It became evident during the governance training undertaken by YAA Directors over the past year that the bylaws required revision. These special resolutions present changes that could streamline the organization and ensure efficient functioning. The resolutions have been emailed or mailed to all members and will be voted upon at the AGM.

POLICY ADOPTION

The YAA Policy Manual was adopted at the March 13 2013 Board Meeting.

This 34-page document represents a significant amount of work from board members, staff and facilitator Cathy Leimbach. Thanks to all!

The need for polices arose out of the 2012 CAAP audit which requested development of Yukon CAAP Council policies. The YAA Board subsequently decided it would be useful for the organization to have its own policies to enable clear and fair action on a range of topics from board performance to equipment rental.

The manual is available from the YAA website. Some work remains to be done on the appendices and procedures.

WRAP-UP: EGG GRADING & ALASKA FLOUR COMPANY PRESENTATIONS

The Agriculture Branch hosted Brad Jones, Program Specialist Eggs, from the Canadian Food Inspection Agency on Saturday March 23 to give a presentation to Yukon egg producers. This included information on egg grading and the physical requirements for creating/building an egg grading facility.

In the afternoon, Yukon Young Farmers hosted Bryce Wrigley from the Alaska Flour Company. Bryce spoke about the similarities between Alaskan and Yukon agriculture (the challenges and opportunities facing both) as well as importance of local food systems and relevant government policy.

The Alaska Flour Company mills Sunshine hulless barley grown on the family farm and Bryce addressed decisions important to consider when starting or expand an agricultural business as well as technical aspects of flour milling. His presentation was inspiring and provided a useful contact for several local farmers.

Haskaps

The YAA is working to bring Carl Barber of Northern Light Orchards in Birch Hills SK (175km north of Saskatoon). Carl has been growing haskaps since 2008 and has 10 acres in production for U-pick, retail and wholesale markets.

Scientifically known as Lonicera caerulea, haskap is also commonly known as blue honeysuckle, honeyberry, edible honeysuckle and sweet berry honeysuckle. The flavorful and nutritionally rich berries grow on winter hardy northern temperate zone berry **bushes**

Beekeeping

Interested in bees, honey or mead? Bob Liptrot from the Tugwell Creek Honey Farm and Meadery in Sooke, BC (south Vancouver Island) could answer your questions!

Topics for this may include: control of pests and pathogens, breeding for hygienic behaviour and mite resistance, swarm control, overwintering in cold climates, small scale queen production, honey production and marketing, and predator protection

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM & FARM EMPLOYMENT

The YAA has been researching what is involved to develop an agricultural internship program for Yukon farmers. The office has contacted other organizations running similar programs elsewhere in Canada, such as World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms (WWOOF), Collaborative Regional Alliance for Farmer Training and Atlantic Canadian Organic Regional Network. Additionally, Kirsten attended an 'Intro to Health & Safety' workshop for NGOs.

There are significant requirements to create this kind of program. These include negotiating funding, obtaining WCB coverage, selecting applicants and farms to participate, providing safety training, and ensuring farm/intern expectations are fair. The YAA will therefore work towards having a program ready for the 2014 season.

In the mean time, we have an informal list of employers and employees and can assist farmers and workers by exchanging this information. So, let us know if you want to work on a farm this summer or are looking for employees. We'll try to help out! Please also advise if you're interested in participating as a host or intern in the future internship program.

Two 20' shipping containers were purchased as storage units for the Mayo Road land. These will arrive sometime in late April.

In order to re-fence the land, 9.1 acres of perimeter was cleared by a contractor. The trees were knocked down along the existing fence lines and piled in windrows. The YAA hopes to re-fence over the spring/summer of 2013 and looks forward to developing a usage plan for the land.

2013 CIRCUMPOLAR CONFERENCE

The 8th Circumpolar Agricultural Conference and UArctic Inaugural Food Summit will be held **September 29 – October 3, 2013** at Hotel Alyeska, Girdwood, Alaska.

The conference is advancing food security and sustainable agriculture in the circumpolar north; and building an integrated vision and creating a process for sustainable food security in northern communities.


The conference will consist of invited talks on featured topic followed by formal poster sessions where presenters will provide an overview of the content and purpose of their poster. The discussion generated will continue into a series of breakout sessions organized around the following objectives:

I. Educating world leaders on the critical nature of food supplies in the Circumpolar North;

 Encouraging the exchange of information, material, and technology of agriculture and rural development in circumpolar areas;
Establishing and maintaining relationships with other organizations whose interests are related to the objectives of the Circumpolar Agriculture Association and the thematic network on northern food security of the University of the Arctic, and;

4. Discussing and defining the barriers, challenges, and opportunities of expanding the regional food economy.

GUEST COLUMN: HUMIC ACID - BY CHRIS WEBB

Humic acid ('wonder dirt') is a natural soil amendment that has many benefits in agriculture. It is the soluble organic portion of humus (decomposed plant and animal matter) already present in soils. Augmenting humic acid in soils can increase yields and decrease the amounts of fertilizers that are needed, resulting in increased profits for the farmer.

Benefits of Humic Acid in Agriculture

I. Soil modification and improvement:

- increases water-holding capacity of soil
- ▶ increases aeration of soil
- ▶ improves soil structure and workability
- helps plants resist drought
- reduces soil erosion
- 2. Chemical benefits
 - > prevents leaching of water-soluble fertilizers out of the root-zone
 - > promotes conversion of elements to plant-available forms
 - ▶ posses high ion-exchange capacity
 - ▶ increases buffering properties of soil
 - chelates metal ions
 - b increases uptake of phosphate and other plant nutrients
 - b increases availability of phosphorous and iron in alkaline soils
 - ▶ rich in organic material and minerals essential to plant growth

3. Biological benefits

- stimulates plant growth by accelerating cell division, root development and yield of dry matter
- ▶ increases germination of seed and viability
- ▶ increases permeability of plant membranes promoting uptake of nutrients
- stimulates root respiration
- b stimulates growth and proliferation of beneficial soil microorganisms
- ▶ aids in photosynthesis
- stimulates plant enzymes
- ▶ increases vitamin content of plants
