that work directly with clients.

YUKON DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

- \$3.5 million to extend the Interim Electrical Rebate for another year that provides customers a maximum rebate of \$26.62 per month based on the first 1000 kilowatt hours they use for an annual savings up to \$319 a year.
- \$2 million for Next Generation Hydro to provide the funding needed to collaborate with First Nations partners in completing technical, cultural and environmental studies around the proposed sites.

YUKON HOUSING CORPORATION

• A 3-year partnership with Da Daghay Development Corporation (Ta'an Kwach'an Council) to provide up to 30 new rent supplements in a multi-residential building to be constructed in Whistle Bend.

- \$3 million for the construction of a 6-unit Residential Staff Housing Building in Ross River to replace aging assets.
- \$9.975 million for YHC Loan Programs including:
 - \$2.3 million for home repair programs;
 - \$4 million mortgage;
 - \$500,000 down payment assistance;
 - \$2.65 million owner build loans; and
 - \$525,000 secondary suite loans.
- \$7.264 million from CMHC for Investments in Affordable Housing.
- \$450,000 for rental assistance to working households paying more than 30% of their household income toward shelter which include children in the household.
