## ANNUAL REPORT YUKON TERRITORY ADMINISTRATION March 31st. 1952

The Council of the Yukon Territory held two regular meetings during the year, the first commencing the 25th day of April, 1951, and continuing to the 10th day of May, 1951; and the second session commencing the 3rd day of October, 1951, and continuing to the 11th day of October, 1951. Members of the Council of the Yukon Territory are as follows:

The proceedings of the meetings of the Council are contained in the journals compiled by the Clerk of the Council.

The Financial Agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of the Yukon Territory expired on the 31st December, 1951. In anticipation of the renewal of that agreement, a duly appointed Committee representing Departments of the Government of Canada and the Administration of the Yukon investigated, under the instructions of the Minister, the financial relations between the two Governments. The resulting recommendations were placed before the two Governments for consideration. Following the recommendations, a new Financial Agreement was entered into for the ensuing five years, from January 1st, 1952.

The term of the sitting Council of the Yukon Territory will expire in 1952. The election for the new Council for the following three years will be held during the summer, and five members will be elected in accordance with the amended provisions of the Yukon Act.

With increasing population, due to mining activity and augmented military establishments, revenues and expenditures of the Territorial Government increased during the year. Some re-organization of the Territorial staff is required. which will be undertaken during the coming year.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

#### ROADS AND BRIDGES:

The work of this division was centered on five major projects.

(1) Maintenance of the Whitehorse-Mayo Highway:

The year 1951 was the first full year in which the Administration of the Yukon Territory had the responsibility for the maintenance of the Whitehorse-Mayo Highway.

In the early part of the year the Maintenance equipment required and ordered had not yet been received, and it was not until the month of July that adequate maintenance could be carried out. As a result the road deteriorated to some extent, but this condition was corrected in the following months as equipment was received and placed in operation.

Ferries operated at the three river crossings, and as the operating crews gained experience reasonable efficiency in ferry operation was attained.

Collection of tolls in accordance with the Tolls Ordinance was commenced in August. This legislation met with public disapproval. The tolls collected constituted a substantial percentage of the share of the cost of maintenance for which the Yukon Administration was responsible.

(2) Construction of Dawson-Mayo Road:

Approximately 6.5 miles of new road was constructed as a part of the Dawson-Mayo connection. The season was dry and ideal for construction purposes. In addition, portions of the old winter trail from Dawson to Mayo were approved and constitute a part of the finished road.

(3) Maintenance of Mayo-Elsa Road:

This road is thirty-two miles in length, and, because of the topography, presents maintenance difficulties. The cost per mile for the year was \$800.00. A betterment program on this road is indicated to reduce expense costs.

#### (4) Duncan Creek Road to Keno:

Because of the location of this road, and the topography of the country in the area, the road is difficult to maintain, and is dangerous to traffic. A relocation and betterment program is indicated.

#### (5) Maintenance Dawson Winter Road:

This is a road open for traffic during the winter months only. Some minor repair work was carried out before freeze-up. The total maintenance costs for this road for winter use was approximately \$85.00 per mile. The road was open for traffic on December 4th, 1951, and closed April 4th, 1952. Substantial traffic used the road during the winter months.

#### SUMMARY BY DISTRICTS

#### **DAWSON DISTRICT:**

In view of the decision to concentrate on the Dawson-Barlow road, only minimum maintenance was carried out on the other District Roads. Blading and surface with a power grader, drainage and some light gravelling operations made up the work. An analysis of road costs is set out hereunder.

#### **MAYO DISTRICT:**

As previously noted, the Elsa-Mayo Road occupied most of the equipment in this District. Duncan Creek road was maintained to standard for the through traffic to Keno Hill, while the remaining roads were given attention commensurate with their utility. #### WHITEHORSE DISTRICT.

Gravelling operations on the Carcross and Jake's Corner Roads, with a short relocation on the Annie Lake Road, and a major drainage operation on the Two-Mile Hill Road (preparatory to this year's surfacing) made up the bulk of the work in this District. Whitehorse is responsible for the Atlin Road, and also was called upon for much of the initial operation on the Whitehorse-Mayo Highway, pending delivery of new equipment. #### **EQUIPMENT**

#### **GENERAL:**

The attached table shows the location of equipment for maintenance and construction of roads in the Yukon.

With the increased responsibilities of this Branch of the Government considerable organization was required, which was not completed during the year. Plans for the construction and operation of a central maintenance garage at Carmacks have been formulated, and construction will be undertaken during the coming year. Equipment overhaul at regular and proper intervals will be planned.

#### COST ACCOUNTING:

All equipment was placed on a rental basis, that is, was charged against the road on which employed. In the main, when reports were regular and accurate, the system worked well. However, some adjustments were made and the attached rates give a fair indication of the cost of operation. It is pointed out that allowance is made for depreciation and a figure of about \$50,000.00 will be recovered from this year's operations.

#### REPLACEMENTS AND PURCHASES:

A limited amount of additional equipment will be required in the year 1952. Particularly a rock crusher for stock piling surfacing material at strategic locations, and a lowboy trailer for moving heavy equipment will be acquired.

#### **BUILDINGS:**

In the past year only one building was constructed, the one-room school with teacher's accommodation above, at Teslin, the total cost being \$21,217.88, or approximately \$1.12 per cubic foot. In Dawson School normal maintenance, plus floor covering and rebuilding of the main stairs, was carried out, the cost being \$5,162.37. The Mayo Hospital, besides normal maintenance, was provided with an improved case-room and facilities so re-arranged as to produce a surgery dispensary with waiting room, all for \$1,399.85.

The Teslin School project has given that area a modern school with a four-room apartment above. Heating is by forced hot water, coal-fired, and full plumbing is laid on. The classroom is designed to accommodate thirty pupils.

The floors of four class rooms, cloak rooms and the upper hall of the Dawson Public School were covered with battleship linoleum; twenty-three fluorescent (4x10) units placed; and the main and basement stairs retreaded.

The Mayo General Hospital had lacked adequate case-room provision and the waiting room and examining facilities, as well as surgery-dispensary space, inadequate to the needs of a growing population. By providing quarters outside the building for kitchen and caretaking staff, and re-arranging existing facilities, a more suitable and efficient administrative layout was evolved.

With the increased truck traffic on the Whitehorse-Mayo Road, it is anticipated that present ferry facilities will prove inadequate, and that it will be necessary to add additional ferries, or to replace the existing ferries with ones of greater capacity.

#### **SCHOOLS**

Because the school year ends June 30th, the following report on the operation of public and separate schools in the Yukon Territory covers the period September 1st, 1950, to June 30th, 1951.

There were eleven schools in operation, with thirty-three teachers employed. The peak attendance during the year was eight hundred and sixty-eight, with an average attendance of seven hundred. The enrolment on September 1st, 1950, was seven hundred and sixty-three, and on September 1st, 1951, it was eight hundred and sixty three. A further increase in attendance is expected during the next year.

#### Watson Lake (R.C.A.F. Station):

Royal Canadian Air Force and Territorial Joint School. School building supplied by Royal Canadian Air Force, excellent. Teacher accommodation very satisfactory.

## Watson "Y".

Fifteen pupils residing in this area must travel eight to fifteen miles to attend school at Royal Canadian Air Force Station.

#### Swift River:

Canadian Army and Territorial Joint School. Accommodation barely adequate. Army will paint interior during summer.

#### Teelin :

New school built by Territorial Government in 1951. Situation, size, appearance of school excellent. Cost of building and maintenance of same is high.

#### Brook's Brook:

Canadian Army and Territorial Joint School. School building and teacher's apartment satisfactory. Enrolment at present low, only eight pupils being in attendance

#### Haines Junction:

Canadian Army and Territorial Joint School.

In view of the heavy enrolment and large primary class, an additional teacher was appointed January 1st, 1952. The arrangement has proved eminently satisfactory. The Army has co-operated by furnishing more classroom space and has provided very good accommodation for the teachers.

#### Kluane Lake:

Canadian Army and Territorial Joint School.

The teacher resigned in February, and for two weeks no substitute could be obtained. Retardation of pupils was inevitable, but the new teacher is employing extra time during Easter vacation and evenings to bring work up to schedule.

Furniture is being provided by the Army for the teacher's apartment.

In all the Highway schools progress of pupils is satisfactory. Teachers are all of high calibre and it is unfortunate that they are not contemplating staying on next year. In army and Royal Canadian Air Force Camps the school is a particularly important institution, and the quality of the teacher is reflected in the state of efficiency of the school. Teachers are well situated from a financial point of view, but few remain for more than a year, as isolation and transportation difficulties seem to outweigh the monetary advantage.

#### Carcross:

School building rented by Territorial Government from the Anglican Diocese of Yukon. A very unsatisfactory school building, both structurally and in appearance, although work is being done by the Diocese to remedy this situation. Pupils' progress is only fair.

#### Whitehorse Public School:

Most of the problems encountered in recent years will be eliminated when classes move into the new school next September.

The Principal, Mr. Todd, is fortunate this year in having an excellent staff. Organization and progress of classes are very good. Work is well up to schedule in all Departments.

Enrolment has increased over last year, and next September an influx of one hundred is anticipated in the Grade One class alone.

Janitor service is particularly commendable. Oil stoves present a constant anxiety. Cleanliness of classrooms is evident.

#### Christ the King School:

The Sisters in charge are doing good work. Grading and progress of pupils are very satisfactory. Improvements have been made on the school building.

A kindergarten class is in operation, at no expense to the Territorial Government.

The school supplies dormitory accommodation for pupils who live in isolated areas, and for orphans and others who have no permanent home.

#### Mayo Public School:

The two teachers in charge have a difficult task. Fifty pupils are in attendance; eleven grades are being taught. Both classrooms are filled to capacity. Progress in all grades is very good.

#### Dawson Public School:

A competent staff this year is giving excellent service. Progress is particularly good in the lower grades. Enrolment has remained steady, but the number of pupils may be lower next year.

During extremely cold weather it is impossible to heat the school properly, and school was closed for eight days in January.

#### St. Mary's School-Dawson:

A higher enrolment this year, with all grades represented, has taxed the capacity of the Sister in charge. Additional help has been given by other Sisters, and good progress is being maintained.

The school curriculum of the Province of British Columbia is in use in Yukon Territory. The following gives the results of High School examination, Junior Matriculation, for the year ending June. 1951:

#### GAME AND PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

This Department is kept fully occupied during the summer months attending to tourist inquiries, and in mailing tourist information.

During the summer of 1951 nineteen head of elk, consisting of five bulls and fourteen cows, were imported from Elk Island Park in the Province of Alberta, and released at Braeburn Lake in the vicinity of the Alaska Highway. The animals were donated through the courtesy and kindness of the National Parks Branch of the Department of Resources and Development. The operation was successful.

Six bison were transported from Alaska and were released in the same locality as the elk. The animals were donated by the Wildlife Service of the Territory of Alaska. The environment appears suitable for this animal.

The results of these two transplantations will be followed closely. Further importations may be made, depending upon the success of the present experiment.

#### Fur Bearing Animals:

Registration of trappers south of the 65th parallel of north latitude was continued and completed during the year. The number of trappers has reduced owing to the low prices of fine fur. It is expected that fur royalties will decrease.

#### Predator Control:

The payment of bounties on wolves and coyotes will be terminated by repeal of the Ordinance. If conditions warrant, organized predator control will be undertaken in future years.

#### Moose and Caribou:

The number of these animals appear to be on the increase, but steps will be taken to decrease the sale of game meat to institutions and to the public.

#### Big Game:

A total of ninety-three non-resident big game hunting licenses were issued during the year. The present fee for this type of license is \$100.00, which will be increased to \$150.00. The following trophies were taken:

While the income to the Territorial Administration from this source is substantial, the income accruing to the economy of the Territory exceeds \$200,000.00 annually. To encourage this industry, amendments will be introduced to the Game Ordinance regarding areas allocated to licensed guides. New areas will be opened up.

#### OLD AGE AND BLIND PENSIONS

Statistical information and statements of funds received and dispensed for Old Age and Blind Persons Assistance are shown in the tables appended hereto. These tables are as follows:

In the year 1952 approval was given by the Federal Parliament to a measure of the Government of Canada providing for the payment of Old Age Assistance to all persons of the full age of seventy years and residents of Canada, irrespective of their means. This legislation became operative on the first day of January, 1952, and the Government of the Yukon Territory ceased paying Old Age Pensions as of that date. Payments of supplemental allowances to Old Age Pensioners were continued.

During the whole year, aged indigents continued to receive free medical treatment and wherever necessary additional assistance consisting of fuel, essential services and accommodation, was provided. Two blind pensions have been continued throughout the whole year.

It is expected that the Government of the Yukon Territory will adopt enabling legislation to provide assistance to persons in the age group of sixty-five to sixty-nine years. The assistance payable to persons in this age group is a maximum of \$40.00 per month, divided equally between the Dominion and Territorial Governments.

Blind persons allowances in the same amount will be payable with the Government of Canada paying seventy-five percent of this amount.

Revenue collected during the year exceeded amount estimated by \$51,045.40, while subsidy and other revenue was short \$238,612.33, primarily due to insufficient cash being available in Liquor Account to allow transfer of total earned profits.

Total revenue exceeded total expenditure by \$22,846.41, which has been transferred to current surplus account.

#### **EDUCATION**

A revision of teachers' salaries, plus increase in prime cost of supplies, largely accounts for the increase in expenditure for school administration. The enrolment during the year rose from seven hundred and sixty-nine to eight hundred and sixty-nine, a twelve per cent, increase,

#### ROADS, BRIDGES AND PUBLIC WORKS:

Maintenance of Mayo-Whitehorse Highway accounts for the sudden rise in expenditure in this Department. Due to limited staff organization, the necessary supervision required could not be carried out, with the result that it was impossible to carry out the full measure of work planned. It is to be noted that certain moneys were voted for replacement of equipment. However, due to funds not being available, the replacements were not made.

## LIQUOR ACCOUNT:

A substantial increase in liquor sales for the year resulted in additional revenue being available for Territorial purposes. The following table gives a four-year comparison of sales:
