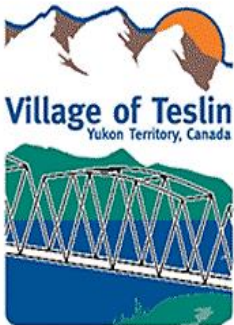

TESLIN ROADS

All roads are in summer driving condition we have done some patching and will continue as needed throughout the summer. We are working with DDC on the planning and start-up of our road (BST) project, we will be placing BST on Dream Ave (Airport Subdivision), Remaining streets in the new Sawmill Road Subdivision and Fox Point. The Alaska Highway shoulder mowing contract has been awarded to Sonrise Contracting the work has started will be completed next month.

SOLID WASTE FACILITY (LANDFILL)

To comply with our new waste management permit, we have done some upgrades to our transfer station these upgrades also make it more user-friendly. The new bylaw has been passed by Council and the new fees were in effect January 2017. The landfill fees and fines are listed in the Teslin Post, available at the Village office, posted at the landfill and on our website. If you would like to review the bylaw please stop by or call the Village Office.

Over the next few months we will be implementing the new bin system at the landfill; construction waste, metal, and appliance areas of the landfill will be closed to the public and the public will drop these waste streams into designated bins that are setup near the household waste bin. Arrangements can be made with the Village office for commercial vehicles to continue have access to the designated areas.

An average of one refuse bin a week is being sent to Whitehorse landfill for disposal. Everyone is encouraged to do recycling at home and at work to reduce the amount of material that goes to the landfill.

LAGOON AND SEWER SYSTEM

All systems are in good working order. Please be aware and careful on what is being flushed down the system. We will be cleaning and inspecting sewer lines early next month.

WATER QUALITY/ WATER DELIVERY

The new Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is in good working condition and we are planning some regular maintenance for the summer months. The annual water report is due at the end of March we are compiling information and will have the report to the water board by the end of the month

Please ensure that pathways to the water fill spouts are clear and sanitary for safe water delivery. Please notify us if you will be away and not requiring water delivery. Kindly ensure that spouts & tank whistles are in good working order and lids closed to help avoid water overflow.

We have trained more staff on our water truck and delivery system so we have a few backup operators to help ensure our delivery system operates smoothly.





Please keep your driveway accessible for the water truck.

DOG CONTROL

We have received some complaints and concerns about dogs running at large. Please ensure your pets are secure on your property. We take these reports very serious and are actively pursuing loose dogs, our public works staff do patrol for stray dogs 7 days a week! If you have stray dogs wandering on your property, please call the Village office.

The Yukon Government has announced a new community dog spay program which began Aug. 1st, the project will provide \$ 250.00 per spay surgery of one female dog, per dog owner in rural communities. Teslin Tlingit Council and Village of Teslin have created a program to enhance the YG program by assisting residents with neutering male dogs. The joint Councils will provide up to \$ 250.00 to residents of Teslin for one male dog. Please call the Village office for more information and to make arrangements to use this program.

RECREATION BUILDINGS

Youth recreation summer camps are in full swing and keeping the kids occupied! Check out Teslin recreation Facebook page, the recreation calendar, and posters around town for programming and events.

We have completed some minor renovations in our buildings to add some storage space. Painting in the arena hallways continues. The LED light replacement RFP closes at the end of the month.

OTHER

We have a list of 38 Vehicles to be pickup from around town and taken to the landfill! We are still picking up vehicles so you still have a chance to get a vehicle on the list if you need.

Wildfire Safety Tips



Unlike many natural disasters, most wildfires are caused by people—and can be prevented by people, too. Meteorologists are not yet able to forecast wildfire outbreaks, so people in fire-prone areas should plan ahead and prepare to evacuate with little notice. Here are some tips on how to prevent wildfires and what to do if you're caught in the middle of one.

HOW TO PREVENT A WILDFIRE

- ❖ Contact 911, your local fire department, or the park service if you notice an unattended or out-of-control fire.
- ❖ Never leave a fire unattended. Completely extinguish the fire—by dousing it with water and stirring the ashes until cold—before sleeping or leaving the campsite.
- ❖ When camping, take care when using and fueling lanterns, stoves, and heaters. Make sure lighting and heating devices are cool before refueling. Avoid spilling flammable liquids and store fuel away from appliances.
- ❖ Do not discard cigarettes, matches, and smoking materials from moving vehicles, or anywhere on park grounds. Be certain to completely extinguish cigarettes before disposing of them.
- ❖ Follow local ordinances when burning yard waste. Avoid backyard burning in windy conditions, and keep a shovel, water, and fire retardant nearby to keep fires in check. Remove all flammables from yard when burning.

Wildfire Safety Tips

EVACUATION TIPS

- If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.
- Know your evacuation route ahead of time and prepare an evacuation checklist and emergency supplies.
- Wear protective clothing and footwear to protect yourself from flying sparks and ashes.

BEFORE YOU LEAVE, PREPARE YOUR HOUSE

- Remove combustibles, including firewood, yard waste, barbecue grills, and fuel cans, from your yard.
- Close all windows, vents, and doors to prevent a draft.
- Shut off natural gas, propane, or fuel oil supplies.
- Fill any large vessels—pools, hot tubs, garbage cans, or tubs—with water to slow or discourage fire.

IF CAUGHT IN A WILDFIRE

- Don't try to outrun the blaze. Instead, look for a body of water such as a pond or river to crouch in.
- If there is no water nearby, find a depressed, cleared area with little vegetation, lie low to the ground, and cover your body with wet clothing, a blanket, or soil. Stay low and covered until the fire passes.
- Protect your lungs by breathing air closest to the ground, through a moist cloth, if possible, to avoid inhaling smoke.

Many of these make me nostalgic for the types of crafts I would do in summer camps - like weaving friendship bracelets or painting rocks. These creative projects can really be done at any time of year and are a colorful reminder to soak in the last rays of sunshiny weather.

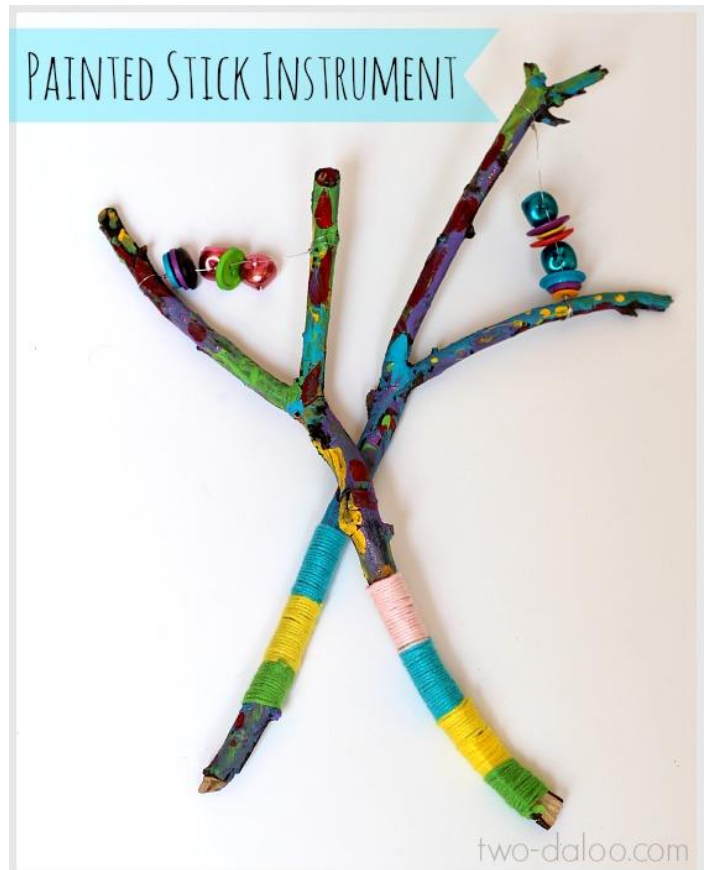
A. Painted Stick Instrument

Materials:

- 1 Forked Stick
- Craft wire
- Some buttons and jingle bells

Instructions:

1. At you backyard find some nice forked stick and have it painted by your kids with the colors that they want.
2. Cut a piece of thin craft wire for each stick and choose a few large buttons to thread onto each wire, as well as a couple of brightly colored jingle bells. Stretched the wire across the forked end of each stick and wrapped the ends tightly, ensuring that no spiky ends remained.
3. Wrap different colors of yarn at the end of the stick to make the handle.

B. Tie-Die Shirt Bag



Materials:

One-step spray dye kit
1 white shirt (Medium size for kids)
Rubber Bands
Sewing Kit
Fork – for twisting the shirt

Instructions:

1. Put the shirt on your craft table. Place the fork at the middle of the shirt and begin twisting. Twist until the entire shirt is in a spiral.
2. Tightly wrap the rubber band around the shirt.
3. Place the dye in each section between the rubber bands. Make sure to really saturate the fabric. Allow to sit for about six (6) hours.
4. Lay the dry shirt on flat. Align edges of the sleeves and button of the shirt.
5. Carefully fold the shirt in half. Cut around the neck and sleeves.
6. Open up the shirt out and sew across the bottom of the shirt.
7. Turn the shirt right side and out and you have an amazing bag.



End of Summer Craft Ideas

C. Sun Prints

Materials:

White 100% cotton fabric
Acrylic crafts paint (darker colors works best)
Paint brushes
Water
Tarp or plastic trash bag
Flowers, leaves, etc.

Instructions:

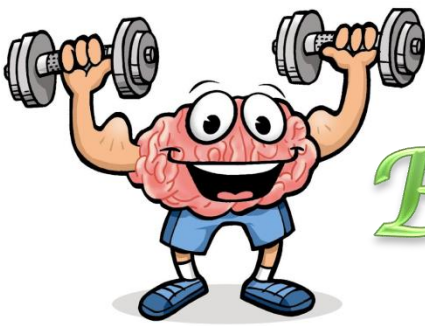
1. Spread out the tarp or the plastic to protect driveway. Wet the fabric, squeezing it out just enough that it no longer drips, and lay it flat on the tarp. Thin the paints about 1:1 with water.
2. Paint the fabric.
3. Gather flowers and leaves with interesting silhouettes.
4. Arrange items on the fabric and press them lightly in to the paint. To get the sharp image, the edges need to make contact with the fabric.
5. Let the fabric dry completely and peel.
6. To set the paint, tumble your sun prints in the clothes dryer at high temp for about 45 mins.

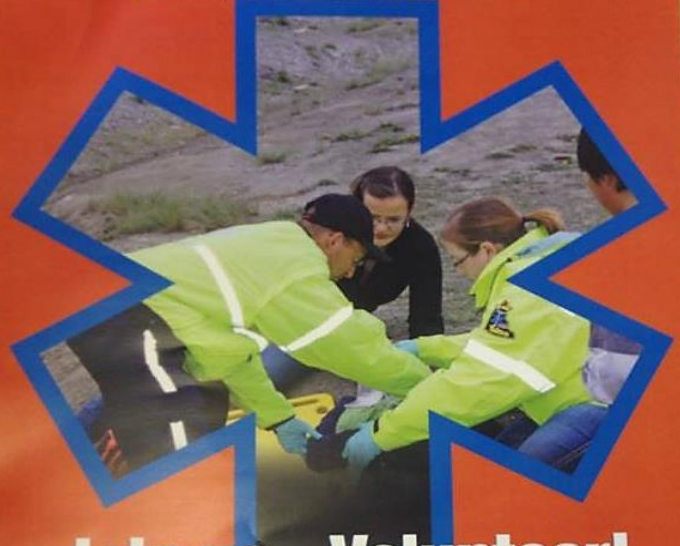
