Game Growers Update

'Tis the season for elk and bison babies, and for elk antler growth. Most of the elk calves have been born now in the Nowlan, David and Shirley Ford, Calvin and Patti Ford, Coates, and Drury herds, with just a few expectant mothers remaining. An interesting statistic from the Ford and Nowlan herds is the abundance of bull calves born this year. One theory is that it is nature's way of keeping the population low as a result of last year's drought, which peaked during the breeding season. This might make an interesting study!

The First Annual Elk Antler competition will take place at the Drury Ranch (Circle D) on July 17 for all local elk ranchers. This should be a fun and friendly competition to see which bulls have the biggest antlers this year. There will be 2-year-old, 3-year-old, and mature bull classes.

The Game Growers are in the midst of producing a short video featuring our Yukon animals, which have some of the finest genetics in North America. Doug Phillips is doing the camera work and editing. It will be shown at an international elk Expo in Alberta this summer.

Most of the bison calves have been born on the LaPrairie Ranch. They are looking good.

Seed to Harvest...

Garden Education Program/CARD Project

Gardeners in the Seed to
Harvest program are seeing the
first fruits of their labour this
month. Dawne Mitchell,
program co-ordinator, says the
students are excited to be harvesting lettuce, spinach, radishes
and zukes.

Ten students, mostly women are enrolled in the learn-to-garden program. Some are first time gardeners; others have tried gardening before but wanted some tips and support from an experienced gardener. Some of the gardeners are par-ticularly interested in adapting their knowledge to the unique Northern conditions.

Dawne says most of us learn to garden from parents or relatives, but many people in Dawson don't have family around to show them how to do it. The Seed to Harvest program is designed to give basic instruction and encouragement so that participants learn that they can do it themselves.

The students have been working since March growing seedling, learning greenhouse techniques and preparing soil. Some are growing in their own backyards; others have planted in containers and window boxes. Dawne has donated some of her garden space to the project as well.

Dawne says everyone is learning each step of the way. The most important learning is that gardening is hard work ... but it's worth it

Education Projects Report

This spring saw the successful completion of the Grade 4 "Agriculture in the Classroom" project, and also the Grade 11/12 "Careers in Agriculture" project. Both programs were devised and delivered by Barbary Drury on contract to the Yukon Agricultural Association.

The Grade 4 program was similar to the program of 1993, 1994, and 1995, and was made up of a one-and-a-half hour in-class presentation delivered to all the schools in the Yukon which wished to participate, except Old Crow. An extra bonus for the Whitehorse school children was a "day at the farm," in which they came out to Circle D Ranch, and saw the hay lands, the animals, the machinery, the greenhouse, and a huge beaver dam. The teachers who remembered the program from 1995 were really happy to see its return, and all the children enjoyed learning about agriculture. It is the only exposure that many of them have ever had. A copy of the final report is available to be viewed at the YAA office in the TC Richards building.

The Grades 11/12 "Careers in Agriculture" program was brand new this year. It was presented to all Grade 11/12s in the course "Careers and Personal Planning" (CAPP) who were enrolled in the spring 1999 semester. It had three main parts to the presentation:

- The Yukon slide show in which Yukon farms were profiled
- Career overheads in which we looked in depth at what it would take to pursue seven different agriculture careers
- Supplementary hand-out material, including a CD computer disk which highlighted agricultural careers from a young adults' perspective

The Grade 11/12 program was well received by teachers and students alike; many expressed surprise at the variety of farms in the Yukon. For example, if students lived in Mayo, they weren't usually aware of what was happening agriculturally around Whitehorse, and vice versa. So even if we don't see a massive influx of agriculture students from the Yukon, we can be confident that we opened quite a few eyes and minds as to the potential of agriculture in the Territory, and that's a step in the right direction!

The final report on this project is also at the YAA office.

Agri-Business Tax Incentive for Y2K Compliance

Last year the federal government announced an incentive to encourage and assist **small- and medium-sized businesses** that address the Y2K problem. On certain eligible purchases of computer hardware and software, you may be eligible to deduct 100 percent of the purchase in the first year. Normally on computer purchases, you can

deduct only Y2K continued from page 6

15 percent in the first year and then 30 percent each year thereafter. With software, normally 50 percent can be deducted in the first year and then 50 percent in the second.

You must meet a number of conditions to qualify for the fast write-off: The computer hardware or software must be Y2K compliant and be acquired to replace non-compliant property acquired before 1998, and it must have been purchased during the period from January 1, 1998, to June 30, 1999.

To obtain the incentive, attach a letter with your tax return describing the eligible property, its cost, date of acquisition, a description of the non-compliant property being replaced and the date that the non-compliance was acquired.

Judge Rodie is renowned for her work and is expected to give worthwhile comments to participants. Judge Rodie's long list of credentials include judging the 1976 summer Olympics in Montreal.

CARD Fund Update

Canadian Adaptation Rural Development Fund

The Department of Agriculture & Agri-Food Canada is moving toward funding another round of CARD projects. The government says it will provide \$498,000 to the Yukon in CARD funding over the next four years. See page 3 for a list of projects supported by CARD over the last couple of years.

Dorine Girouard, the president of the Yukon Agricultural Association, went to Ottawa in early June for meetings with the Minister of Agriculture. Dorine says the meetings were worthwhile in many ways but particularly because she found out what CARD money has funded in other provinces. If you are interested you can review the CARD reports from elsewhere in the YAA office.

The Minister of Agriculture says six points should be covered in new CARD funded projects:

- rural development
- marketing initiatives
- innovation and diversification (new ideas and products)
- current education of farm business managers
- food safety and quality
- cnvironmental sustainability

Before projects can be reviewed and another round of funding handed out, the Yukon needs a new CARD Committee. The former committee members are welcome to serve again, but newcomers are welcome too. The committee evaluates applications to the CARD fund and oversees the completion of projects. If you are interested or know someone who would be a responsible, informed member of this committee, please submit nominations to the YAA office at (867) 668-6864.

The goal is to have the new CARD committee up and running by the Fall. Look for guidelines and application forms during Agriculture Week in October.


What does "Organic" mean?

The meaning of organic became clearer at the end of June, when the federal government announced its new standards for organic agriculture

The Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, Lyle Vanclief, says the new standards will provide consumers with a consistent meaning for organic. Among it's provisions, the standard

- encourages maximum use of recycling
- encourages maximum crop rotation and promotion of biodiversity
- prohibits the use in ionizing radiation in the preservation of food
- prohibits the use of genetically engineered or modified organisms

The national standard will be recognized gobally and will help international marketing. The document is called the National Standard of Canada for Organic Agriculture. It can be found on the web at www.pwgsc.gc.ca/cgsb, or phone Ottawa 1-800-665-2472 to order.
