EDUCATION TRUST FUND

In February of 1998, the YAA was given a cheque for an Education Trust Fund to be set up and maintained by the Yukon Agricultural Association. The monies have been invested and are earning interest until the implementation of the project.

CANADIAN FARM BUSINESS MANAGEMENT COUNCIL CFBMC

AGRICULTURE FOR THE 90's: A YUKON POLICY

The Yukon Agricultural Policy is being reviewed by the Government this year. As part of this process, the YAA is working on its own review of the Policy. A series of ten meetings were held throughout the Territory during February & March, and roughly a hundred farmers and stakeholders came to present their concerns and priorities for changing the policy.

These concerns and priorities are now being compiled into draft YAA Policy recommendations. YAA is at present trying to negotiate with YTG for completion of this project. The YAA has been promised a public agricultural policy review for the past four to five years, we feel this should be an industry driven review, and that YTG should not in essence be writing their own report card. The YAA is continuing negotiations.



AFTER FOUR WEEKS

- ★ Increase floor area to 3/4 sq. ft per bird.
- ★ Increase feeders to provide 2 1/2" - 3" of space per bird.
- ★ Increase waterers to one 5 gallon fount per 100 birds.
- ★ Make sure Grit Hopper is filled with proper sized grit.
- ★ Install roosts at back of brooder area. Allow 4 inches per bird with roost poles six inches apart.
- ★ Open windows in daytime. Leave only partly open at night.
- ★ Prevent water puddles around founts. Place founts on low wire platforms.
- ★ Birds can range outside on warm sunny days, but only if clean range is available.

OTHER IMPORTANT MATTERS

DRAFT SHIELD:

Cardboard put in a circle about 12 inches high around the birds helps to cut down on drafts on the floor. Be sure the circle is large enough to allow the birds to get away from the heat if they want.

LITTER:

Wood shavings, rice hills, or ground cobs make good litter. Do not use cedar chips, sawdust or treated wood chips. Put the litter all over the floor at least 1 inch thick. Keep it covered for the first day with newspapers to keep the chicks from eating the litter instead of their food. To avoid leg problems remove the papers after the first day.

GRIT:


Starting on the 3rd day, sprinkle baby grit on the feed daily as if you were salting your food. Avoid adding too much.

PICKING:

Baby birds will often pick each other if they are too hot, too crowded, or without fresh air. Occasionally bright light also makes them pick. If all above situations are remidied and the birds are still picking, try putting in fresh grass clippings and darken the room. As a last resort, de-beaking them may have to be done. Try cutting off about one-third of the top bill. Do not cut the lower bill.

To treat birds that have been picked, smear pine tar or black grease on the injured area.
