#### MORE MAYO

Hi Karren & Henry,

I enjoyed your exchange re some of the homes in Mayo in last issue of the MocTel. I do have the address and e-mail for Betty (Gordon) Lone who now lives in Morden, Manitoba. (I will send you her contact info in a separate message.) She and her husband Howard still have some mining interests in the Dawson area and they told me that they go up to the Yukon just about every summer to work on their claim. I have suggested she sign up for the MocTel so you may see a response from her sometime. And, yes, she still does have red hair, although, as with all of us, there are many "silver threads among the gold" (or, in her case the red!).

It might also interest you to know, Karren, that I believe after you folks left Mayo, Charlie and Marj Profeit lived in the house where you had lived. I'm sure you remember Jimmy Profeit (not Charlie's brother, Henry!) who is Marj's son. He is my cousin as Marj is my mother's niece. They lived in the house until Charlie, who worked for the Yukon Territorial Government (YTG) as a road crew foreman, was transferred to Dawson sometime in the late 1950's or possibly very early 1960's. I cannot remember who took over the house thereafter. It might have been one of the Van Bibber families.

One of the houses in the three further along the street that Henry mentioned where he lived, was occupied in the mid to late 1950's, for a time at least, by Jock and Helen Kerr. Jock was the local judge and, as a good Scot, loved bagpipe music. I remember going over to their home and being quite taken by bagpipe music, with which, up to that time, I was unfamiliar. Henry, if you could send me a copy of the photo you have of your house

and the log one that you were building, I would be able to identify which one the Kerrs lived in. It may have been where your folks lived. I can't remember for sure. Incidentally, I remember being fascinated by the log house you were building, particularly because of the booms and block and tackle you had set up to move the logs into place. I can't remember much else about the building but I do remember you explaining to my parents and me how it was being built.

Just to fill in a bit on the George Andison family. George's first wife's name was Ethel who died in 1931 and she is the mother of Jack Andison who was a carpenter and worked at Elsa for many years before moving to Whitehorse where he passed away. Jack's wife was Agnes and their children were David, Mary, Bob and Darryl. George then married Phyllis Marshall, Fred Marshall's mother, as Henry indicated. Phyllis passed away in 1940 and George then married Christena Matheson, who, as Henry also indicated, was Jean (Matheson) Gordon's mother. Hence Jean Gordon and Jack Andison were step brother and sister. Jean, of course married Wilfred Gordon and their daughter is Betty Lone. George, Ethel, Phyllis and Christena all now rest in the Mayo Cemetery. George was a very spry man into his senior years. I remember when he was past 80 how he would walk with his back as straight as a board at a very fast clip around town. I also remember walking by his house one day and seeing him up on the top of his roof administering repairs. George also had one of the early movie cameras in Mayo and used to show some of the films of the early days in Mayo at public events. George passed away in 1969 and Christena in 1976. Jean still lives in Mayo and I had the opportunity. as Karren noted, to visit with her (and Betty) in 2003 when I returned for the Mayo Centennial celebrations. (Credit for information on many names and dates to the Mayo Historical Society's publication, "Gold and Galena", page 337.)

As a footnote, Mary (Andison) Laing is on the MocTel list and lives in Calgary. Bob Andison married Gloria Blindheim and they live in Whitehorse where Gloria had a ceramics pottery business for a number of years. She now works for the government. Bob is doing mine maintenance. I know Karren has been in touch with Gloria. David is in Edmonton and I understand that Darryl may be somewhere here on the Island.

#### Thanks Harvey,

You filled in many of the loose pockets as I was going completely by memory. I never knew the name of George Andison's first wife, and yes, now that you mention Ethel Marshal, it does ring a right bell. Of course children were not allowed to use an adult's first name until you were about 21 years, or they would get their ears boxed. You are certainly correct that George walked uprightly and brisk, and would shame many men of much lower age. As he was a Mason away, way back, and when the Northern Lights Lodge was thought of, he was one of the founders in 1955. He was my Inner Guard when

I was Master, and he always took care of the coffee etc. George was a real community worker, and I still remember May 24th when we used to have a town picnic at 5 Mile Lake, he was always there with his big ice cream freezer. Did not matter what it was, he was always in there working and not leaving it to "Joe!"

Thanks for the information on Betty and the silver threads among the red. I don't know how I get by as I only have a bit of silver on the temples around the ears. Bessie Friezen (Profeit) 30 years ago said to me, "You son of a gun, you are into that Grecian Formula," and fortunately I did not need that stuff.

When Karren mentioned Profiet buying their place, I suspected it was Charlie and Marg for the other boys were in the south. Yes, Charlie was in charge of Klondike Highways North and Colin Yeulet Highways South.

When we moved to Carmacks in the fall of 1952, Jock Kerr was the next tenant. Jock was Magistrate in Whitehorse in the latter 40s, and in 1948 one of my crew members on the boat was up for Drunk and Disorderly. Jock was the Magistrate, and he looked at the young fellow and said, "Ther'y dollars or ther'y days", in that heavy Scottish brogue and there was no fooling around. When they were in Mayo they lived in the original log home in the middle. That was the home where I grew up and had lived after we rebuilt it in 1949-50. Dad had the two places, the original log building and the frame building. Yes, working alone on that log building I used my marine skills on rigging to handle the logs by myself. That is why I had a centre spar and a boom to do the lifting.

In 1959 at the power plant, two Air Force young fellows were fishing in the fish transportation canal where there was a fence and a **NO FISHING** sign. An old Fisheries Officer from B.C. caught them, and they started to get smart with him. So he took their fishing gear, arrested them and took them to the Police Station where they were held till their case came up the next day. Jock was the Magistrate and fined them each 25 dollars and their fishing gear confiscated. They started to complain to Jock and get smart which was a dumb thing to do, for he was a retired Staff Sergeant of the RCMP. He said to each in kind soft words, "Where did you take your basic training lad", to which each blabbed thinking here was a kind old fellow! He then in a loud voice said, "TENSHUN!" and they were both up there ramrod straight. He said, "I have a good mind to have your Commanding Officer send you back to take it over again, and maybe they will get it right this time!" It was the last case in the docket, so Jock closed the court and as he got to the outer door he turned and glared at them. They knew better than even wiggle and would face AWOL when they returned to base. The Fisheries Officer was still laughing when he was telling us about it.

Harvey, the attached photo you will find interesting. It was taken in 1936 just after the flood, and the building on the right is the one that the Kerr's lived in. The log building on the left was then being used as a laundry as that was my Mom's work while dad was at the camp. It was later torn down and used for stove wood, and I got the exercise of sawing it up. It was originally a garage where dad kept the Chevrolet 1 ton that he used as a freighter. It was later sold to your uncle Alfred, and he took it down to Independence

Creek where Alfred had a wood camp. No matter which way you turn, you run into a crossroad of Yukoners of the past! Cheers,

## **VIC FOLEY'S SISTERS**

Hi Henry,

I spoke with Will Crayford and Gordon McIntyre this week. Neither knew Vic Foley that well, but did provide some new details.

Gordon said Vic's sister Helen was married to Jack Gallagher, the liquor agent at Mayo for a number of years. Gordon believes he got the job purely on political patronage. Do

you remember Jack? Is he mentioned in Gold & Galena? Gordon also recalled a miner named Tom Foley at Elsa, and thought Vic was somehow related. Ever heard of him?

Will recalled Vic coaching a softball team from Keno or Mayo, and coming to Dawson for an August 17th tournament. He said he last saw Vic at a Vancouver Yukoners Association get-together in the early 1980s. He wasn't doing so well at the time, so I suppose it's possible he died in 1986, the last year he was listed in the phone book. If this was the case, his death certificate will become public in January 2007.

Hello Greg,

Yes I remember Jack Gallagher in Mayo who was the Territorial Government agent and liquor vendor. My interest was that I could get 75 cents a dozen on returned bottles. At that time the liquor came in bulk and was bottled in Mayo by the liquor vendor. It must have been quite a job to clean the bottles, relabeled them and fill. In later years all liquor came in bottles and cased. When I was mate on the Nasutlin, it is surprising how clumsy the crews were when handling cased liquor. Somehow they always landed on the corner, and another surprise was a bucket was always there to set the case on. That is interesting that Helen was married to Gallagher and is something that I didn't know. Of course I never got to know Helen when they were in Mayo as I was quite young at the time. Yes, Gallagher is in the Gold and Galena page 376, and it says that he was the Govt. agent and liquor vendor in the 1930s.

I do remember when the ball team used to travel to Dawson for an Aug. 17th tournament or a return visit was made to Mayo on alternate years. I think the women's team used to do the same thing. But it seems that it was in the 30s as I was quite small, but Vic never came to Mayo till the 40s that I know of. Very interesting to reminisce those old names.

Sure thing. You might also want to note that Vic had another sister, Gladys DesBrisay, who lived in the Yukon for a while with her husband Paul. Jean Gordon told me about them. By 1958 they were living in Haney, BC. I have no idea which sibling came north first, but Vic was definitely there the longest.

There were 13 children in the Foley family, and I've been trying with some difficulty to sort them all out. Some died young, and others went by middle names or nicknames. I

discovered yesterday that Vic's brother Jervis, born 3 May 1899, died on 2 Apr 1993 in Belmont, Calif. There is a phone listing for a Jim Foley in Belmont, quite likely a relative. I'll try calling.

> it does say "It is believed he became blind and lived at the C.N.I.B. residence in Vancouver, BC. where he died at the age of 90." Seems like they knew of his age at death when they wrote that. -- Is that consistent with dying in 1986?

I stayed with Jack and Doe Simpson but shortly thereafter moved into the house where your family first lived, (then owned by Duke/Lil Cunningham). It was close to the Arena that was under construction and to the home you had moved to. (New home still had the front porch on it...ha!) I got a job with Canada Packers and worked with Fred Alywin and walked the distance between..kept me in shape. Seeing the pictures of the house took me back over 50 years - the people on Hawkins Street were all fantastic neighbors. All of your submissions to the Moc Tel are terrific.

With the submission of Jimmy McGarry, that really brought back some good memories of good times. Jimmy worked a bit in the cocktail lounges with myself, Jimmy McLaughlin, Paddy Kane, etc. and I remember one night he was telling us of his singing and entertaining in the UK and performing with Ruby Murray. As a matter of fact he phoned her and we all got to talk to Ruby, she was performing at the Palladium at the time. Jimmy was such a good singer as you know; however, I was not aware of his soccer talents, that came as a surprise to me. Thank you for your offer of sending us the Moc Tel in return for a \$20 subscription, however I think we will decline. Perhaps if it were \$5 a year, we would consider it, but at \$20 a year, I think it is too expensive. Judging by the number of people who are still not signed up, I wonder if we are not the only ones to think that way, in the Yukon, at least.

And it would only be fair to those people, who might be thinking of having their email addresses added to the list for the first time, to be notified that the Moc Tel is no longer free and that they will be required to pay the \$20 fee at some point if they have nothing to add to the publication.

Thank you for compiling and distributing all the stories sent in to the Moc Tel so far.

Have you ever considered the idea of a forum, discussion group or chat room rather than the format that the Moc Tel currently uses. For example, the Yahoo Groups; you can start a Yahoo group at any time for no cost. You have to agree to have advertisers, but they are not really annoying to readers. This might be a good starting point. You would be the moderator, doing less work on the content of the Moc Tel because your contributors would be posting their contributions themselves for all to read. The content could be archived under various topics for the readership to access at any time. Subscribers could arrange to have a daily digest of emails sent to them, individual emails sent or they can just check in to the site when they like. Their choices are many, and it is user friendly. Your financial output would very likely be minimal. These groups are plentiful, leading me to suspect that they are neither expensive nor difficult to maintain.

Eugene (**Gene**) Jacquot married **Ruth** Dickson (daughter of Tom Dickson, and sister to Buck and Dick Dickson who was Anne's husband and father of David Dickson who now runs the hunting outfit out of White River.)

**Louis** married **Mary** (daughter of Copper Joe) in 1920. They had 3 children:

Louis jr

Josephine (Sias)

Rosalie (I know nothing of her and wonder if she died young?)

Of the twelve children born to Tom and Louise Dickson, most were born at the homestead on Kluane Lake. Four Dickson children later owned and operated outfitting

concessions of their own throughout the Yukon Territory, Sue (Van Bibber) had concession #16, Bobby (Austin) Dickson had concessions #2, #3, and #4 while Belle (Desrosiers) owned concession #14 and #15.

(Since I know that Grace Chambers of Burwash, was sister to Belle and Sue, it follows that she was also Tom Dickson's daughter. I remember Douglas Dickson (Buck's son) referring to Grace as 'Auntie Grace."). As was Babe Southwick of dog-racing fame - by the same logic). I remember someone telling me back in those days that Grace, Sue, Belle, and Babe were all sisters, but can't remember who.... probably one of the Dickson boys though.)

When it became necessary to form registered outfitting areas in the Yukon, Buck's area became concession #10. In 1959, my father, Richard Dickson "Dick" bought the area from his brother Buck.

Dad kept many members of the Dickson family working with him over the years. I learned the many bush skills I know today from my Dad, uncles and cousins who all helped guide in the same area.

Dad successfully owned and operated the business for thirty years, selling it to me in 1989. We continue to operate the area using the same principles as my Dad, Uncle and Grandfather.

There have been guided trips recorded for non-resident hunters in the Yukon since 1912. The early years of the industry produced some famous and successful guides and outfitters, including Johnny Johns, Eugene and Louis Jacquot, Thomas Dickson, Buck Dickson, Andy Smith, Tom Connally, Bella Desrosiers, Alex Van Bibber, Curley Desrosiers, and Louis Brown. All lived in the Yukon and made a significant contribution to the social fabric and economy of the Territory. In 1958 the present system of outfitting concession areas was established.

Sherron, I never met Tom Dickson nor his son Buck, but I know all the boys in Buck's family from when I lived in Burwash in the '70s. I also knew Belle Desroisiers (Curly's wife I believe), Sue (Van Bibber- married to Alex), and of course I know Dick Dickson and have known David since he was about 12 or so.

An interesting note about Curly Desroisiers is that he and Alex Van Bibber, along with Simon Mervin from Mayo, and (I think) - Lonnie Johnny, worked out the trail that the Army wanted to use to run an oil pipeline over into NWT. (North Canol road area). Alex told me that they had a severely hard trip and hit temperatures of 70 below in trying to get back to Mayo by dogteam. I knew Lonnie Johnny too. He was from NWT originally and resided in Mayo in the late 70's.

Anyway, Sherron, this should help clarify some interesting questions we've had!

I didn't trap and guide every year I lived in the Yukon. Wanted to but the economics weren't there for trapping after about the late 80's. I probably trapped 10 or 12 years altogether. I think I put in 18 years guiding.

I don't know many people who only live(d) in one place while in the Yukon, and like most I was all over the place. Worked and lived in Clinton Creek for almost 2 years, Elsa for a while, Mayo, Burwash and White River of course (about 8 years), McQueston River, Carmacks for a couple of years. Telegraph Creek for a year and guided for Dempsey Callison.... Old Crow for a couple of months. Guiding takes you all over and you get to see the back country which most folks never do. I guided for Peter Koser for 3 years out of Ross River, but didn't live in Ross River. (Lost Liver 'they' call it). Guided for Widrig out of Bonnette Plume Lake for quite a few years but didn't live in Mayo at the time either. In fact the last time I guided for Kluane Outfitters, (Gene Jaquots old area) was 1999 and I was living in Whitehorse. First time I guided that area was in 72 for Phil Temple.

Rode some good horses and saw a lot of good country.

#### MESSAGE FROM DIANE (BEISSER) PETTIFOR



#### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

You see and hear every where, how good garlic is for your health. The following recipe I have made for the last 15 or more years. You can eat 2 'toes' (cloves) a day, no smell and the left over juice makes an excellent salad dressing.

Marinated Garlic (Anne M. Domes) octavia13\*yknet.ca (In Faro)

8-10 bulbs of garlic
1/2 liter dry cheap wine
4 ounces. vinegar
4 bay leaves
peppercorns, dried pimento (3)
1/2 tsp. Marjoram
1/2 tsp. Thyme
2 tsp. salt
2tsp. sugar

Peel garlic and put in stainless steel pot, cover with the above mixture and boil – covered - for 3 minutes. Let stand over night. In the morning boil another 5-7 min. depending how soft you like the garlic. Fill in jars, cool, cover with 2-3 Tsp. vegetable oil, when cold - close. DO NOT REFRIGERATE.
