### **TESLIN ROADS**

All streets are in good fall conditions. Road patching is complete and the Speed bumps around Friendship Park, Daycare, Recreation Center and the School have been removed for the winter. Culvert cleaning continues and will be complete before snowfall.

### **SOLID WASTE FACILITY/RECYCLING**

The solid waste facility hours are as follows:

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday – Closed to public

Thursday and Friday – Noon to 6:00pm

Saturday – 9:00 am – 5:00 pm

There is no after hour access to the facility so please plan accordingly.

An average of one refuse bin a week is being sent to Whitehorse landfill for disposal. Everyone is encouraged to do recycling at home and at work to reduce the amount of material that goes to the landfill.

The free store has been upgraded; please ensure all items dropped off are clean and in good shape.

Please ensure recycling bins are outside first thing Wednesday morning and easily accessible for pickup.

Electronic waste is now on the designated material list so it is free of charge to dispose of.

### **LAGOON AND SEWER SYSTEM**

All systems are in good working order. Please be aware and careful of what is being flushed down the system. Please watch for construction equipment and trucks while driving on the lagoon road as the Airport Connector Road construction is underway.

### **WATER QUALITY/ WATER DELIVERY**

The Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is in good working condition.

Please ensure that pathways to the water fill spouts are clear and sanitary for safe water delivery. Please notify us if you will be away and not requiring water delivery. Kindly ensure that spouts & tank whistles are in good working order and lids closed to help avoid water overflow.

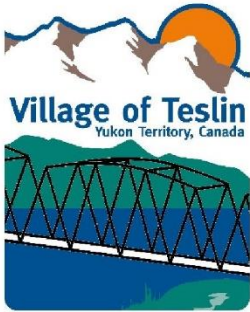

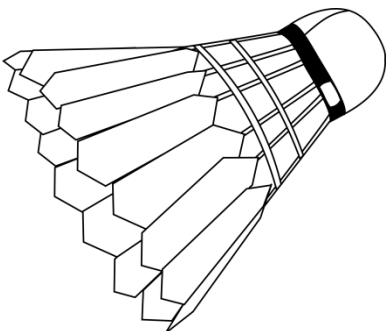

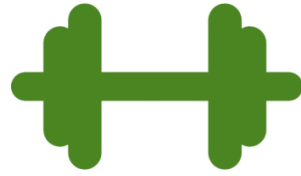

## Banana Mummies

### INGREDIENTS

- 4 bananas
- 1 lb. white chocolate
- 4 oz. white chocolate
- 16 mini m&m's
- 4 oz. milk chocolate chips
- 8 Lollipop sticks

### DIRECTIONS

1. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper. Skewer each banana half with a lollipop stick and freeze until firm, at least 2 hours.
2. In a large microwave-safe measuring cup, melt 1 pound white chocolate in the microwave according to package directions. One at a time, dip the bananas into the chocolate to coat, shaking off any excess. Return to the baking sheet and immediately place two M&M candies near the top for eyes.
3. Melt the remaining white chocolate in the microwave according to package directions and fill a small piping bag fitted with a small, round nozzle tip. Pipe zigzags over the banana to form bandages. Repeat this step with the milk chocolate, if using. Chill or freeze until ready to serve.

### INGREDIENTS

## Peanut Butter Candy Corn Blondies

### INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter
- 1 1/2 cups light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup white chocolate chips
- 1/3 cup peanut butter chips
- 1/3 cup salted peanuts
- Sea salt, for sprinkling on blondies
- 1/2 cup candy corn

### DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease a 9-inch by 13-inch pan and set aside.
2. In a saucepan over medium heat, melt the butter and brown sugar, stirring constantly until smooth. Remove from the heat, and stir in the peanut butter, until creamy and combined. Set mixture aside to cool.
3. In a large bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt.
4. Add the eggs, one at a time, to the peanut butter mixture, mixing well after each addition. Add the vanilla extract and stir to combine. Pour the mixture into the prepared dry ingredients, and stir until batter is smooth. Stir in the white chocolate chips, peanut butter chips, and peanuts.
5. Transfer the batter to the prepared pan, spreading the batter evenly to the edges of the pan. Sprinkle with sea salt.
6. Bake for 25 minutes and remove from the oven. Gently press candy corn into the blondies. Put pan back in the oven and bake for an additional 2-4 minutes. The top should be golden and the edges slightly browned. Remove blondies from oven and place them on a wire rack to cool. Once cooled, cut into squares and serve.

## Marshmallow Mummy Pops

### INGREDIENTS

- Jumbo Marshmallows
- 1/4 - 1/2 pound white melting chocolate
- Lollipop sticks
- Candy eyes
- Piping gel
- Small paint brush
- Ribbon piping tip
- Styrofoam block

### DIRECTIONS

1. Use piping gel and a small paint brush to glue a pair of eyes to each jumbo marshmallow. Set aside and let dry.
2. Melt chocolate in a microwave safe bowl in 30 second increments until completely melted.
3. Dip lollipop sticks into melted chocolate and then into the bottom of all the marshmallows.
4. Prepare a piping bag with a ribbon tip. Fill bag with white chocolate (a little bit at a time).

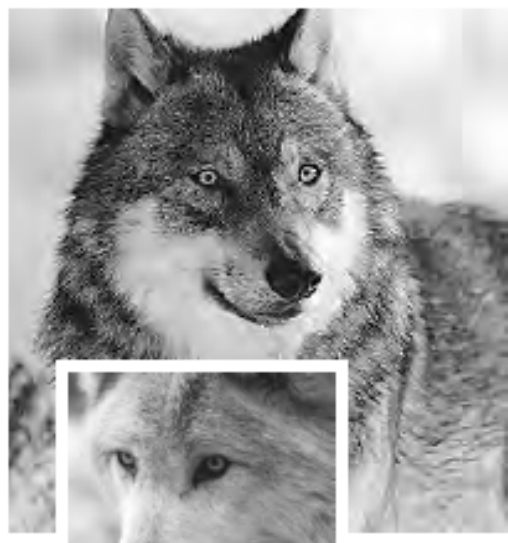

# Check This List When You Want To Keep Coyotes, Wolves and Foxes Away From Your Back Door



Feeding wild animals might seem like an act of kindness, but it is not. Feeding wildlife is illegal and usually ends in a death sentence for the animal. When foxes, coyotes and wolves become habituated to unnatural food sources they can lose their fear of humans.

A wild animal that has become conditioned this way can be a danger to itself and to the general public.

In some cases, wild animals that frequent residential areas can be live-trapped and relocated. But if the animal has become a nuisance to the extent that it kills domestic animals or threatens people, it must be destroyed.

## What you can do:

- Don't feed or leave food out for foxes, coyotes or wolves.
- Don't attract wildlife with carelessly stored garbage and compost.
- Make sure your garbage and compost put out for pick-up are secure against scavengers.
- Keep meat and dairy products out of backyard compost systems, and ensure your compost is completely enclosed with a secure lid.
- Store pet food indoors or lock it up outdoors.

- Vaccinate your pets.
- Keep your pets indoors or safely tied in a well-lit and fenced yard.
- Prevent any interaction between your pets and wildlife – walk dogs on a leash all the time.
- Do not touch the fecal waste of foxes, coyotes and wolves.
- Set an example for your children. Teach them how to behave around wild animals. If you or your child sees a wild animal that is threatening, be big, be loud and never run.
- Talk to your neighbours, educate them on the risks to the community and to wildlife associated with feeding foxes, coyotes, wolves and any wild animals.

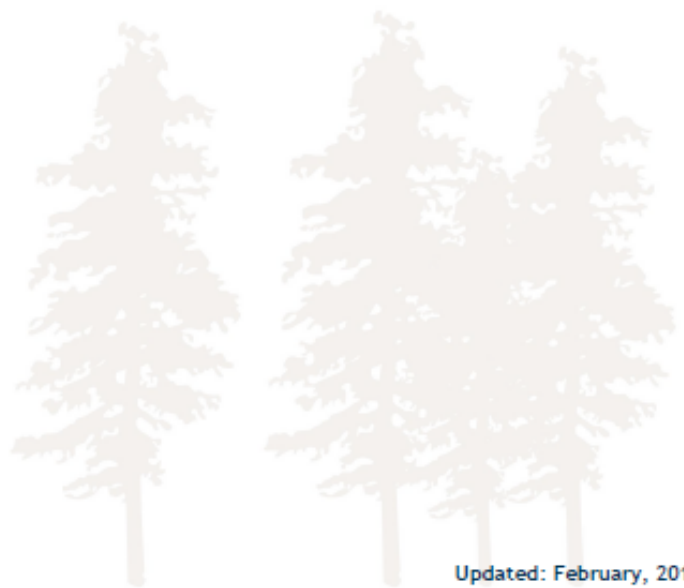

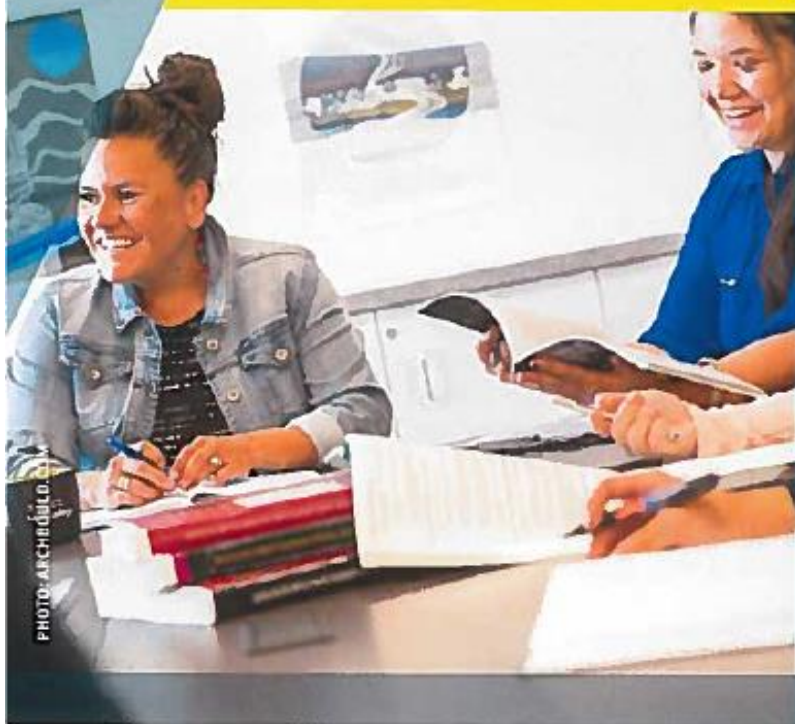

## PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Yukon College's Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Governance degree builds on Yukon First Nations' 25 years of experience with modern treaties and implementation of self-government.

Developed in partnership with Yukon First Nation governments, this degree aims to provide students with the skills, knowledge, and values to be successful and influential government and community leaders.

You will learn through a combination of lectures, seminars, group discussions, guest speakers and experiential activities, including a capstone project. The Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Governance degree consists of 90 credits delivered over three years of full-time study, or at the student's own pace on a part-time basis.

## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Grade 12 graduation with English 12 and Math 11 (Applications, Principles, Foundations, or Pre-Calculus strongly recommended); OR
- Mature Student Status with acceptable scores on College Assessments; OR
- Acceptance into a related post-secondary program at a comparable level to the Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Governance; OR
- Five years of manager-level work experience with four to five pieces of sample writing for eligibility assessment.

## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Governance degree will build public-sector leadership and administrative capacity, particularly with respect to Indigenous governments, by exposing students to the values, knowledge and skills necessary for working collaboratively within the governance context of the North.

The program centres on northern issues and the interaction between Western and Indigenous worldviews. Students will analyze the evolution of Indigenous self-determination and self-government in Yukon, Canada and internationally, with a focus on current legislation and policy.

A capstone project will provide students with an opportunity to integrate theoretical knowledge of policy, governance, and self-determination with practical methods in an applied setting.

## EMPLOYMENT

- The Bachelor of Arts in Indigenous Governance will produce leaders in governments and communities qualified to participate in the northern governance landscape and/or pursue further study in the field.
- All graduates will be equipped for management and leadership positions in Indigenous governments, municipal and territorial governments, as well as non-profit organizations operating in the context of Indigenous governance.
- Students already holding these positions will refine their professional skills through academic research and practical applications.

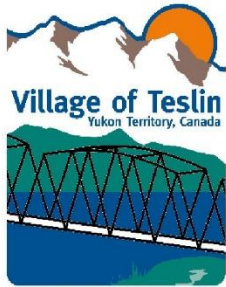

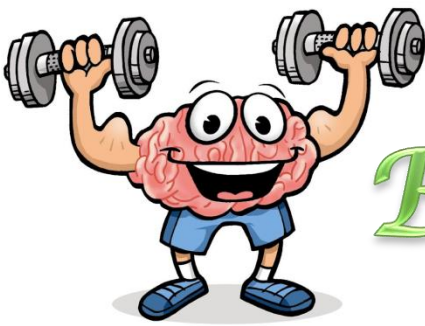

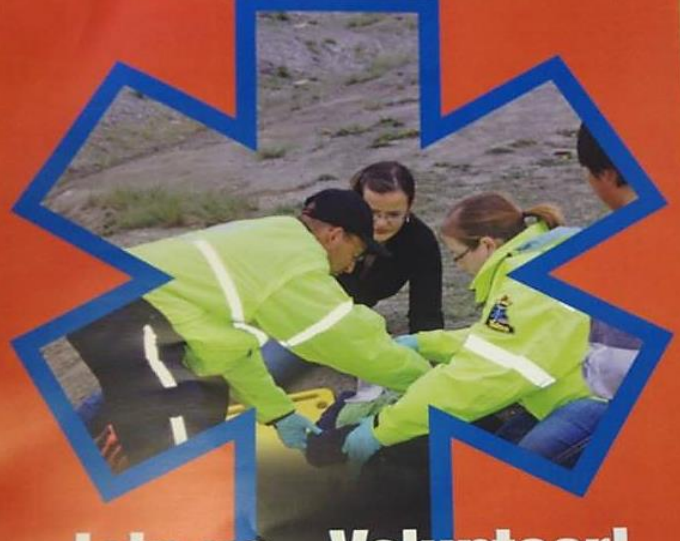
