

December designated as Provincial CounterAttack Impaired Driving month in BC

Impaired Driving enforcement is a national policing priority and Atlin RCMP will support this priority by increasing enforcement efforts to stop impaired drivers this holiday season.

Saturday, December 1, 2018 marks the start of the provincial, month-long CounterAttack impaired driving campaign. Atlin motorists can expect to see a heightened police presence in many areas of the community targeting impaired drivers.

According to provincial statistics, 65 people die each year (on average) in collisions where alcohol, drugs or medication is involved (5 year average from 2012 to 2016), making impaired driving fatalities one of the leading causes of death on our provincial roadways. Impaired driving, defined as driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs is entirely preventable yet it continues to happen with devastating consequences. Police will be using every resource at their disposal to get impaired drivers off the road. Police are also fully prepared to enforce the recently introduced cannabis legislation.

A small decision to plan ahead and drive responsibly can have great impact on our community. If you are planning on drinking or using drugs this holiday season, please do not drive. By finding an alternative way home such as walking or a designated driver you can ensure that you, and others sharing the road with you, get to their destination safely. Please make it your habit to drive sober every time you get behind the wheel.

Motorists can expect to see police road-checks in Atlin during the month of December and thereafter. Police ask everyone to drive safely and obey the direction of officers at all check-stops. Atlin RCMP wishes everyone a safe holiday season!

Chief assigns new sweeps, closer spacing this time. Call but don't expect an answer.

He pauses, looks down.
Check out bear scats.
Watch for ravens, crows,
vultures,
watch for converging coyote
tracks

...but keep calling.

We look at the ground. We nod, silent.

Single-file up the mountain to our base line coordinates. Thighs ache from yesterday, throats raw from calling, skin torn by chaparral, by deadfall.

What about Shirley-Anne?
I was guilty warm in my sleeping bag.
How did she feel?
Did she lie hard on cold rocks under the icy stars?
under a bush? Under a fir?

tormented by mosquitoes? Did she shiver all night? Is she shivering now?

Or is that... all past?

Bear tracks by the stream. Cougar, too. And coyote. Take a deep breath.

We line out, ten strides apart.
The whistle shrieks,
the line creeps forward,
downslope,
scanning for sign.
We call as we go, and listen.

A crow answers.

Crows recycle children.

Thick brush ahead,
dusty clinging limbs,
a brittle wall, but we go in.
Kids do, so we must.
Crash through, duck, dodge.
Watch for snakes.

Open forest again.
The whistle screams stop,
a pause for breath.

Warm now, almost hot.
Skin crawls, sensing ticks.
Canteen still chilled from night.
I munch a candy bar.
Arm stings, skin is ripped,
stick on a plaster.



Reporting to the Senior Manager (CAO), the Land, Resource & Fisheries (Lands) Manager is responsible for the overall development, delivery and management of TRTFN's land, resource and fisheries programs and activities.

<u>DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES</u>, subject to required approvals, polices and processes include:

- 1. Develop, oversee implementation and accountable for Lands strategic plans, work plans, budgets and programs.
- 2. Develop L&R policies & procedures and monitor their effective implementation.
- 3. Work cooperatively with respective Lands Divisions on a strategic and oversight basis.
- 4. Oversee implementation of the Atlin Taku Land Use Plan and TRTFN BC Land and Resource Management and Shared Decision Making Agreement (the 'G2G Agreement').
- 5. Set priorities and manage departmental staff and resources to achieve departmental goals & objectives.
- 6. Represent TRTFN as required on land and resource committees and working groups, or ensure delegation of these functions.
- 7. Develop and maintain sound relationships with TRTFN staff and citizens, government agencies and external organizations/interest groups.
- 8. Prepare Lands and Resources budgets, monitor compliance with budgets, and address issues as required to ensure fiscal responsibility.
- 9. Follow, implement and monitor application of TRTFN policies and procedures.
- 10. Monitor expenditures and report financial status to the Clan Director for Lands, and Leaders as required.
- 11. Obtain resources to deliver programs by developing and submitting proposals to funding agencies.
- 12. Ensure departmental compliance with auditing or other financial reporting requirements.
- 13. Research and prepare briefing notes and correspondence for the Clan Directors on land and resource management.
- 14. As required, provide information materials, presentations and forums to TRTFN citizens.
- 15. Report to the TRTFN Joint Clan Meeting and seek ongoing mandates for Lands' programs, activities, and budgets, as required.
- 16. Foster an environment of mutual respect, teamwork, professionalism and accountability among all staff and contractors.
- 17. Direct and supervise staff in the day-to-day activities of the Lands Department.
- 18. Complete hiring and conduct performance evaluations with staff on an annual basis, or as required.
- 19. Provide training, mentoring and capacity building opportunities for staff.

POSITION SUMMARY

Reporting to the Manager of Social and Health, the Justice Coordinator will develop programs to assist and support victims of crime in the community. The position will consult with representatives of the community to plan a Justice Program to deliver services to the community using traditional values that will promote peacemaking in both a social and criminal context. The Justice Coordinator is responsible for establishing a Youth/Elders Planning Committee and developing and implementing a Youth Crime Prevention Action Plan. This position will develop a process to intervene in urgent social issues and provide a conflict resolution process to those issues.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Developing with department staff a preventative process to deal with critical issues, i.e. spousal assault.
- 2. Liaising and facilitating meetings with community groups and individuals to establish a Justice Committee. Assisting the Justice Committee to develop guidelines and policies.
- 3. Documenting alternate models of justice, including traditional models. Arranging for and coordinating training for staff and committee members in traditional healing values.
- 4. Arranging for and coordinating training for appropriate volunteers and staff in Justice processes i.e. Restorative and Circle Justice.
- 5. Developing activity plans for Youth/Elders Committee.
- 6. Participating on the Risk Management Team which involves meeting with offenders either in or returning to the community and supporting them in identifying what supports can be provided to assist them in managing their risk.
- 7. Setting up and maintaining client files and running records.
- 8. Preparing reports to the Manager, Social and Health, the Justice Committee, Youth/Elders Committee and leadership as required.
- 9. Position is responsible for recommending changes and/or modifications to existing programs to address identified needs or gaps in service.
- 10. Ensuring that all members of the Justice Program carry out their duties in a respectful, fair, non-discriminatory and non-abusive manner.
- 11. Providing ongoing communication with the Manager of Social and Health and other parties as required.
- 12. Attending relevant workshops, training sessions and seminars on justice issues to develop personal skills in order to bring professional qualifications to position and to the efficient operation and benefit to the TRTFN.
- 13. Other related duties as reasonably requested.

POSITION SUMMARY

The Youth Coordinator is responsible for planning, coordinating, delivering and reporting on Programs, Services, and Special Events for youth in the Community of Atlin. There will be a special focus on TRTFN Youth ages 13-18. The candidate will inspire Atlin youth by being a strong role model, and by demonstrating through action; the contributions youth can make to their community.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES, include:

Subject to oversight and supervision the Youth Coordinator roles working respectfully and in a team spirit include the following:

1. Plan and deliver, with Youth input, weekly programming and activities for Tlingit and Non-Tlingit youth in the community of Atlin.

- Provide positive experiences for youth such as on the land activities, camping trips, sports activities, and age appropriate field trips, as appropriate throughout the year.
- 3. Build strong interpersonal relationships with youth one-on-one and in group settings, providing daily communication and support.
- 4. Liaise with outside agencies and the community on programs and issues relating to youth.
- 5. Assist in planning and delivery of Language and Culture programming and events to build support for TRTFN Culture, Language and Traditions.
- Work closely with the TRTFN Cultural Coordinator and liaise with TRTFN Elders Council.
- 7. Assist in planning and delivery of Community Events (Dakha Day, Christmas, etc.) and work toward development of an Atlin Youth Council.
- 8. Assist in the development and implementation of employment/training opportunities for youth and fundraising for youth programming
- 9. Work collaboratively with the Atlin School to inspire innovative, culturally sensitive solutions to challenges facing the youth (in and out of class).
- Provide support with youth studies through tutoring and/or weekly homework club.
- Work close in a team spirit with TRTFN Family Support Worker, Community Wellness Worker, and Community Counselor to inspire innovative, culturally sensitive solutions to challenges, including for substance abuse, for Atlin youth and their families.
- 12. Oversee youth delivery of the Atlin Community's Meals on Wheels Program to TRTFN recipients.
- 13. Attend weekly meetings and work collaboratively with the Community Case Conferencing team, and arrange and participate in family case conferences where appropriate.
- 14. Participate as a contributing member of relevant committees designated by the Manager of Health and Socials.
- 15. Complete and submit work plans and reports to the Health and Socials Department Manager as required.
- 16. Establish effective working relationships with TRTFN Leadership, Clan Leaders, staff, community members and, service providers.
